

(33rd overall) after qualifying through sectional play ... for the first time in history, Colombia was represented in the U.S. Open, by Camillo Villegas and Oscar Alvarez ... 20-year-old amateur Spencer Levin recorded the 38th known hole-in-one in U.S. Open history with an 8-iron on the 17th hole during the first round ... Jay and Bill Haas became the second father-son duo to make the cut in the U.S. Open, matching the feat first completed by Joe and Joe Jr. Kirkwood in 1948 ... the fourth round pairing of Ernie Els and Retief Goosen marked the first time since 1972 (Lee Trevino and Jack Nicklaus) that two former U.S. Open champions played together in the final group of the fourth round ... Levin (T-13th) recorded the best finish by an amateur in the U.S. Open since Jim Simons (T-5th) in 1971 ... for the first time since 1963 at The Country Club (Brookline, Mass.), no player broke par in the final round ... the final round scoring average of 78.7 was the second highest since World War II, trailing Pebble Beach (78.8) in 1972 ... in claiming his second U.S. Open title, Retief Goosen became the 21st player in history with multiple U.S. Open victories ... for the fourth time in 11 years, the U.S. Open was won by a South African (Ernie Els, 1994 and 1997; Goosen, 2001 and 2004).

Championship History

On Oct. 4, 1895, the first U.S. Open Championship was conducted by the United States Golf Association on the nine-hole course of Newport (R.I.) Golf and Country Club.

The first U.S. Open was considered something of a sideshow to the first U.S. Amateur, which was played on the same course and during the same week. Both championships had been scheduled for September but were postponed because of a conflict with a more established Newport sports spectacle, the America's Cup yacht races.

Ten professionals and one amateur started in the 36-hole competition, which was four trips around the Newport course in one day. The surprise winner was Horace Rawlins, 21, an English professional who was the assistant at the host course. Rawlins scored 91-82—173 with the gutta-percha ball.
