Thompson Wins the 2008 Championship

Alexis Thompson of Coral Springs, Fla., defeated Karen Chung of Livingston, N.J., 5 and 4, in the 36-hole championship match of the 2008 U.S. Girls' Junior at Hartford Golf Club in West Hartford, Conn., becoming the second-youngest winner in the event's 60-year history.

At 13 years, 5 months and 17 days, Thompson is only two months older than 1999 champion Aree Song Wongluekiet, who was 13 years, 3 months, 7 days. Chung, also 13, would have been nine days older than Wongluekiet.

The long-hitting Thompson, who in 2007 was the youngest-ever qualifier for the U.S. Women's Open and youngest quarterfinalist in U.S. Women's Amateur history, used her superior length to eventually wear down Chung, a first-time U.S. Girls' Junior participant playing in her first match-play competition. Over the 32 holes, Thompson was the equivalent of two over par, with the usual match-play concessions, while Chung was six over, including bogeys on three of the last four holes.

Thompson owned a 2-up lead at the lunch break and maintained that advantage through 27 holes. But a winning birdie on the 28th hole and two winning pars at holes 31 and 32 closed out the match about 45 minutes before a major thunderstorm rolled through the area.

To reach the final, Chung survived the longest 18-hole match in the championship's history during Saturday's semifinals when she held off Kristina Wong in a 26-hole marathon. In fact, Chung played 80 holes of golf in a 48-hour period prior to the final match, while Thompson needed only 64 holes in the same time frame. Chung's brilliant short game, which had carried her in the previous rounds, was a little off against Thompson, much of which she attributed to nerves.

"I was really nervous today," said Chung, who took up the game three years ago. "It was pretty tough out there today with all the wind [in the afternoon] and Alexis hitting it like 50 yards beyond me on every hole. It does get on my nerves watching a girl hit an iron from where I am holding my wood."



In the morning's calm conditions, Thompson continuously hit her drives past Chung, yet the match remained close. The two players traded holes on the first nine before Thompson won three consecutive holes from No. 10 for a 2-up lead. She led by as many as three holes before losing the 17th with a bogey.

Thompson opened the afternoon round with a winning par at the 19th hole, only to see Chung roll in a 12-footer for her first birdie of the match at the par-4 20th hole. Two holes later, the lead was trimmed to one when Chung converted a 15-foot birdie and Thompson missed from 8 feet.

But all week, Thompson had used the par-5 ninth and 10th holes to her advantage, reaching the 500-yard ninth in two during the quarterfinals and semifinals. While she failed to birdie that hole in the final match, she did hit one of her best shots of the week at the 10th, the 28th of the match. Her tee shot was pushed

to the right underneath some trees and she was forced to punch out to the fairway. Facing a 197-yard shot into the wind, Thompson pulled out her 7-wood and knocked it to 12 feet to set up a winning birdie and a 3-up lead.

"That meant a lot. That was a really good shot," said Thompson. "That shot saved me on that hole."

As the storm moved closer, the winds continued to increase, making it tougher on the shorter-hitting Chung. She failed to reach the 402-yard 13th hole in two and when her 25-foot par slid 4 feet past the hole, Thompson, who reached the green with an iron, calmly two-putted from 18 feet for a 4-up lead.

At the 389-yard, par-4 14th hole, Chung again failed to reach the green in regulation and missed a 6-foot par putt to extend the match. Thompson then clinched the title by holing a 3-footer for par.

"Winning this is at the top [of my list] definitely," said Thompson, the younger sister of current PGA Tour pro and 2005 USA Walker Cupper Nicholas Thompson. "Just winning this is huge. Coming home with the trophy means a lot."

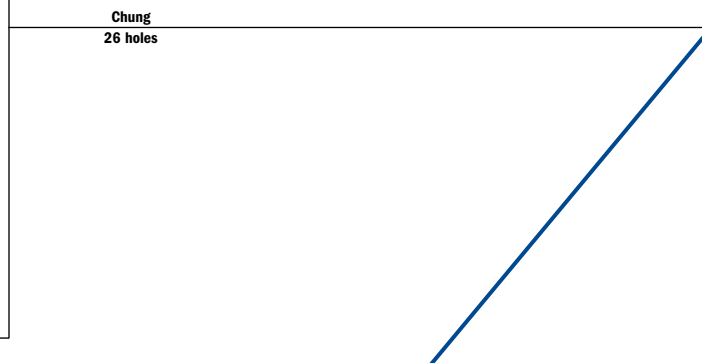
Notes

The final marked the first time two 13-year-olds had competed for the championship ... weather issues plagued the championship early in the week, with heavy rains and thunderstorms washing out play completely on Thursday and forcing the Girls' Junior to be held over an extra day for the first time in its history ... the average age of the field was 15.85 years old ... there were 75 players competing in their first U.S. Girls' Junior and 70 playing in their first USGA championship ... there were three USGA champions in the field: defending Girls' Junior champion Kristen Park, 2006 Jenny Shin and 2006 Women's Amateur winner Kimberly Kim. All three made match play ... there were two sets of sisters in the field — Isabelle and Daniela Lendl, daughters of tennis great Ivan Lendl, and Lauren and Lindsey Weaver of Scottsdale, Ariz. ... Daniela was the only one of the four to make the cut ... Kimberly Kim was one of four players who were competing in their fifth Girls' Junior, along with Kristina Wong, Tiffany Lua and Michelle Shin ... the semifinal match between Wong and Karen Chung went 26 holes, the longest in championship history ... the field's youngest player was 11-year-old Samantha Wagner ... Wagner is believed to be the youngest to qualify for the Girls' Junior since sectional qualifying was introduced in 1996 ... the youngest player in Girls' Junior history was Victoria Jensen, who played in the 1959 championship at age 10 ... 26 family members (13 brothers, five sisters, seven uncles and one grandfather) served caddie duty ... 13 players in the field had played in the Women's Open, including Kimberly Kim, who has played in three ... 11 countries were represented at the 2008 U.S. Girls' Junior: Argentina, Australia, Bolivia, Canada, China, Colombia, Hong Kong, Mexico, Northern Ireland, Philippines and the USA.

Championship History

The U.S. Girls' Junior Championship was established in 1949, one year after the U.S. Junior Amateur Championship. Philadelphia (Pa.) Country Club, one of the oldest golf courses in the nation, was the host club for the USGA's newest championship. The club's Bala Course was constructed in 1891, three years before the birth of the USGA.

The inaugural Girls' Junior drew a starting field of 28 girls from 17 states, although 10 of the players were from the Philadelphia area.

More impressive than the size of the field or the styles of play was the wonderful spirit and sportsmanship the contestants brought to the game, and their complete lack of pretense.

The first champion, Marlene Bauer, 15, came all the way from Los Angeles to win her first national golf title. While golf for girls, beyond the club level, was still a novelty, Marlene had been encouraged by her father, a golf professional, since the age of three. Her victory in the first Girls' Junior was the springboard for a long and distinguished career.

The championship has also helped launch the careers of such outstanding players as Mickey Wright, who won in 1952, and later captured four U.S. Women's Open championships, and JoAnne Gunderson Carner, who won the first of her eight USGA titles in the 1956 Girls' Junior. Nancy Lopez won in 1972 and 1974, interrupted in 1973 by Amy Alcott, who went on to win the Women's Open in 1980.

Considering the brevity and time limitations on a junior golf career, Hollis Stacy's record of three consecutive Girls' Junior Championships, from 1969 to 1971, is among the most remarkable accomplishments in USGA history. Hollis, however, never made it easy. The final matches of her first two championships went 18 holes. In her last victory, in 1971, Hollis needed four-under-par golf to eventually defeat Amy Alcott at the 19th hole. From the third through the 17th hole, neither player made a bogey; between them they made nine birdies. The match is regarded as one of the finest in USGA history.

With her last victory, Stacy became only the seventh golfer to win USGA championships in three successive years. She later won the Women's Open Championship in 1977, 1978 and 1984.

Kay Cornelius, the 1981 winner, is among the other noteworthy champions. Her mother, Kathy Cornelius, won the 1956 U.S. Women's Open. They remain the only mother-daughter team to have captured USGA championships.

While victory in the U.S. Girls' Junior by no means guarantees a successful career in women's golf, Girls' Junior champions have won the Women's Amateur 10 times and the Women's Open 11 times.

Furthermore, 17 Girls' Junior champions have gone on to represent the United States of America on the Curtis Cup team.

Kristina Wong, who was playing in her fifth Girls' Junior, lost her semifinal match in 26 holes, the longest in championship history.

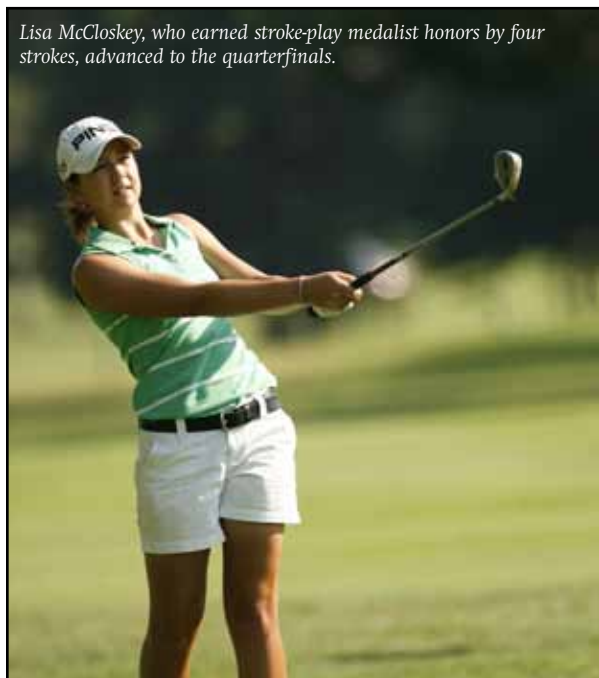

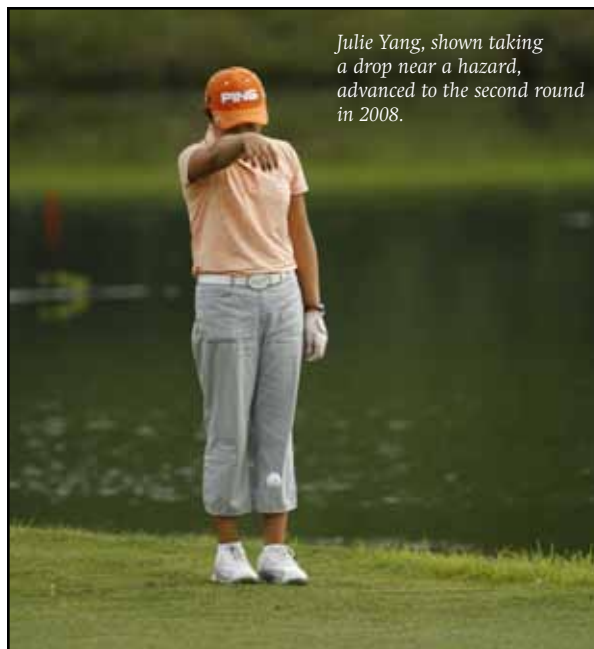
