No state is more steeped in USGA championship history or U.S. Women's Open history than Pennsylvania, and we are thrilled to add Lancaster Country Club to the impressive stable of courses to host a USGA championship.

This is the 83rd USGA championship and ninth U.S. Women's Open contested in Pennsylvania, both of which are records. Mickey Wright, one of the pioneers of women's golf, won the second of her four Women's Opens in 1959 at Churchill Valley Country Club in Pittsburgh. Eight-time USGA champion JoAnne Gunderson Carner won both of her Women's Opens on Pennsylvania soil: in 1971 at the Kahkwa Club in Erie, and in 1976 at Rolling Green Golf Club in Springfield. Patty Sheehan won the first of her Women's Opens in 1992 at Oakmont Country Club. Pennsylvania hosted consecutive Women's Opens in 2009 and 2010, with Eun-Hee Ji and Paula Creamer winning at Saucon Valley Country Club and Oakmont, respectively.

Lancaster Country Club's William S. Flynn design promises to create an exciting championship and further the growing popularity of women's golf. Lucy Li qualifying and competing with the best players in the world at 11 years of age, as well as Michelle Wie's first Women's Open victory, inspired present and future generations of female golfers last year at Pinehurst No. 2. As evidenced by last year's record number of entries, women's golf is on an uptick. We are excited to see the game take the next step forward at Lancaster Country Club. The support from the local community, without which this championship could not be successful, has been tremendous since the outset. On behalf of the USGA volunteers and staff, thank you for your efforts. Thank you to the spectators joining us this week and good luck to the competitors. We hope everyone's experience is an enjoyable one!

ABOUT THE UNITED STATES GOLF ASSOCIATION

ABOUT THE U.S. WOMEN'S OPEN

The U.S. Women's Open was added to the United States Golf Association's roster of championships in 1953, 58 years after the first U.S. Women's Amateur. The reason for the USGA's relatively late assumption of the Women's Open is simple: women's professional golf is fairly new. When Opal Hill turned professional in 1938, she and Helen Hicks were two of the very few women golf professionals in the world. Unlike the other 12 national championships conducted by the USGA, the Women's Open was created by another organization. In 1946, the short-lived Women's Professional Golfers Association introduced the Women's Open at match play at Spokane (Wash.) Country Club. The first Women's Open was the only one conducted at match play. Patty Berg won the 36-hole qualifying medal in 1946, and then won the championship by defeating Betty Jameson, 5 and 4, in the 36-hole final.

In its 70-year history, the U.S. Women's Open has reigned as the world's greatest women's championship, attracting steadily increasing numbers of entries and spectators. Whereas only 37 contestants played in 1953, in 1976 the field jumped to 205 players and sectional qualifying was introduced. In 2001, a then-record 980 contestants entered. A four-day attendance record of 41,200 was set in 1979 at Brooklawn Country Club in Fairfield, Conn. At the 50th Women's Open, in 1995, that record was more than doubled at The Broadmoor Golf Club in Colorado Springs, Colo.

In recent years, the U.S. Women's Open has truly become the world arena of women's golf, with entries having topped the 1,000 mark every year since 2004. Since 1990, 13 championships have been won by foreign-born players, while only three of the first 41 champions were foreign-born. The emergence of the Women's Open as a great international contest came in 1987, when England's Laura Davies prevailed in an 18-hole playoff against Japan's Ayako Okamoto and JoAnne Gunderson Carner of the United States. Another foreign-born player, Annika Sorenstam, of Sweden, established the 72-hole scoring record of 8-under-par 272 at Pine Needles Lodge & Golf Club in 1996. Juli Inkster matched that 72-hole score of 272, also setting a record in relation to par at 16 under, in 1999.

SCHEDULE OF EVENTS

All times are EDT and schedules are subject to change. Starting times will be posted when available at www.uswomensopen.com.

PRACTICE ROUNDS

Players will have the option of starting practice rounds at the first or 10th tee. Players electing to play a full round generally begin between 7 a.m. and 3 p.m. It is typical for players to be on the golf course or practice areas until at least 7 p.m.

Monday, July 6 (Gates open 6:30 a.m. to 8 p.m.)

CHAMPIONSHIP ROUNDS 1 AND 2

Play is scheduled to begin at 7 a.m. from both the first and 10th tees. The last group will begin play at approximately 2:40 p.m. from the first and 10th tees.

Thursday, July 9 (First Round)

(Gates open 6:30 a.m. to conclusion of play)

Friday, July 10 (Second Round)

(Gates open 6:30 a.m. to conclusion of play)

CHAMPIONSHIP ROUNDS 3 AND 4

The first starting time will be determined by the number of players who make the cut at the conclusion of the second round (60 lowest scorers and anyone tying for 60th place). Generally, the first pairing begins play from the first tee between 7:30-8 a.m.; the last pairing for both days will start from the first tee at approximately 2:30 p.m.

Saturday, July 11 / Third Round

Gates open 7 a.m. to conclusion of play

Sunday, July 12 / Final Round Gates open 7 a.m. to conclusion of play

PLAYOFF

In case of a tie after 72 holes, a three-hole aggregate playoff will immediately follow. If this playoff results in a tie, the tied players will immediately continue to play off hole-by-hole until the winner is determined.

SPECTATOR GENERAL INFORMATION

ADMISSION SALES AND WILL CALL

The Admission Sales and Will Call Office will be located immediately outside the Main Spectator Admissions Gate at Lancaster Country Club. This office will provide daily Junior complimentary tickets for children 17 years of age and younger. Spectators may also drop-off and pick-up tickets for other guests. Photo identification will be required to pick-up any tickets left at the Admissions Sales and Will Call Office. Vehicles cannot access this on-site office facility at any time.

ATMs

Limited availability of ATMs will be located on-site. Please see the course map located on the daily groupings and starting times sheets and on signage boards for exact locations.

AUTOGRAPHS

Spectators should keep in mind that the players' first responsibility is to compete for the national championship. For this reason, a no-autograph policy is in effect on course throughout championship week. Spectators should not approach any player for an autograph from the time a player is en route to her first tee until the completion of the player's round. This policy applies to practice rounds as well as championship rounds.

CORPORATE HOSPITALITY

The USGA provides a range of hospitality facilities for on-site corporate entertaining. Only the specific credential for each corporate hospitality location provides access to the facility. Children will also need the specific corporate hospitality credential to gain access into the corporate hospitality facilities since regular Junior tickets do not provide access. Daily Junior tickets will be granted access to the upgraded 1761 Club Experience with a properly credentialed adult.

DISABLED SPECTATORS

The USGA is committed to providing a positive and user-friendly experience for all spectators with disabilities and is pleased to provide the following services:

- Assigned accessible paved parking location for all vehicles having appropriate HD/DP license plates or placards. Lift accessible ADA parking and transportation services will be provided from the Burle Business Park. Please see additional Parking and Transportation section of this guide.

- Our Disabled Services Committee will be on-site to assist disabled spectators with transportation to and from Disabled Services Headquarters (located just inside the Main Spectator Admissions Gate), and specific grandstand locations and facilities throughout the golf course via multi-person golf carts.

A number of motorized scooters will be available at the Disabled Services Headquarters located just inside the Main Spectator Admission Gate for spectators with disabilities on a first-come, first-served basis, compliments of the USGA and Pride Mobility.

Accessible restrooms will be available at portable restroom locations throughout the championship grounds.

Select concessions, merchandise tents and spectator experience areas will be accessible.

FIRST-AID STATIONS

First-aid stations will be located just inside the Main Spectator Admission Gate and at a second location out on the championship course. Please see the course map located on the daily groupings and starting times sheets and on signage boards for exact locations.

All first-aid stations will be staffed with emergency medical technicians and will serve as cooling station in the event of extreme heat. Complementary water will be provided in all first-aid stations. If a medical emergency arises, please notify a volunteer or USGA official.

FOOD AND BEVERAGE SERVICE

There will be multiple concession and beverage stands located throughout the championship. Please see the course map located on the daily groupings and starting times sheets and on signage boards for exact locations.

FOOTWEAR

It is highly recommended that all spectators wear soft-spiked golf shoes or well-supported comfortable shoes (such as sneakers) with good bottom treads. Though Lancaster Country Club has a network of paved cart paths located throughout the venue from which to enjoy the championship, there are also many natural viewing areas off the cart paths where soft-spiked golf shoes or well-supported comfortable (such as sneakers) shoes with good bottom treads will help in traversing the grounds.

GRANDSTANDS

More than 5,000 grandstand seats will be located at strategic viewing areas throughout the course and practice range. Access to the grandstands is subject to applicable USGA policies, which will be posted at the entrance points to each grandstand. Seating is provided on a first-come, first-served basis unless otherwise designated.

JUNIOR TICKETS

Juniors age 17 and under receive complimentary tickets, on any day, when accompanied by a valid adult ticket or credential holder. Junior tickets are always available at the Admission Sales and Will Call office just outside the Main Spectator Admissions Gate.

Please note that Junior tickets provide access to the

1761 Club when accompanied by an adult 1761 Club ticket holder, but do not provide access into any USGA corporate hospitality facilities.

LOST AND FOUND/MISSING PERSONS

Any lost and found items or missing persons will be taken to 2015 U.S. Women's Open's Championship Office located in the east lower clubhouse paved parking lot behind the ninth green. Please remember to always designate a place to meet if you get separated from your companion(s)

MAIN SPECTATOR ADMISSIONS GATE "CHAMPIONSHIP CENTER"

We invite all spectators to explore and enjoy the many interactive, shopping, and dining experiences within the Championship Center just inside the Main Spectator Admission Gate. There, you will find our Main Merchandise Pavilion, the Lexus Performance Drive Pavilion and the Wellness Pavilion, along with concessions stands and video boards, which will display broadcast coverage of the championships along with up-to-the-moment scoring information.

MERCHANDISE PAVILION

The Main Merchandise Pavilion will be located just inside the Main Spectator Admissions Gate. A variety of merchandise bearing U.S. Women's Open Championships logos will be available for purchase, including caps, golf shirts, T-shirts, jackets, lanyards, lapel pins, golf balls, repair tools, ball markers, towels and much, much more. Acceptable forms of payment are U.S. dollars, traveler's checks, American Express, MasterCard, Visa credit and debit cards. Personal checks are not accepted. There will be one Satellite Merchandise Facility adjacent to the 1761 Club and 16th tee.

SPECTATOR SAFETY, HELPFUL TIPS AND ETIQUETTE

If you observe the following guidelines, your experience at the U.S. Women's Open Championship will be a more enjoyable one:

- Please stay behind gallery ropes and follow directions of championship marshals at all times.
- Do not cross fairways except at designated crosswalk areas.
- Be considerate of others and kneel or sit if you are in the front row of the gallery.
- Stay quiet and stand still when players are about to hit or when instructed by marshals.
- To ensure your safety at all times, walk carefully and never run.
- The championship involves substantial walking on grassy hills, dirt paths and other uneven surfaces.
- Please wear appropriate footwear such as soft-spiked golf shoes and/or sneakers with good tread.
- Drink plenty of fluids to prevent dehydration.
- Be prepared for the possibility of rain, and check local weather prior to departing for the event.
- Always designate a place to meet if you get separated from your companion(s).

Spectators will be subject to expulsion and the loss of credential privileges for any of the following breaches of etiquette:

- Making rude, vulgar or other inappropriate comments or gestures.
- Verbal or physical harassment of players, volunteers, officials, or spectators.
- Distracting a player or any disruption of play.
- Behavior that is unruly, disruptive, unsafe or illegal in nature.
- Failing to follow the instructions of championship officials, volunteers or security personnel.

WEATHER

Lancaster, Pa., has a humid continental climate with hot summers and no dry season. The average daily high temperature is above 75 degrees, with the hottest day of the year in and around July 15, with an average high of 85 degrees and low of 66 degrees. Please remember to apply a proper amount of sunscreen, sun-protection clothing including hats, wear sunglasses and stay hydrated.



The USGA will have a meteorology staff on-site monitoring the possibility of dangerous or inclement weather. If hazardous weather

conditions are approaching, special “weather warning” signs such as the one above will be posted on leader boards around the course. When the sign appears, spectators are advised to take immediate precautions (including clearing grandstands) PRIOR to play being suspended. In the event of a weather warning, please avoid open areas, hilltops, high places, isolated trees, golf carts and wire fences. If play is suspended, indicated by one prolonged air-horn blast, please close your umbrella and seek shelter. In the event of a suspension of play, grandstands will be cleared immediately. Please note that play will resume as soon as conditions allow.

2016 U.S. WOMEN'S OPEN

Next year's U.S. Women's Open Championship will be conducted from July 7-10 at CordeValle in San Martin, Calif. Tucked away along the inland foothills of the Santa Cruz Mountains in a California wine region, CordeValle lies just 30 minutes south of San Jose and 45 minutes north of Pebble Beach.

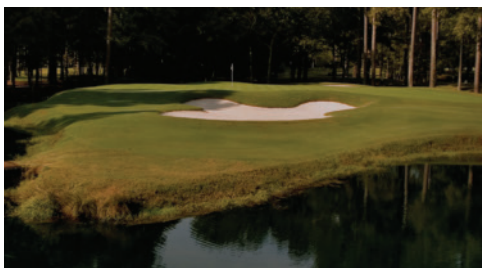
2017 U.S. WOMEN'S OPEN

SPECTATOR DRIVING AND PARKING DIRECTIONS

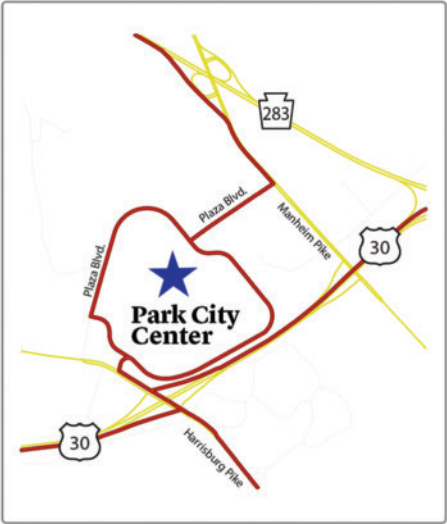
Complimentary parking and shuttle transportation will be provided to and from Lancaster Country Club for all spectators. For the week of the U.S. Women's Open Championship (July 6-12), all general spectators traveling by car who have not received a specific parking lot permit should follow instructions to Park City Mall in Lancaster, Pa. General ticket holders are encouraged to carpool as much as possible.

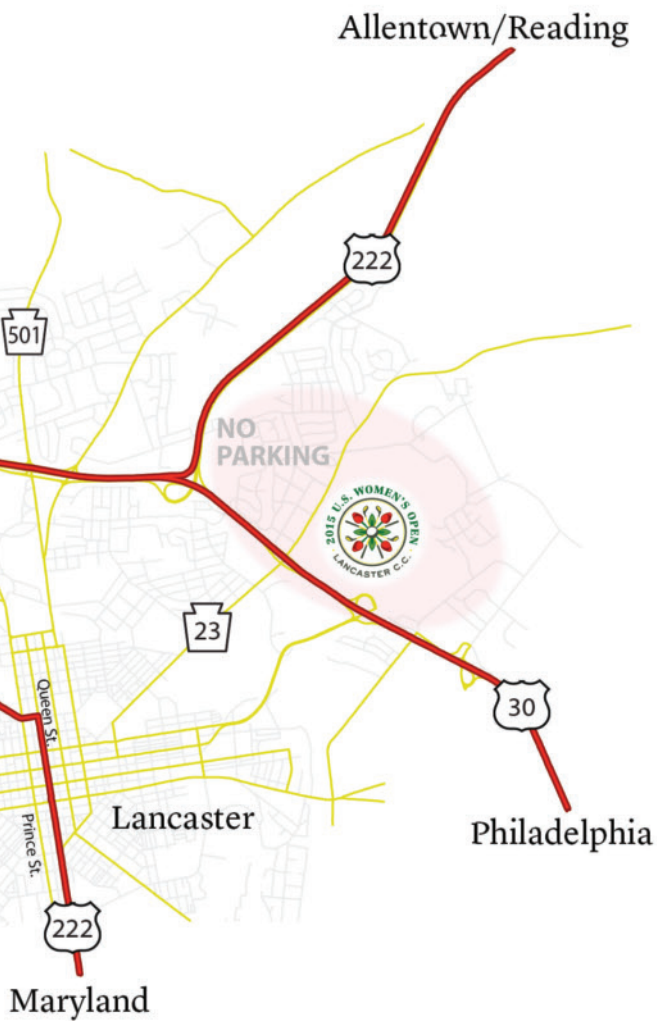
Shuttles will run continuously beginning at 6 a.m. on Monday, July 6, through Friday, July 10, and beginning at 6:30 a.m. on Saturday, July 11, and Sunday, July 12.

For disabled spectators, hard service parking will be available at Park City Mall. Lift accessible ADA parking and transportation services will be provided from the Burle Business Park. Vehicles having valid HD/DP license plates or placards are only allowed at the Burle Business Park. For additional questions, contact the Women's Open Championship Office by phone at 717-406-3654 during normal business hours, Monday through Friday, or by email at info@2015uswomensopen.com.

All other championship parking is by parking pass only. There is no spectator or disabled parking in the immediate vicinity of Lancaster Country Club. Parking restrictions surrounding the championship grounds and in the immediate neighborhoods surrounding the club will be closely monitored and enforced. Due to the daily daylight closure of Route 23 (New Holland Pike), there will be no spectator walking traffic on Route 23 (New Holland Pike) from either northbound and/or southbound Route 23.

From points West (York)

- Follow US Route 30 East to the Harrisburg Pike Exit
- Turn Left onto Harrisburg Pike and follow for 0.2 miles
- Turn Right into Park City Center at traffic signal just before Longhorn Steakhouse

From points Northwest (Harrisburg)

- Follow PA Route 283 East to Manheim Pike (PA Route 72) Exit
- Turn Right onto Manheim Pike and follow for 0.2 miles
- Turn Right onto Plaza Boulevard and follow for 0.3 miles to Park City Center

From points Northeast (Allentown/Reading)

- Follow US Route 222 South to US Route 30 West Exit (toward York and Harrisburg)
- Merge onto US Route 30 West and follow overhead signs for US Route 30 West (toward York) for 2.6 miles
- Exit US Route 30 at Harrisburg Pike Exit
- Stay in far right lane on exit ramp (to Park City)
- Follow Park City lane along Harrisburg Pike for 0.1 miles into Park City Center

From points East (Philadelphia)

- Follow US Route 30 West to US Route 30/PA Route 462 split
- Veer Right onto US Route 30 West (toward York)
- Merge onto US Route 30 West and follow overhead signs for US Route 30 West (toward York) for 6.5 miles
- Exit US Route 30 at Harrisburg Pike Exit
- Stay in far right lane on exit ramp (to Park City)
- Follow Park City lane along Harrisburg Pike for 0.1 miles into Park City Center

From points South (Maryland)

- Follow US Route 222 North into City of Lancaster to town square at King Street
- Continue on US Route 222 North (Queen Street) for 0.5 miles
- Turn Left onto East James Street and follow for 0.1 miles to North Prince Street
- Continue through traffic signal at North Prince Street where East James Street becomes Harrisburg Pike
- Continue on Harrisburg Pike 2.2 miles
- Turn Right into Park City Center at traffic signal just before Longhorn Steakhouse

COMING BY AMTRAK / SOUTH CENTRAL TRANSIT AUTHORITY / DOWNTOWN LANCASTER PARKING AUTHORITY

Additional information will be available in the coming weeks for spectators traveling to the championship via Amtrak, the South Central Transit Authority (Red Rose Transit) in partnership with the Lancaster Parking Authority in downtown Lancaster. Information will be emailed to all spectators and made available on both www.uswomensopen.com and www.2015uswomensopen.com in early June.

PASSENGER, TAXI OR LIMOUSINE DROP-OFF

There will be no passenger, taxi and/or limousine drop-offs or pick-ups in the immediate vicinity of Lancaster Country Club. Passenger, taxi and/or limousine drop-offs or pick-ups are recommended to go to Park City Mall or another Lancaster destinations to take advantage of public shuttle transportation to and from the championship.

MOBILE DEVICE POLICY

Spectators may carry mobile devices smaller than 7" in length and/or height including cellphones, smartphones and PDAs. All device volume controls must be set to "silent" or "vibrate" at all times. Devices must not be in sight near any rope-lines. Phone calls must be received or placed only in designated "Phone Zones" located around the golf course. Phone calls must not be received or placed in any area that may disrupt play including grandstands. Use of approved devices for photographs must fall within the photography policy. Video and audio recording are not permitted at any time with any device. Testing and email are permissible throughout all areas of the golf course but should NOT disrupt players. Video and audio recording are not permitted at any time with any device. Violation may result in the confiscation of mobile device or removal from the championship. PHOTOGRAPHY POLICY

Stand-alone cameras may only be brought and mobile device camera features may only be used during practice rounds (Monday through Wednesday) and only for personal photographic use. No camera cases are allowed. No photography is permitted in the presence of a player from the time she addresses the ball until the completion of her swing (i.e., when a marshal's arms are raised). Video and audio recording are not permitted at any time with any device. Violation may result in the confiscation of mobile device or removal from the championship. SECURITY AND PROHIBITED ITEMS POLICY

We appreciate your patience and cooperation with all the U.S. Women's Open security procedures. Spectators and other championship attendees will go through security screening prior to entering the championship grounds and will not be allowed to bring any of the items listed below. To expedite admissions into the championship, it is recommended that all prohibited items be safely stowed prior to arriving at the championship. PLEASE BE SURE TO READ THE FOLLOWING LIST OF PROHIBITED ITEMS CAREFULLY:

- No Weapons (regardless of permit, including but not limited to firearms or knives)
- No Explosives and/or Fireworks of any kind
- No Tablets and/or Computers (cellular mobile devices less than 7" are permitted)
- No Noise Producing Devices (including portable speakers)
- No Cameras (other than Monday through Wednesday for personal photographic use)

Note: Use of cameras and mobile device camera features must follow the photography policy.

- No Video and/or Audio Recording at any time with any device
- No Backpacks, Briefcases and/or Bags larger than 6"W x 6"H x 6"D in their natural state

Note: Transparent/clear plastic hand and shoulder bags no larger than 12”W x 12”H x 6” D are permitted

- No Pets (other than service animals assisting disabled individuals)
- No Lawn Chairs and/or Oversized Chairs with Arms (compact chairs without arms are permitted with no case)
- No Ladders and/or Step Stools or other similar items
- No Bicycles allowed inside admission areas or on the championship grounds
- No Metal-Spiked Golf Shoes
- No other items deemed unlawful, dangerous or disruptive by the USGA and/or Championship Security Personnel, in their sole discretion.

Note: The USGA reserves the right to amend the list of Prohibited Items at any time to provide a safe and secure championship
