## 2011 Conditions of Play

### Entries

Open to female amateur golfers who, since Jan. 1, 2011, have been bona fide public-course players and have not held privileges of any course that does not extend playing privileges to the general public, or privileges of any private club maintaining its own course, and have a USGA Handicap Index not exceeding 18.4. A bona fide public-course player may hold incidental privileges of a course not open to the public when such privileges are provided by (1) an educational institution at which she is a student, or (2) a federal armed service of which she is a member or retired member, or (3) an industry by which she is employed or retired. Entries close May 11.

- Monday, June 27 — First round, stroke play (18 holes)
  - Tuesday, June 28 — Second round, stroke play (18 holes)
- After 36 holes, the field will be cut to the low 64 scorers, who will advance to match play.

  - Thursday, June 30 — Second round, match play (18 holes); Third round, match play (18 holes)
  - Friday, July 1 — Quarterfinals, match play (18 holes); Semifinals, match play (18 holes)

## Tubert Wins the 2010 Championship

Emily Tubert, 18, of Burbank, Calif., defeated Lisa McCloskey, 18, of Houston, 3 and 2, to win the 2010 U.S. Women's Amateur Public Links Championship at the 6,092-yard, par-71 Warren Golf Course at Notre Dame in Notre Dame, Ind.

In a stretch of seven holes, Tubert made five birdies and won the sixth through the 12th holes, establishing an insurmountable 5-up lead over McCloskey. It was Tubert's first victory in a national championship and the first time she had made the match-play rounds.

An incoming freshman at the University of Arkansas, Tubert had the advantage of greater length than McCloskey, who transferred from Pepperdine University to the University of Southern California. Tubert's tee shots averaged some 40 yards longer than McCloskey's. She used 9-irons and wedges for most of her approach shots while McCloskey was forced to use longer clubs.

McCloskey was 2 up when Tubert's run started. Tubert chipped in for a birdie to win the sixth hole, then squared the match at the seventh with a par. Her par at the eighth gave Tubert a 1-up lead. On the par-3 ninth, she rolled in an 18-footer for another birdie to go 2 up.

The 490-yard, par-5 10th hole was reachable in two shots for Tubert throughout the championship. After a big tee shot at the 10th, she went for the green from 200 yards away and her ball rolled to the fringe, 40 feet from the hole. She nearly made the eagle putt, but a conceded birdie gave her a 3-up lead.

At the par-3 11th, Tubert made a birdie to go 4 up. On the 404-yard 12th, the longest par-4 on the course, Tubert hit an 8-iron to within 5 feet of the hole on her approach shot. She made her fourth birdie in a row and won her sixth straight hole to go 5 up.

McCloskey was four holes down after 18, but rallied with a birdie at the 21st to reduce the deficit to three holes before Tubert started another run, winning the 22nd and 23rd holes with birdies. Her winning par at the 24th hole gave her a 6-up lead.

McCloskey made birdie putts at the 25th and 27th to cut into Tubert's lead, but Tubert again birdied the 10th, the 28th hole of the match, and the margin increased to 5 up with eight holes to play.

Tubert was dormie-four at the 33rd but McCloskey made yet another winning birdie putt. Both players parred the par-4 34th hole and Tubert won the match and the championship by a 3-and-2 margin.

In the semifinals, Tubert defeated Sara Grantham, of Wilsonville, Ala., on the 19th hole. McCloskey defeated Ellen Mueller, of Bartlesville, Okla., 3 and 2.

Fourteen-year-old Ariya Jutanugarn, of Thailand, was medalist when she shot 68-67-135 in stroke-play qualifying. Her total tied the record qualifying score of 135 set by Brittany Lang in 2004.

## 2010 Championship Notes

### Leaders

Round 1 — Kimberly Kim at 5-under-par 66, by one stroke over Stephanie Kono. Round 2 — Ariya Jutanugarn was medalist at 7-under-par 135, by two strokes over Martina Gavier.

### Cut

At 10-over-par 152, with an 8-for-3 playoff that last two holes for the remaining match-play spots.

### Weather

Scattered thunderstorms caused suspensions of play on Monday, Wednesday and Saturday and were accompanied by high winds. Play resumed in pleasant weather for Saturday's final. Tuesday, Thursday and Friday were generally sunny to partly cloudy with pleasant temperatures and light breezes.

### Notes

Medalist Ariya Jutanugarn, 14, and her 15-year-old sister, Moriya, both qualified for match play. Residents of Thailand, they were in the USA for extended competition. Their father, Somboon, caddied for Ariya and their mother, Narumon, caddied for Moriya ... Cydney Clanton was the lone 2010 USA Curtis Cup Team member to advance to the quarterfinals. She defeated Ariya Jutanugarn in the third round and then lost to Sara Grantham, 1 up ... Grantham was the championship's "giant killer." She admitted to being 5 feet tall, "on a good day," but defeated longer-hitting opponents in advancing to the semifinals, where she lost to Emily Tubert, the eventual champion, on the 19th hole ... Martina Gavier, the second-low qualifier, had a severe case of jet-lag. Gavier made a 26-hour flight from Argentina to South Bend, with stops in Chile, Miami, Charlotte and Cleveland ... Kimberly Kim, two-time

USA Curtis Cup Team member, announced she was turning professional prior to the start of the 2010 U.S. Women's Open. Kim became the youngest U.S. Women's Amateur champion in history when she won the title in 2006 at the age of 14. She was runner-up in the WAPL in 2006 and 2009 ... Becca Huffer was an incoming junior at nearby Notre Dame University ... Sue Nyhus, at 47 one of the championship's older contestants, was runner-up in the 1999 WAPL ... Tubert was prom queen and quarterback of the powder puff football team at Burrough High School in her hometown of Burbank, Calif. ... Tubert's father, Marcelo Tubert, an actor, caddied for his daughter throughout the championship ... Runner-up Lisa McCloskey had Tyler Stricker, 18, of South Bend, as her caddie. Stricker, a member of his high school golf team, was a volunteer caddie.

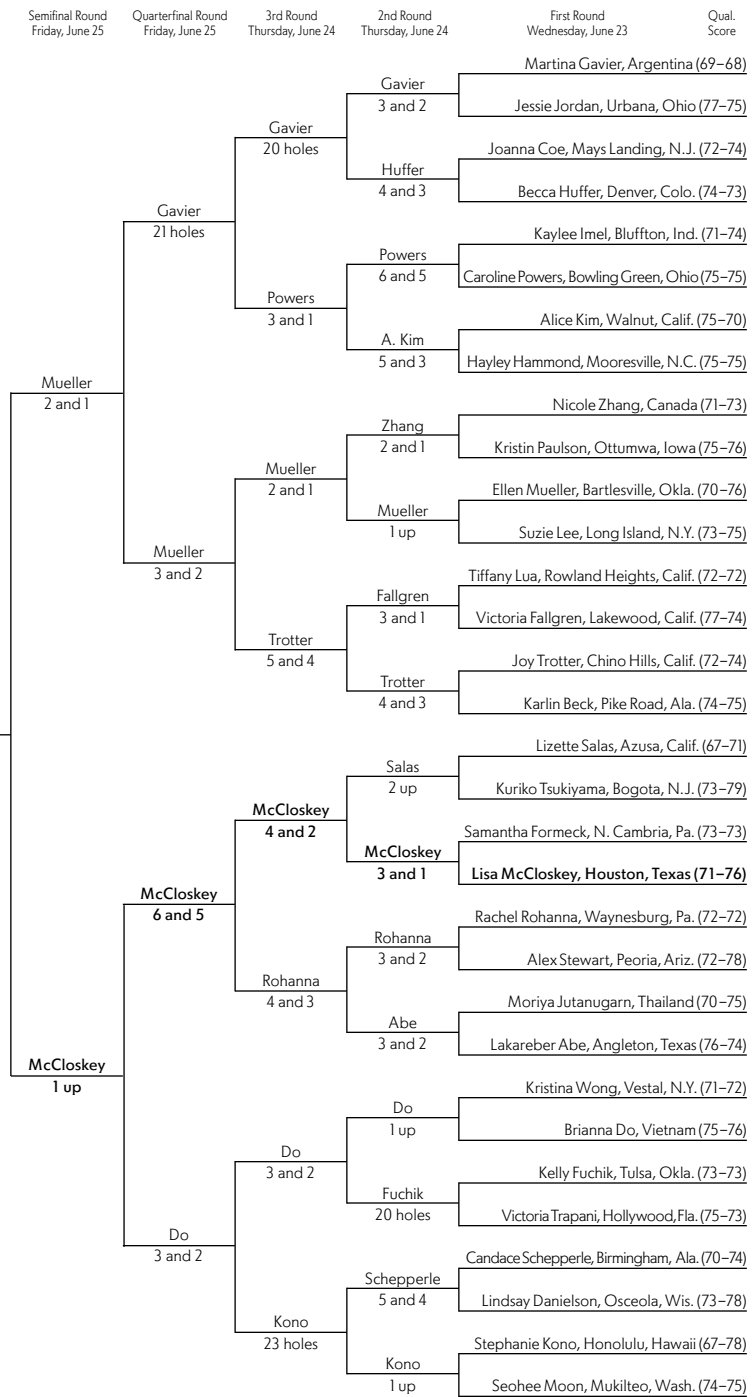

## Championship History

In April 1977, when entries for the first U.S. Women's Amateur Public Links Championship began to trickle in, there was concern.

Would the first national championship ever staged for women who play the country's public courses attract enough players to fill the field? Did it justify the effort to set up 27 qualifying sites around the country?

By May, the trickle of entries had become a steady stream. When the June deadline for entries arrived and the results were tallied, the astonishing reality was that this championship had attracted a field of 686 players — more than the combined fields of the 1977 Women's Amateur, Women's Open, Senior Women's Amateur and Girls' Junior.

The entry figure was amazing for several reasons. First, this was a new championship that would need time to build interest. Second, some states didn't even have organizations to assist women public-course players, conduct sectional qualifying or raise funds, and the 686 entries were drawn from only 24 states.

The 1977 championship was played on the East Course of Yahara Hills Golf Course in Madison, Wis. Kelly Fuiks, 19, of Phoenix, Ariz., was the first champion. In fact, for the first four years, the championship was the personal property of two outstanding players. Fuiks won again in 1978 before turning professional. Lori Castillo won in 1979 and 1980, and at one time held or shared every individual record in the championship. Castillo won 11 consecutive matches before losing in the second round in 1981.

The championship received a boost when Castillo was selected as a member of the 1980 USA Curtis Cup Team. By that year, the Women's Amateur Public Links was regarded as a highly competitive arena for some of the best amateurs in the country. Since then, Heather Farr, Danielle Ammaccapane, Cindy Schreyer, Tracy Kerdyk, Pearl Sinn, Tracy Hanson, Amy Fruhwirth, Jill McGill, Jo Jo Robertson, Annie Thurman (Young), Michelle Wie, Tiffany Joh, Mina Harigae and Jennifer Song, all WAPL champions, also have been named to Curtis Cup Teams.

Pearl Sinn accomplished a unique double in 1988 when she won the Women's Amateur as well as the Women's Amateur Public Links. When she repeated as WAPL champion in 1989, she and Curtis Strange, who won the U.S. Open, were the only two to repeat as USGA champions that year. Jennifer Song also won both titles in 2009.

McGill also achieved the double win. She was the holder of the 1993 U.S. Women's Amateur title when she won the 1994 Women's Amateur Public Links Championship.

In 2003, Wie became the youngest winner of an "adult" USGA championship at the age of 13.

The championship also was noteworthy because of its team trophy, which was captured a record five times by teams from Phoenix, Ariz., and Murietta, Calif. The team championship was discontinued following the 2008 championship.

In 2002, the final was played over 36 holes for the first time. In 2005, a Handicap Index limit of 18.4 was established.
