Stasi Wins the 2010 Championship

Meghan Stasi, 32, of Oakland Park, Fla., made history at Wichita Country Club in defeating Carol Robertson, 2 up, to win the U.S. Women's Mid-Amateur Championship on the 6,209-yard, par-72 William H. Diddel design.

Stasi joined Sarah LeBrun Ingram and Ellen Port as three-time winners of the 24-year-old championship. Stasi hugged her father Mike Bolger — her caddie for all three victories — and then ambled over to do a television interview while wiping away tears.

"Like Martha [Leach] said in her [recent players' dinner] speech, she waited so long for her first win," said Stasi. "And to just have one is incredible. ... The win today ranks up there with all the other wins. It's been an incredible journey."

It was quite the voyage for both finalists. Stasi, who showed no hint of nerves, was dialed in from the get-go. Carol Robertson, 27, of Virginia Beach, Va., almost didn't get the chance to play. She had gotten her amateur status reinstated on Sept. 5, two days before her qualifier for the championship. And here she was in the final, after plowing through her first five opponents. Except now she ran into a wall that would ensure there wouldn't be a sixth.

Through the front nine Stasi carded the equivalent of four under par with all of the normal match-play concessions. She recorded six birdies through the first 11 holes, only one of them conceded. And all Robertson could do was watch helplessly as Stasi dropped in putt after putt.

"She made five or six 10-footers in the first six holes and just when I thought I had a chance — boom! — there's another one at the bottom [of the hole]," said a dejected Robertson. "Right now it's hard being so close, but she definitely outplayed me."

Stasi continually talked about "seeing the line" all day, adding that she felt like she was in the proverbial zone that athletes often reference. It helped her set the tone early, as she finessed in a 12-foot birdie putt on the 470-yard par-5 fourth hole to go 1 up. She won the next hole when she drained an 8-foot birdie putt and took No. 7, knocking in a 6-foot birdie putt, to get to 3 up.

Robertson, however, trimmed the lead with a well-timed and much-needed 30-foot chip-in on No. 8.

Any thoughts of a rout were put to rest when the players hit the back nine. Even though Stasi won the par-3 11th hole with an 8-foot, hole-high birdie putt, Robertson didn't quit. The Old Dominion assistant golf coach won three successive holes by going par-par-birdie. On the par-4 13th, Stasi mis-hit a chip from the greenside rough before Robertson converted a lagging 5-footer. But 1 down was as close as Robertson would get. Robertson missed a critical 8-footer on No. 15 when the ball broke early, restoring a hole to Stasi's lead.

It came down to Stasi being 2 up with three holes to play. On the 156-yard par-3 17th, Stasi's putter finally cooled off. She had a chance to close out the match as she hovered over a 12-foot putt. The ball lipped out, giving Robertson a last gasp as she headed to the 18th hole 1 down.

Robertson blocked her tee shot and followed up by finding a right greenside bunker. She looked down in frustration. In the meantime, Stasi stuck her approach shot to within 21 feet of the hole. When Robertson couldn't get up and down, she conceded the match.

"There's no excuse," said Robertson. "A great player got hot and was impossible to beat. Hey, it could have been me. There's nothing I could do, but I could have been the one on the hot streak."

The two players embraced. Then Stasi looked at her dad and hugged him before her husband, Danny, raced onto the green to celebrate. Danny joked afterward that it was the only way the name 'Stasi' would get on a golf trophy. The two previous titles Stasi won were under her maiden name of Bolger.

Weather

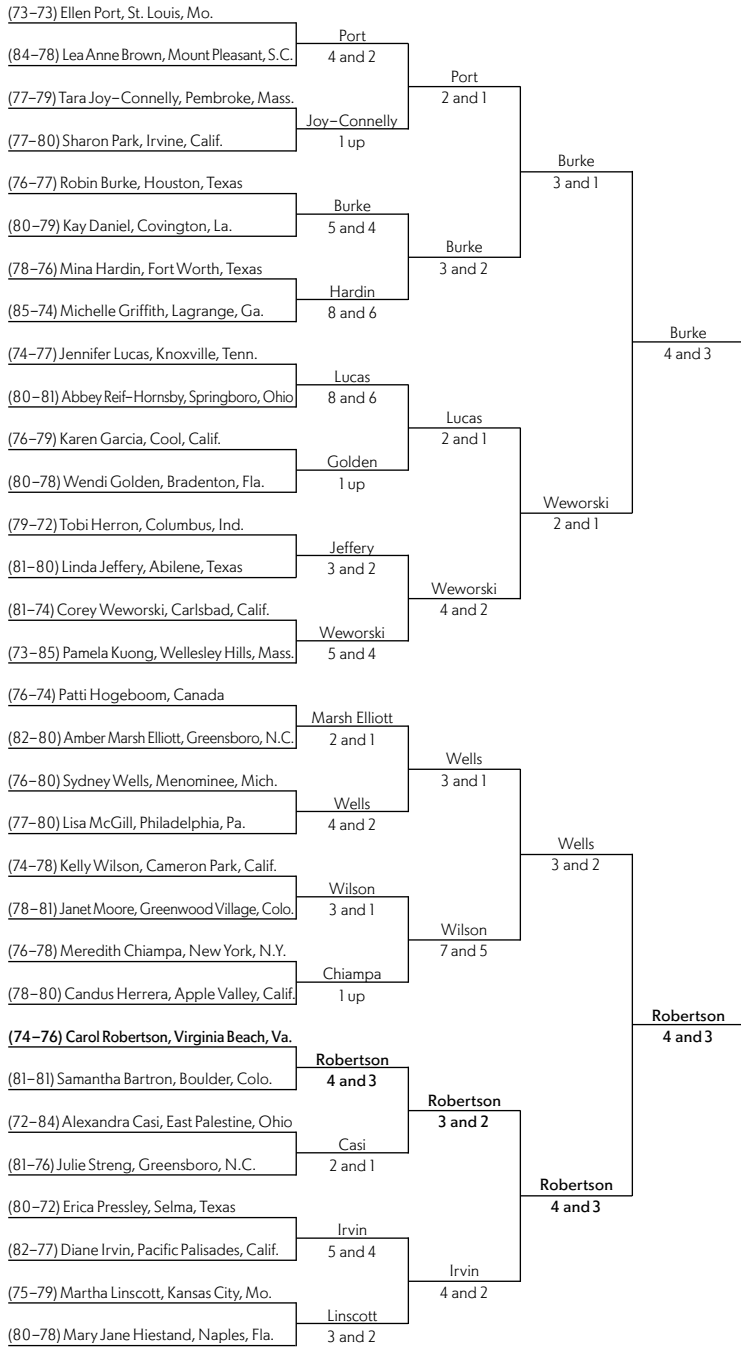
Mostly sunny and mild through the entire championship. Temperatures were consistently in the mid-to-high 80s.

Notes

A total of 36 states and five countries (Canada, Jamaica, Japan, Sri Lanka and Thailand) were represented at the 2010 U.S. Women's Mid-Amateur ... There were 12 USGA champions in the field ... Ellen Port, who opened the championship trail-ing Carol Semple Thompson (56) in Women's Mid-Amateur match-play victories, moved within six wins by advancing through the first two rounds ... There were seven players in the field who played in a Curtis Cup Match ... Semple Thompson had played in every Women's Mid-Amateur championship since its inception in 1987 until this year ... USGA Executive Committee member Christie Austin played in the champion-ship but failed to qualify for match play ... Shannon Hare-Rouillard, a member of the USGA staff, qualified for the championship and made it to the first round of match play, where she was defeated by Katy Treadwell, 4 and 3 ... Stasi's victory tied her for the most in championship history with three, joining Sarah LeBrun Ingram and Port.

Championship History

The U.S. Women's Mid-Amateur Championship originated in 1987 as a result of a need determined by an ad hoc committee headed by Dena Nowotny, a member of the USGA Women's Committee.

The Women's Mid-Amateur, the USGA's 13th championship, was created to provide a national competitive arena for amateurs age 25 and older.

By 1987, it had become increasingly difficult for female amateur golfers beyond college to compete equitably with their collegiate counterparts, for whom golf was nearly a full-time vocation.

One must go back to 1973 and Carol Semple Thompson to find the last career amateur to win the U.S. Women's Amateur.

As with any new championship, there was initial concern with the level of entries. In this case, women amateurs responded with enthusiasm. The first championship attracted 320 entries, only 29 fewer than the number that had entered the 1987 Women's Amateur a few weeks earlier.

The starting field of 135 players was determined by sectional qualifying. The first Women's Mid-Amateur was played at Southern Hills Country Club in Tulsa, Okla. The inaugural championship was won by Cindy Scholefield, 27, of Malibu, Calif.

The Women's Mid-Amateur has been the setting for a number of noteworthy finals. In 1989, Robin Weiss, of Palm Beach Gardens, Fla., defeated Page Marsh Lea on the 22nd hole. In 1990, despite the tremendous pressure of competing on her home course as a crowd favorite, Carol Semple Thompson, 41, of Sewickley, Pa., defeated Marsh Lea, 3 and 1, at the Allegheny Country Club, where Semple Thompson had learned the game.

Sarah LeBrun Ingram of Nashville, Tenn., in 1994 became the first player to capture consecutive Women's Mid-Amateur championships. She had previously won in 1991 and 1993 and is one of just two three-time winners.

In 2000, Ellen Port, 39, of St. Louis, Mo., won her third Women's Mid-Amateur Championship at Big Canyon Country Club in Newport Beach, Calif. She also won the title in 1995 and 1996.

Meghan Bolger Stasi became the third to claim three Women's Mid-Amateur titles with her victory in the 2010 championship. She also won back-to-back titles in 2006 and 2007.
