# Breaking Down the Playing Conditions Calculation under the

# World Handicap System™

## What is the playing conditions calculation?

The playing conditions calculation (PCC) is a **daily calculation that accounts for abnormal conditions** - such as weather or course setup - that cause a course to play easier or harder than its Course Rating™ and Slope Rating® indicate.

#### **How does PCC work?**

- It includes 9-hole and 18-hole scores from all rated sets of tees; however, at least eight acceptable scores must be posted for the analysis to occur.
- Whether an adjustment is applied depends on how many scores posted at a particular course are higher or lower than expected based on each player's Handicap Index® compared to the total number of scores posted that day.
- If applied, the adjustment affects the Score Differential™ for everyone who played that course that day.

### How is PCC applied?

The PCC is applied at midnight, so the morning after a score is posted, the final Score Differential from the round will be calculated as follows:

#### Score Differential Calculation

(113 ÷ Slope Rating) x (Adjusted Gross Score - Course Rating - PCC Adjustment)

To ensure all scores are included in the PCC data pool, players are encouraged to post scores on the same day of play. If a PCC results in an adjustment, it will be clearly displayed in the player's scoring record.
