Matt Parziale Wins the 2017 Championship

Matt Parziale had made three previous unsuccessful trips to U.S. Open sectional qualifying, including this past June. Next year, however, he won't need to take that route to play in golf's ultimate test. Parziale, 30, of Brockton, Mass., booked a spot in the 118th U.S. Open at Shinnecock Hills Golf Club in Southampton, N.Y., with a brilliant performance of shot-making and putting at Capital City Golf Club's Crabapple Course. The firefighter registered 10 birdies – eight during the morning 18 – over 30 holes in defeating Josh Nichols, 26, of Kernersville, N.C., 8 and 6, in the 36-hole championship match of the 37th U.S. Mid-Amateur Championship.

Last week, the USGA announced that the winner of the U.S. Mid-Amateur would earn a full exemption into the next U.S. Open. Parziale will now compete among the world's best golfers.

“That was a great announcement they had [last] Thursday night,” said Parziale, who learned of the USGA's decision during the players' reception on Oct. 5 at Atlanta National Golf Club, the stroke play co-host venue. “At the time, I didn't know I would be the one going, but I'm very fortunate to have that opportunity now. I'm very excited for the upcoming year.”

The U.S. Mid-Amateur began last Saturday with 36 holes of stroke play, followed by six rounds of match play, concluding with Friday's 36-hole final match. It is one of 13 national championships conducted annually by the United States Golf Association, 10 of which are strictly for amateurs. This week's play was postponed for a full day on Sunday due to the impact of Tropical Depression Nate.

Parziale's margin of victory matched the third-largest in championship history. Kevin Marsh's 10-and-9 win in 2005 at The Honors Course is the largest, followed by the 9-and-7 victory by Trip Kuehne at Bandon Dunes in 2007. Mike McCoy won by the same 8-and-6 score in 2013 at the Country Club of Birmingham.

His 7-under 63 in the morning 18 – with the usual match-play concessions – was the best score in a U.S. Mid-Amateur final since the USGA switched the format to 36 holes in 2001.

“I didn't play that bad,” said Nichols, a wedding caterer who failed to qualify for match play in his Mid-Amateur debut last year. “He played amazing. Even great golf couldn't keep up.”

Even a seasoned professional might have had difficulty matching Parziale's effort. He birdied four of the first seven holes in building a 3-up lead. On the inward nine, the 2017 Massachusetts Amateur champion birdied three straight holes from No. 12, and added another at the 458-yard par-4 16th to take a 6-up lead into the lunch break. That stretch included a 55-footer for birdie on the par-3 13th hole.

“I didn't even know I shot 63 until someone texted me after,” said Parziale, who was 8 under par for the match. “I was really just trying to take it one hole at a time. I know that's what everyone says, but that's what I did today.”

Nichols, the fourth North Carolinian to reach a USGA amateur final in 2017 (joining U.S. Amateur champion Doc Redman, U.S. Senior Amateur runner-up Paul Simson and U.S. Women's Amateur runner-up Jennifer Chang), holed a bunker shot for birdie on the par-4 ninth to momentarily halt Parziale's surge, but then immediately gave a hole back on No. 10 with a bogey. Nichols' only other win the rest of the match came when Parziale three-putted the par-3 24th hole for just his second bogey of the match.

If there's any consolation, Nichols was happy to hear that making the Mid-Amateur final earned him a spot in next year's U.S. Amateur. “And it's at Pebble Beach,” he said before receiving his silver medal as the runner-up. He also receives a three-year Mid-Amateur exemption and an exemption from local qualifying for the 118th U.S. Open. “I just learned that today. That's awesome.”

Parziale and Nichols halved holes 25 through 29 before Parziale, No. 247 in the World Amateur Golf Ranking™, sealed the win on the par-5 30th hole with a 2-iron approach that he was quite familiar with. He closed out his Massachusetts Amateur win at Charles River Country Club, hitting a 2-iron into a par 5. His 239-yard laser on Capital City's 12th hole found the back fringe, and he managed to lag the eagle putt to within 4 feet. When Nichols failed to make his 25-footer for birdie, he conceded Parziale's short putt.

Parziale first embraced his father/caddie, Vic, who also works in the same Brockton firehouse. Then he celebrated with fiancé Ali Hubbard, and several close friends who flew down to Atlanta from Boston on the morning of the final.

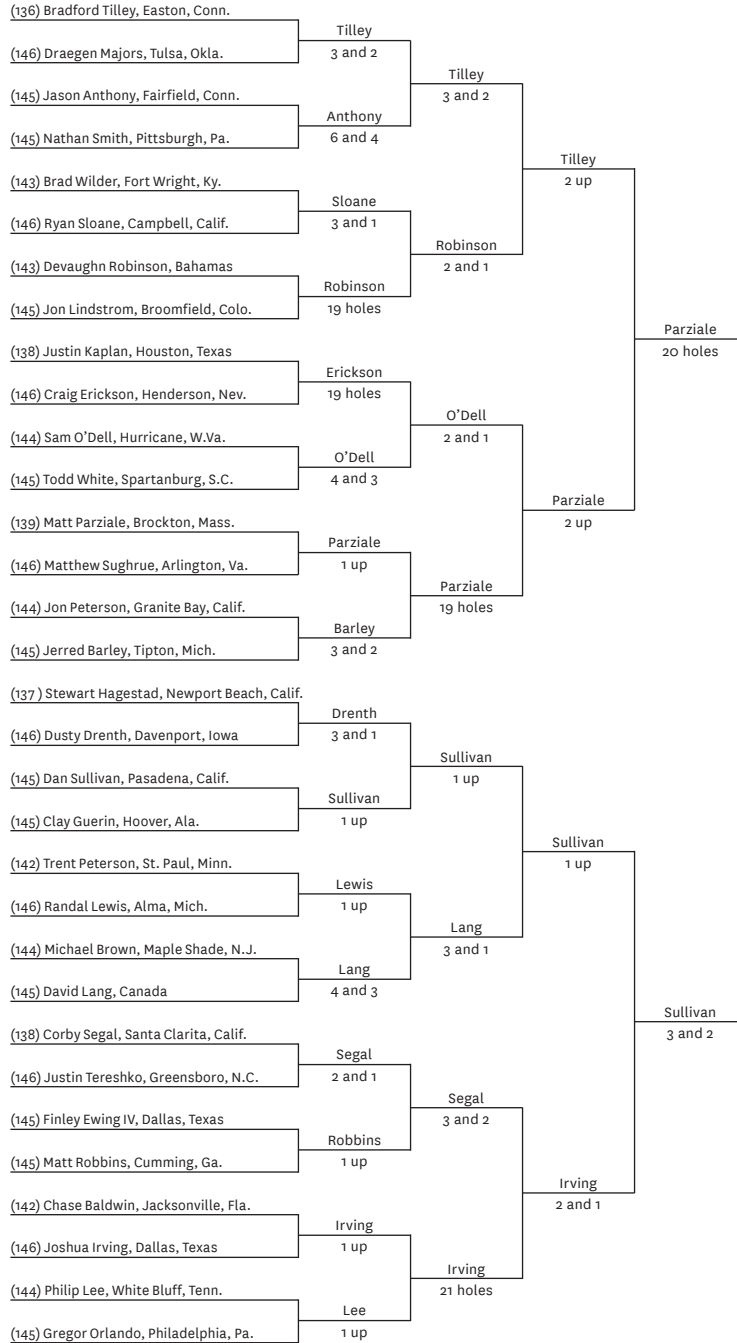
Parziale, who had never won a match in three previous U.S. Mid-Amateur appearances, enjoyed quite a week at Capital City Club. Not only did he finally advance in the bracket, but in the quarterfinals on Thursday, he rallied from 5 down with eight to play to beat medalist Bradford Tilley in 20 holes. He followed with a 5-and-4 win over 2016 semifinalist Dan Sullivan.

Now he's about to embark on a dream-like season. His 2018 schedule will not only include the U.S. Open, but a likely invitation to next April's Masters Tournament. He also is exempt into the next two U.S. Amateurs. The 118th U.S. Amateur is set for Aug. 13-19 at Pebble Beach (Calif.) Golf Links and Spyglass Hill.

“It'll be tough [to get time off],” said Parziale. “But we'll make next year work.”

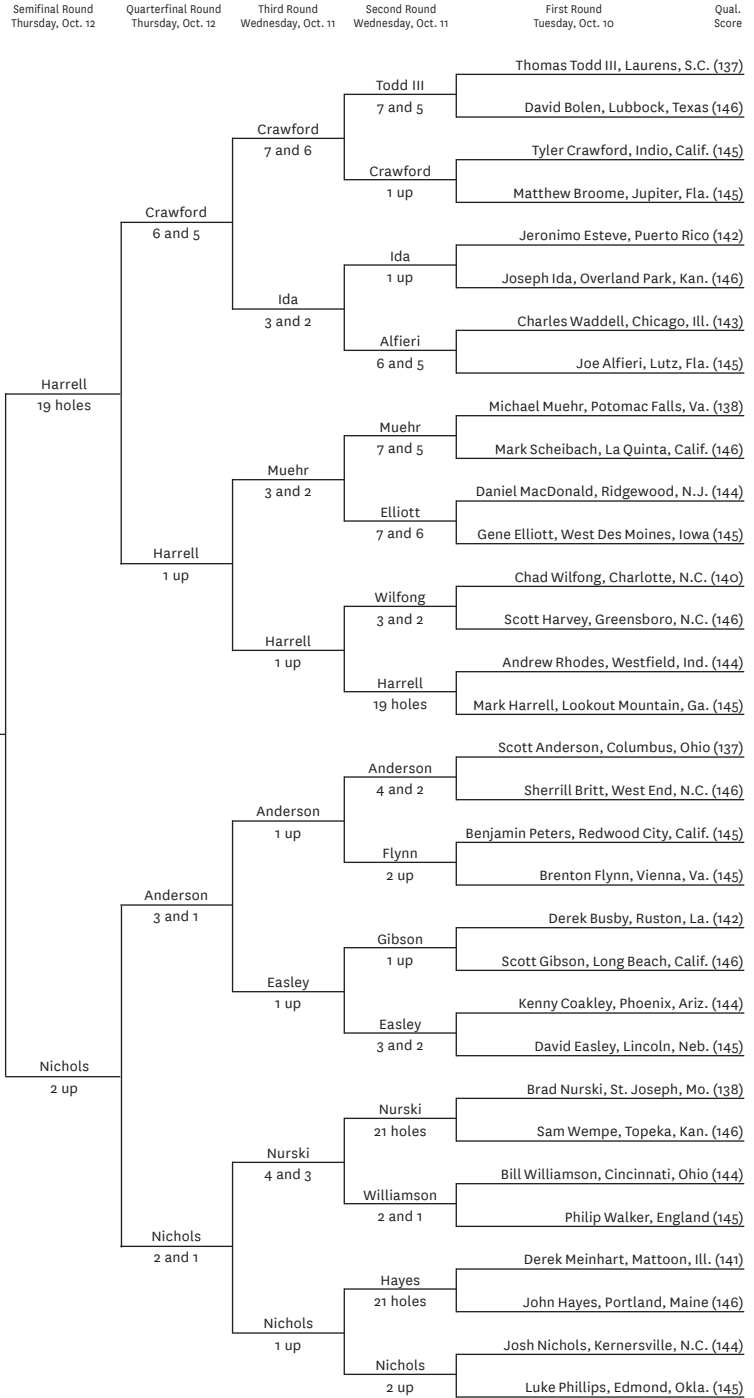

Championship History

In 1981, the USGA inaugurated its first new championship for amateurs in 19 years, the U.S. Mid-Amateur. The Mid-Amateur, for amateur golfers of at least 25 years of age, provides a formal national championship for the post-college amateur, for whom the game is truly an avocation.

Before the arrival of the Mid-Amateur, the post-collegiate player could compete in the Amateur Championship, sometimes successfully, but these older amateurs faced greater odds. While they fit their golf around their work and families, they were most often competing against college golfers, for whom the game is close to a full-time activity.

Only about 40 percent of those who qualify for the U.S. Amateur each year are at least 25, although several have been quite successful. For example, Bob Lewis Jr., then 35, reached the Amateur final in 1980, and the semifinals in 1981 and 1986. Jay Sigel won consecutive Amateur titles in 1982 and 1983 (at ages 38 and 39, respectively), and then added the Mid-Amateur title in 1983, 1985 and 1987. In 1986, Buddy Alexander, 33, a reinstated amateur, won the U.S. Amateur and in 1993, 41-year-old John Harris won the Amateur. Harris remains the last mid-amateur to win the U.S. Amateur.

In general, however, most post-collegiate amateurs found themselves at a disadvantage competing against college golfers. Thus, the Mid-Amateur Championship was born.

Played at the Bellerive Country Club in St. Louis, the first Mid-Amateur drew 1,638 entries in 1981. The field included three former Amateur champions: Gary Cowan (1966, 1971), Marvin "Vinny" Giles III (1972) and Fred Ridley (1975). Jim Holtgrieve, 33, of Des Peres, Mo., defeated fellow Walker Cup Team member Bob Lewis Jr., 37, of Warren, Ohio, in the final, 2 up. Holtgrieve and Lewis each later captained a pair of USA Walker Cup Teams.

Nathan Smith is the only four-time U.S. Mid-Amateur champion. He won his first title in 2003 after his opponent, Bryan Norton, withdrew due to injury after nine holes. Smith took

back-to-back victories in 2009 and 2010, and won his fourth title in 2012, becoming just the 15th person to win the same USGA championship on at least four occasions.

In 1983, Sigel became the first golfer in 53 years to win two USGA championships in the same year when he added the Mid-Amateur Championship to the U.S. Amateur he had won just 32 days earlier. Sigel became the Mid-Amateur's first two-time winner when he again captured the championship in 1985. Sigel won his third Mid-Amateur in 1987. Combined with his two U.S. Amateur titles (1982, 1983), Sigel won five USGA championships.

In 1987's first qualifying round, Don Bliss made holes-in-one on the eighth and 10th holes at Brook Hollow Golf Club in Dallas, Texas. Bliss is the only player to score two holes-in-one in one round of a USGA championship.

The U.S. Mid-Amateur Championship has continued to grow in popularity and in 1989 topped 3,000 entries for the first time. In its short history, the championship's unique age qualification has inspired similar tournaments throughout the country and there are now Mid-Amateur events in nearly every state. The Mid-Amateur also has helped several players earn berths to the USA Walker Cup Team. Sigel, Smith, Jackson, Scott Harvey, Todd White, Danny Green, Zahringer and William Hoffer are among those selected to represent their country off the strength of performances in the Mid-Amateur.

For the first time in USGA championship history, two courses were used in a 36-championship match in the 2016 final between Stewart Hagestad and Scott Harvey. The match at Stonewall, in Elverson, Pa., started with 18 holes on the par-70, 6,711-yard North Course, while the second 18 was played on the par-70, 6,870-yard Old Course.

In 2017, the U.S. Mid-Amateur champion received a full exemption from qualifying into the following year's U.S. Open field. Matt Parziale, a firefighter from Brockton, Mass., became the first player to earn that exemption.
