## The USGA



The United States Golf Association has served as the national governing body of golf since its formation in 1894.

A nonprofit organization, the USGA sponsors programs that serve everyone who loves and respects the game of golf. These essential services affect all golfers, whether they are amateurs or professionals, public- or private-course players.

Nearly 8,000 private and public courses, clubs and facilities comprise the USGA.

An Executive Committee of 15 volunteers, the organization's policy-making board, oversees the Association. Nearly 1,200 volunteers from all parts of the country serve on other USGA committees. All donate their services and pay most of their own expenses. A professional staff of approximately 350 directs the Association's day-to-day functions from Golf House, the USGA's headquarters in Far Hills, N.J.

In 1975, the Association formed the USGA Members Program to help support the game and the USGA. Today, more than 650,000 golfers around the nation are USGA Members.

The USGA acts in cooperation with national, regional and local golf associations in areas of common interest. The Association also represents the USA in relations with golf associations of other countries.

Based on a shared love and respect for golf, we preserve its past, foster its future, and champion its best interests for everyone who enjoys the game.

### USGA History

---

In the 1890s, a dispute arose over the question of a national amateur champion. In 1894, St. Andrew's Golf Club (Hastings-on-Hudson, N.Y.) and the Newport (R.I.) Country Club each staged invitational tournaments, and each declared its winner to be the national amateur champion.

The confusion made it clear that an impartial governing body was needed to administer golf, conduct national championships and oversee the codification and interpretation of the game's rules, as well as the Rules of Amateur Status.

The United States Golf Association was the end result of a meeting of delegates from Newport, St. Andrew's, Shinnecock Hills Golf Club (Southampton, N.Y.), The Country Club (Brookline, Mass.) and the Chicago (Ill.) Golf Club in New York City on Dec. 22, 1894. Theodore A. Havemeyer was elected as the first president.

## What Does the USGA Do?

### Conducts National Championships

The USGA's championships began in this country in October 1895, with the first U.S. Amateur. The first U.S. Open was played the next day. Both championships were played at Newport. One month later, the USGA conducted the first U.S. Women's Amateur at the Meadow Brook Club in Hempstead, N.Y.

The 13 national championships conducted by the USGA are: the U.S. Open Championship; the U.S. Women's Open Championship; the U.S. Senior Open Championship; the U.S. Amateur Championship; the U.S. Women's Amateur Championship; the U.S. Junior Amateur Championship; the U.S. Girls' Junior Championship; the U.S. Amateur Four-Ball Championship; the U.S. Women's Amateur Four-Ball Championship; the U.S. Mid-Amateur Championship; U.S. Women's Mid-Amateur Championship; the U.S. Senior Amateur Championship; and the U.S. Senior Women's Amateur Championship.

At the 2015 Annual Meeting, the USGA announced that it will conduct the U.S. Senior Women's Open starting in 2018.

In addition, the USGA conducts Men's and Women's State Team Championships, held initially in 1995 to coincide with the celebration of the USGA centennial. These championships are held biennially, with the Men's State Team occurring in even-numbered years and the Women's State Team in odd-numbered years.

Since 1922, in cooperation with The Royal and Ancient Golf Club of St. Andrews, Scotland (The R&A), the USGA conducts the Walker Cup Match, a biennial competition between teams of amateur golfers, the United States on one side and Great Britain and Ireland on the other. Similarly, since 1932, the USGA, with the Ladies' Golf Union, conducts the Curtis Cup Match, played between teams of women amateur golfers. The USGA conducts both Matches when they are played in this country.

The USGA along with The R&A assists with the conduct of the World Amateur Team Championships on behalf of the International Golf Federation (IGF), formerly known as the World Amateur Golf Council. The IGF has conducted the World Amateur Team Championship since 1958 and the Women's World Amateur Team Championship since 1964, and is the International Federation for golf for the International Olympic Committee (IOC). The IGF, represented by national federations and 23 professional members around the world, conducts the golf competitions for the IOC at the Olympic Games and the Youth Olympic Games.

Thomas J. O'Toole Jr., president of the USGA, serves as joint chairman of the IGF Administrative Committee, while Stacey Collins, chairman of the USGA Women's Committee, is also a member of the committee. USGA Executive Director Mike Davis sits on the IGF Board and the IGF Olympic Executive Committee,

while John Bodenhamer, the USGA's senior managing director of Rules, competitions and equipment standards, serves on the IGF Competitions Committee.

### Writes and Interprets the Rules of Golf

The USGA and The R&A write and interpret The Rules of Golf to safeguard the traditions and integrity of the game.

In May 1951, representatives from governing bodies of golf in Great Britain, Australia, Canada and the United States met in London to develop a worldwide, uniform code for The Rules of Golf. The interpretations provided in the Decisions on the Rules of Golf are updated every two years and the Rules of Golf are updated every four years.

### Regulates and Tests Golf Equipment

The USGA continually tests golf equipment for conformity to the Rules. Without rigorous equipment testing, research programs and effective Rules, advances in technology could overtake skill as the major factor in success. Together with The R&A, the USGA Equipment Standards staff maintains and develops worldwide, uniform standards for golf clubs, golf balls and other articles used to play the game. The USGA's Research and Test Center, one of the most sophisticated and technologically advanced golf equipment test facilities in the country, is located at its headquarters in Far Hills. Tours of the Test Center are available to Museum visitors.

### Maintains the Handicap and Course Rating System

The USGA Handicap System™ allows golfers of different abilities to enjoy competing against one another on relatively equal terms. It is one of the few sports or games that provide this opportunity.

A key element in the success of the USGA Handicap System is the concept of a "golf club." This concept requires that a handicap committee exist to educate and supervise the activities of its members and that the members have a reasonable and regular opportunity to play golf with fellow members and provide peer review which is the reviewing of fellow members' scoring records.

A component of the USGA Handicap System is the USGA Course Rating System™, including SLOPE®. The USGA's method of Course Rating and Slope Rating provides a better assessment of a golf course's relative degree of difficulty than mere length. Some of the factors evaluated in Course Rating are topography, rough and recoverability, trees, bunkers and even the psychological obstacles a player may encounter on the first and last hole. There are approximately 27,000 courses and more than 100,000 sets of tees that have a valid USGA Course Rating and Slope Rating.

The Slope Rating adjusts a player's Handicap Index® according to the relative difficulty of the golf course being played. A course with a higher Slope Rating (which means that the spread between scores of scratch and non-scratch golfers increases) will result in a player receiving more strokes; conversely, a player receives fewer strokes when he plays on a course with a lower Slope Rating, where the spread decreases.

The USGA Course Rating System™ is used throughout the United States, Mexico, Canada, Europe, South Africa, parts of Asia and South America and its acceptance worldwide grows each year. GHIN® (which stands for Golf Handicap and Information Network®) is a service that is available to golf clubs that are member clubs of associations that contract with the USGA for use of this computation service. GHIN comprises 82 golf associations covering 46 states, plus the Bahamas, Bermuda, the Dominican Republic, Guam, Hong Kong, India, Mexico, the People's Republic of China and Puerto Rico. These associations include more than 14,500 clubs and approximately 2.4 million golfers. GHIN services are offered to clubs and courses exclusively through state or regional golf associations. The golf associations perform an important job in fostering all aspects of amateur golf, including helping golfers learn how to use the USGA Handicap System. Those activities parallel some key purposes of the USGA.

### Funds Turfgrass and Environmental Research

For more than nine decades, the USGA Green Section has developed and disseminated sustainable management practices that produce better playing conditions for better golf. The Green Section offers expert guidance through the USGA Course Consulting Service (CCS), leads a robust research program and develops broadly distributed educational materials to meet the diverse needs of golf course owners, operators and management staff.

The USGA supports the world's largest private turfgrass research effort. Since 1920, the USGA has funded research projects at land grant universities across the country, contributing more than \$40 million to improve the playing conditions and enjoyment of the game. The research grants lead to improved grasses and playing surfaces, better tolerance of disease and pests and a strong promotion environmental and economic sustainability. Heat-tolerant bentgrasses, drought- and cold-resistant bermudagrasses and salt-tolerant seashore paspalum have been developed through the USGA Turfgrass and Environmental Research Program, and are used today on golf courses to improve playing conditions and help reduce water consumption.

The USGA employs skilled agronomists, located in regional offices across the country, who make on-site CCS visits to improve course conditions. Since the program began in 1953, the staff has made more than 80,000 on-site golf course visits. These experts offer guidance and recommendations to help manage maintenance costs while improving playing quality with careful analysis tailored to the golf facility. The USGA agronomists help assess course needs, benchmark current programs against recognized

best management practices and recommend action steps aligned with course objectives and budget. The advances gained from scientific research are directly applied on golf courses.

The Green Section's Education and Outreach Program provide education products and real-world solutions on golf course management, environmental responsibility and economic sustainability to a broad-based audience both within and outside of the golf industry. The result is a wide variety of articles, videos, webcasts and other multimedia materials shared through such delivery vehicles as the USGA websites, publications (e.g. the Green Section Record and USGA Insider), social media, webinars and symposiums. The depth of the information ranges from the very technical needs of professional turfgrass managers to coverage of the same issues in layman's terms for golfers and impacts on their game.

### Supports Regional Golf Associations

In its role as the national governing body of golf, the USGA cooperates closely with state and regional golf associations on matters of mutual interest and core programs that benefit golfers and organizations, such as Course Rating and Handicapping. The USGA, golf associations and committee members work closely on the administration of more than 650 local and sectional qualifying sites annually for the USGA's national championships. The hard work and dedication of these associations and volunteers is crucial to the exemplary conduct of the USGA's national championships.

### Maintains a Membership Program

The USGA Members Program was founded in 1975 for the purpose of being the direct link between the USGA and the individual golfer. Currently the program has more than 700,000 golfers who we are proud to call Members. In addition, the Members Program gives an individual the opportunity to assist the USGA in its efforts to preserve and promote the game. Members receives many benefits, including insider access to USGA championships news, events and special offers.

### Ensures Golf's Future

The USGA's Public Services department comprises three areas of responsibility: charitable funding, special projects and inclusiveness. Through its charitable funding, the USGA partners with national organizations who work to make the experience of the game available to others, especially those who otherwise would not have the opportunity. The USGA frequently partners with allied organizations on special projects, and the Public Services department is responsible for the execution and management of these partnerships and the related activities. In addition, the Public Services department is charged with developing, implementing and maintaining programs that encourage a positive and proactive culture for inclusion in the game.



## USGA Museum



The USGA Museum is located on the Association's campus in Far Hills, N.J. Since its founding in 1936, the Museum has developed and maintained the world's most comprehensive collection of artifacts and material culture that document the history of golf and the USGA's role in ensuring the game's future.

The Museum is dedicated to celebrating and preserving the true spirit of the game as embodied in the history of the USGA and, more broadly, the history of the game in the United States. By developing content and programming, derived primarily from our world-class collections, the Museum reinforces the relevance of the game and highlights the important role of the USGA in golf history. In so doing, we foster an appreciation of golf's cultural significance to a worldwide audience.

### History

The origins of the USGA Museum can be traced to 1935, when George Blossom, a member of the USGA Executive Committee, first proposed the creation of a collection of historical golf artifacts. One year later, in an effort to formalize the museum, the Museum and Library Committee was created with the primary function of collecting historically significant artifacts and books. The first significant donation to the Museum — Bob Jones' legendary putter, Calamity Jane II — followed in 1938.

For the first 16 years of its existence, the Museum had no formal home and artifacts were displayed throughout the USGA offices in New York. In 1951, when the Association purchased the property at 40 East 38th St. in New York City, the first dedicated display space for the collections was created and the Museum was formally opened. In 1958, O.M. Leland, dean of the

Engineering School at the University of Minnesota, donated his extensive library of golf books to the Association, establishing the USGA Library as the premier golf library in the world.

In 1972, the USGA moved from New York City to the John Russell Pope House in Far Hills. Originally, the Museum occupied only the first floor of Golf House, which also housed offices for additional USGA departments on the upper floors as well as in the basement. Following the completion of the new Administration Building and Test Center, Golf House was extensively renovated in 1987 and the Museum came to occupy all four floors of the structure.

The unique collections of the Museum are now showcased in the Arnold Palmer Center for Golf History, which opened its doors on June 3, 2008. More than 2,000 artifacts are on display in the 16,000-square-foot Palmer Center, which comprises more than 5,000 feet of public exhibition galleries, a research room to facilitate access to the collections and state-of-the-art storage areas that provide the proper climate and security for the long-term care of historical artifacts.

### Museum Collections

*Library:* The world's largest golf library contains more than 65,000 assets, including biographies, histories, instructional books, Rules books, humor and foreign language publications. Also included are magazines, personal papers, scrapbooks, oral histories and information on every USGA championship.

*Museum Collection:* More than 30,000 artifacts document the game's evolution, including hundreds of USGA championship

moments. The collection includes equipment, ceramics, artwork, decorative arts, trophies, turfgrass equipment and much more.

*Photography:* The Photo Archive is comprised of more than 700,000 images, including black-and-white prints, color slides and digital photographs. The Photo Archive documents USGA national championships and international competitions from the late 19th century to the present. The collection also includes thousands of contemporary golf course scenes, educational images and photographs of museum artifacts.

*Film and Video:* Preserving some of golf's earliest moving images, the Film and Video Archive contains nearly 10,000 hours of historic footage. This collection serves as a repository for USGA championship coverage and productions, rare golf footage and motion pictures.

The Museum preserves its collections by administering proper storage practices, maintaining content management systems and executing conservation projects. In their quality and care, these collections reflect the Association's commitment to preserving the history of the game.

## USGA Museum

---

The centerpiece of the USGA Museum is the Hall of Champions, an oval rotunda that houses all 15 USGA national championship trophies and contains the names of every USGA champion on bronze panels that encircle the room.

The Museum includes rooms dedicated to Arnold Palmer, Bob Jones, Ben Hogan, Jack Nicklaus and Mickey Wright — special galleries that document the remarkable accomplishments of these four legendary golfers.

The permanent galleries in the Museum tell the story of golf in America, from the late 18th century to the present. Using our rich collection of artifacts and documents, each gallery focuses on an iconic moment — champions and events in the game's history that are pivotal for understanding the growth, evolution and significance of the game in America's history.

Iconic artifacts on display include John Shippen's 4-wood from the turn of the century; Francis Ouimet's clubs from the 1913 U.S. Open; Bob Jones' famous putter "Calamity Jane II"; Ben Hogan's 1-iron from the 1950 U.S. Open; the "Moon club" used by Alan Shepard on the Apollo 14 mission; as well as items from Michelle Wie, Tiger Woods and several U.S. presidents.

Visitors can also experience the game the way it used to be played with a round on the Pynes Putting Course. The 16,000-square-foot putting green, located directly behind the Museum, offers visitors the opportunity to putt with replicas of clubs and balls from the late 19th and early 20th centuries.

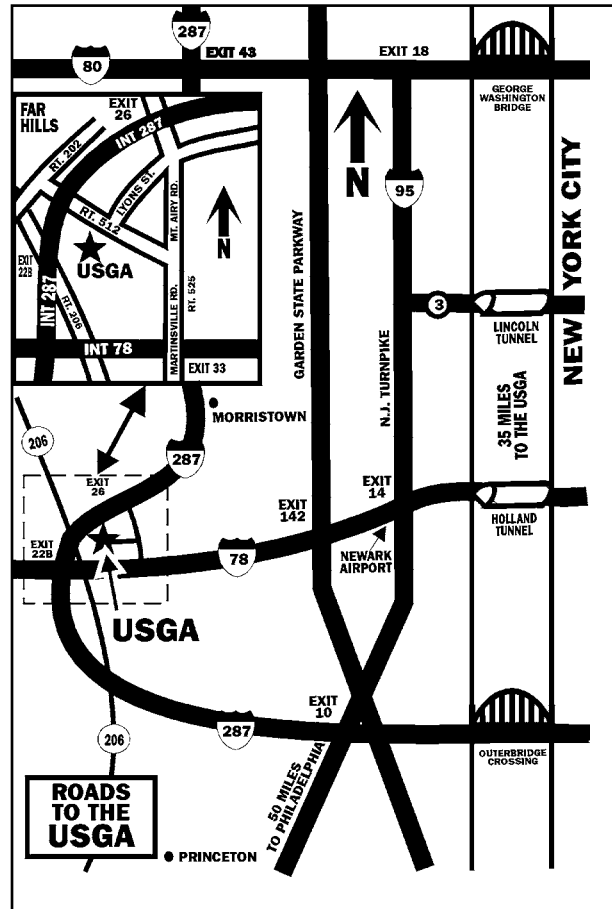

## Roads to the USGA, Far Hills, N.J.



### From the North:

I-287 south to Mount Airy Road exit. Left at end of exit ramp. At first traffic light, go right. Make a right onto Liberty Corner Road. Go 1.8 miles to USGA on left.

### From the South:

I-287 north to I-78. East on I-78 to Exit 33. Make a left at end of exit ramp; proceed to fifth traffic light and go left onto Rt. 512. Bear left onto Liberty Corner Road; go 1.8 miles to USGA on left.

### From the East:

I-78 west to Exit 33. Make a right at end of exit ramp. Proceed to fourth traffic light and go left onto Rt. 512. Bear left onto Liberty Corner Road; go 1.8 miles to USGA on left.

### From the West:

I-78 east to Exit 33. Make a left at end of exit ramp; proceed to fifth traffic light and go left onto Rt. 512. Bear left onto Liberty Corner Road; go 1.8 miles to USGA on left.

## The 2015 Bob Jones Award

Barbara Nicklaus is the recipient of the 2015 Bob Jones Award.

Presented annually since 1955, the Bob Jones Award is the USGA's highest honor. It recognizes an individual who demonstrates the spirit, personal character and respect for the game exhibited by Jones, winner of nine USGA championships.

Often referred to as the "First Lady of Golf," Mrs. Nicklaus has skillfully used her influence as the wife of 18-time major champion Jack Nicklaus for nearly 55 years to generate attention for youth-related charitable causes and volunteerism.

"Barbara's generosity of spirit and deep respect for the game have touched the lives of countless families throughout the world," said USGA President Thomas J. O'Toole Jr. "Her dedication to support players and spouses, and advocacy for multiple causes, are worthy of our highest honor. She has been the rock for arguably one of the game's greatest champions, while raising a family and devoting her heart and soul into what she believes in. We are proud to bestow this award upon her to recognize her lasting contribution to the game."

Their desire to encourage youth participation in golf led to the formation of the Barbara and Jack Nicklaus Junior Golf Endowment Fund, which supports junior golf programs at the local, state and national level for children who otherwise might not be introduced to the game.

Mrs. Nicklaus currently serves as the chairman of the Nicklaus Children's Health Care Foundation, whose mission is to provide charitable support for activities that advance and enhance the diagnosis, treatment and prevention of childhood diseases and disorders. The foundation, which also supports not-for-profit programs and projects aimed at pediatric health care and health-related services, has raised more than \$32 million since its inception in 2004.

In 2010, the foundation became the lead charity of the Memorial Tournament presented by Nationwide, a PGA Tour event founded by the Nicklaus in 1976, with the intention of giving back to local charities as one of the Tournament's primary objectives. To date the event has generated more than \$23.5 million in donations to Central Ohio charities, including

more than \$13 million to Nationwide Children's Hospital in Columbus, Ohio.

Mrs. Nicklaus' involvement as co-chairperson for the charity that organizes The Honda Classic on the PGA Tour has also benefited the foundation. Funds generated through the event in Palm Beach Gardens, Fla., have been instrumental in opening the Nicklaus Outpatient Center in partnership with Miami Children's Hospital, which is designed to meet the healthcare needs of children and adolescents from birth through age 21.

"Wow! What a truly humbling honor!" she said when informed of the award. "The USGA has been a part of our lives since Jack and I were teenagers, and we have always respected and appreciated their contributions and impact on the great game of golf. To receive this honor from them, one that bears the name of a man who had such a deep impact on our family, is one of the most meaningful recognitions I have been blessed to receive."

"Golf has not only given us an incredible life, it has provided us a vehicle and a means to make a difference in the lives of young boys and girls, and the families who love them. I don't think our life's work could ever compare to or repay what the game has given to us. I thank the USGA, the caretakers of this wonderful game, for this extremely kind gesture and honor."

Mrs. Nicklaus joins a list of winners that includes champions such as her husband, Jack (1975), Francis Ouimet (1955), Babe Didrikson Zaharias (1957), Arnold Palmer (1971), Ben Hogan (1976), Annika Sorenstam (2012) and Payne Stewart (2014), as well as those who have contributed to the fabric of the game in other meaningful ways, including Richard S. Tufts (1967), Joseph C. Dey Jr. (1977), Bing Crosby and Bob Hope (1978), P.J. Boatwright Jr. (1993) and President George H.W. Bush (2008). Mr. and Mrs. Nicklaus are the first married couple to receive the accolade.

The devoted mother of Jack II, Steve, Nan, Gary and Michael, and grandmother of 22, Mrs. Nicklaus continues to work for the causes she holds dear.

## The 2015 Joe Dey Award

The United States Golf Association honored Dr. David U. Cookson, of Madison, Wis., a passionate Rules official and dedicated golf ambassador for nearly 50 years, as the recipient of the 2015 Joe Dey Award.

The USGA has presented the Joe Dey Award annually since 1996 in recognition of an individual's meritorious service to the game as a volunteer. It is named for Joseph C. Dey Jr., who served as the USGA's executive director from 1934 to 1969, before serving as the first commissioner of the PGA Tour.

"I am overwhelmed," said Cookson. "Working with the USGA has been a great life experience, and I have built so many great relationships with players and leaders. It is an honor."

Cookson, a doctor of internal medicine, has served as a Rules official for nearly 90 USGA championships, including 25 U.S. Opens, and numerous USGA qualifiers. A USGA committee member from 1983 to 2011, he served on the Regional Affairs, Nominating and Senior Amateur Championship committees during his tenure.

"David represents the highest ideals and spirit of our game," said Tom O'Toole Jr., president of the USGA. "During a very special evening at the USGA Annual Meeting in February, we will celebrate his lifelong love of the game of golf and his unwavering dedication to preserve its honorable traditions."

A member of the Wisconsin State Golf Association (WSGA) Board of Directors since 1970, Cookson served as its president from 1977 to 1978. He also served on the Western Golf

Association's Board of Governors from 1977 to 1998. Cookson received the President's Distinguished Service Award from the WSGA in 1993, thanks in part to his contributions to the renovation of the University of Wisconsin Evans Scholars House in Madison. He was elected to the WSGA Hall of Fame in 2006.

"Dr. Cookson has been the most prominent and meaningful volunteer figure in the state of Wisconsin," said Jim Reinhart, WSGA president. "He has been instrumental in virtually every significant golf initiative in the state and involved in every aspect of amateur golf as an administrator and mentor. I cannot think of a more deserving person to receive this award."

Cookson was introduced to golf at age 8, playing on public courses with a set of clubs he inherited from a relative. He is a graduate of the University of Michigan and Harvard Medical School, and became an avid amateur golfer and "a nut about the Rules" during his college years. He is a member of Milwaukee Country Club and Maple Bluff Country Club in Madison, where he resides with his wife, Christine, of 60 years. They have four children and 11 grandchildren.

## The 2014 Herbert Warren Wind Book Award

In recognition of its high standard of achievement in golf literature, James R. Hansen's *"A Difficult Par: Robert Trent Jones Sr. and the Making of Modern Golf"* has earned the United States Golf Association's Herbert Warren Wind Book Award for 2014.

Hansen's profile of renowned golf course architect Robert Trent Jones Sr. is an expertly researched and written reflection on the life and career of one of the most prolific, well-respected and transformational figures in the history of golf.

"Robert Trent Jones was a colossus of the game and his contributions to golf course architecture undoubtedly influenced the way championship golf has been played over the past 65 years," said Michael Trostel, senior historian for the USGA Museum. "In 'A Difficult Par', James Hansen uses exhaustive research methods to deliver a comprehensive depiction of the man who shaped the landscape of modern golf, skillfully weaving together the story of family and business to break new ground on one of the game's most celebrated and significant designers."

"To have the USGA and Herbert Warren Wind associated with a book that I wrote is a huge honor," said Hansen. "There is no name in golf writing more respected or more prestigious than Wind. As a writer, it is the ultimate distinction in my career."

With the help and cooperation of Jones' sons, Robert Jr. and Rees, who shared letters, documents and personal stories of their father, Hansen pieced together the life events and struggles that the British-born Jones encountered on the way to creating his legacy.

A gifted and passionate golfer, Jones served as the first golf professional at Sodus Bay Heights Golf Club in Sodus Point, N.Y. During his tenure, he caught the eye of club president James D. Bashford, who sponsored Jones and encouraged him to enroll in Cornell University's architecture program.

At Cornell, Jones tailored his curriculum in landscape architecture and agronomy to create a degree in golf course design and management.

Upon graduation, Jones struggled to find work in a U.S. economy that was mired in the Great Depression. His patience, timing and relentless pursuit of his dreams eventually paid off, as he passionately and successfully promoted the construction of new golf courses as a wise use of public money and labor that had become available under President Franklin Delano Roosevelt's Works Progress Administration (WPA), part of the New Deal initiative.

"A Difficult Par" focuses not only on Jones' achievements in design and architecture, but also on the personal and financial challenges that he faced throughout his career. Hansen carefully details the family dynamics and professional rivalries that occurred during the latter part of his career.

"Of all the architects, I think Robert Trent Jones was the most significant in the development of American golf courses," said Hansen. "It wasn't just the longevity of his career, but also how his courses came to be the dominant venues for championship golf."

## The 2015 USGA Green Section Award

Dr. Patricia J. Vittum, of Amherst, Mass., is the recipient of the 2015 USGA Green Section Award.

Vittum, a professor at the University of Massachusetts' Stockbridge School of Agriculture, has conducted significant research on the biology and management of turfgrass insects and the effectiveness of biological-control methods. A recognized industry leader, she is a widely sought-after resource for practical information about turfgrass pests.

"Dr. Vittum has the unique ability to be a hands-on researcher who can effectively communicate her work with practical advice for the field practitioner," said Dr. Kimberly Erusha, managing director of the USGA Green Section. "Her contributions to the study of turfgrass insects have helped to establish industry standards and best management practices. We are proud to recognize her accomplishments and celebrate her legacy."

A native of western New York, Dr. Vittum earned her undergraduate degree in chemistry from The College of Wooster (Ohio). She earned her master's and doctorate degrees at Cornell University, where she worked with Dr. Haruo Tashiro, an international expert in the biology of turf insects. Vittum also served on the USGA Turfgrass and Environmental Research Committee from 2002 to 2008.

Vittum joined the faculty of the University of Massachusetts Amherst in 1980, becoming a professor in 2000. She currently teaches classes on the use of pesticides in the environment and turf management programs. She was recognized with the Excellence in Teaching Award by the Entomological Society of America, Eastern Branch in 2004.

"Pat is an exemplary faculty member and a true leader," said Mary Owen, turf specialist and turf program coordinator at the University of Massachusetts Extension. "She has dedicated her career to advance the professionalism and competence of golf course superintendents and staff, with protection of the environment as a high priority."

Vittum's research has been published in several well-respected industry journals and publications. She is the principal author of the second edition of "Turfgrass Insects of the United States and Canada," which is widely regarded as the leading publication on turf entomology. She also co-authored the "Handbook of Integrated Pest Management for Golf Courses."

"When Dr. Erusha called to tell me about this honor, I was overwhelmed," said Dr. Vittum. "The list of previous honorees includes so many giants of the turf management world, including people from academia, USGA Green Section directors, and top-shelf golf course superintendents. I am honored and humbled to be joining their ranks as a recipient of the distinguished service award. This is the highest award to which I could aspire, and it is an incredible affirmation of the studies I have conducted as a turf entomologist and the years I have spent as an educator."

## The 2014 Ike Grainger Award

In 1995, the centennial year of the United States Golf Association, the Ike Grainger Award was instituted to honor volunteers who have served the USGA for 25 years.

Grainger, one of the nation's leading authorities on the Rules of Golf, was a longtime member of the USGA Executive Committee and served as president in 1954–55. A former president of the Metropolitan Golf Association, Grainger's contributions to golf were many. In 1951, he chaired a USGA committee that produced the first uniform code of Rules with The Royal & Ancient Golf Club of St. Andrews, Scotland. He was also chairman of the USGA Rules Committee and vice chairman of the Augusta National Rules Committee.

The USGA remains indebted to the 1,400 volunteers who serve on USGA committees and to the thousands more who assist in conducting the 13 national championships and team competitions. Without the assistance of people who love the game, the Association would no doubt be less successful in preserving and protecting the true spirit of golf.

## Kaymer Wins the 2014 Championship

Martin Kaymer made sure that Sunday's final round of the 2014 U.S. Open at Pinehurst Resort & Country Club's Course No. 2 would amount to little more than a victory lap.

The 29-year-old German, who grabbed the championship by its throat on Thursday and never relinquished his grip, continued the recent domination of golfers from Europe, who have won four of the past five U.S. Opens.

After a week full of clutch putting – his 110 putts ranked third for the championship – Kaymer fittingly rolled in a 12-footer for par on the 72nd hole for a 1-under-par 69 and a 72-hole total of 9-under 271 to complete an eight-stroke victory over Rickie Fowler and Erik Compton, which tied the fourth-largest winning margin in championship history.

Just how good was Kaymer's Sunday finale? The other 15 golfers in the last eight pairings were a combined 52 over par. Only 11 golfers, including Kaymer, posted sub-70 scores Sunday on a 7,349-yard layout that featured two par 4s that were drivable and several accessible hole locations.

Kaymer, the 2010 PGA champion, also became the first German – and first from Continental Europe – to claim the U.S. Open. He joins countryman Bernhard Langer, a two-time Masters winner, as a multiple major champion. He became the eighth player to lead the U.S. Open wire to wire and is now one of only five players to win the U.S. Open, the PGA Championship and The Players Championship, joining the impressive quartet of Tiger Woods, Jack Nicklaus, Raymond Floyd and Lee Trevino.

"I didn't make many mistakes," said Kaymer, who had four birdies against three bogeys on Sunday. "The last two wins that I had in America, especially this week, I played very solid the first two days and that gave me a very nice cushion for the weekend. But to shoot only 1 over par [at] Pinehurst on Saturday and Sunday is good. The way I played I was very happy, the way I kept it together yesterday. And that gave me a good cushion for today.

Kaymer took a huge step toward his second major on Thursday and Friday, when he posted the first consecutive 65s in any major championship to set a 36-hole U.S. Open scoring record of 130, besting Rory McIlroy's total of 131 at Congressional in 2011. The six-stroke lead matched the efforts of Tiger Woods (2000) and McIlroy (2011), both of whom went on to win the championship.

Despite decidedly tougher conditions on the weekend, Kaymer never strayed too far from the tracks. Any mistake was covered up by another brilliant shot. Case in point was on Saturday when he took an unplayable lie after an errant drive on the fourth hole, only to convert a 20-footer for bogey. One hole later, he drilled a 202-yard approach from the sandy area to within 4 feet to set up an eagle 3.

On Sunday, Kaymer had a hiccup at the par-4 seventh, but then birdied the par-3 ninth, sticking his tee shot to 4 feet. He then

bogeyed the par-5 10th, only to convert consecutive birdies at 13 and 14 from 15 feet.

Four years ago, such a performance might have been expected from Kaymer. He became the world's No. 1-ranked player for eight weeks and defeated Bubba Watson in a three-hole playoff at Whistling Straits for the PGA Championship.

But he began tinkering with his swing, trying to hit more draws, and his game faded. Outside of a clutch 1-up victory over Steve Stricker that clinched the remarkable Ryder Cup comeback victory for Europe in 2012 at Medinah (Ill.) Country Club, Kaymer quietly slipped out of the top 50 in the Official World Golf Ranking.

The 10-time winner on the PGA European Tour broke through in May, shooting an opening-round 63 at TPC Sawgrass and held off Jim Furyk for a one-stroke victory at the weather-delayed Players Championship.

With most of the attention this week on six-time U.S. Open runner-up Phil Mickelson trying to complete the career Grand Slam and Australian Adam Scott playing his first major as the world No. 1, Kaymer came to the North Carolina Sandhills decidedly under the radar.

Then he just ran and hid from everyone in the field.

"He kind of killed the event in the first two days," said Henrik Stenson of Sweden, whose tie for fourth was his best U.S. Open finish in eight appearances. "And then it was more a question of if he would keep it under control. He held everyone off and then went out and played a solid round today. So very impressive and a very deserving champion."

Starting the round five strokes back, Fowler and Compton, the two-time heart transplant recipient who became the feel-good story of the championship, never applied any sustainable pressure on Kaymer.

A double-bogey 6 at No. 4 by Fowler ended his chances. Compton missed a 3-foot par putt at No. 7 and despite making birdie at the difficult eighth hole – one of five on the hole on Sunday – the 34-year-old from Miami, Fla., lost any hopes of a late rally with consecutive bogeys at Nos. 11 and 12, and another bogey at 15.

"Today, I hit the ball extremely well," said Compton, who got into the field at a sectional qualifier on June 2 in Columbus, Ohio, by surviving a 5-for-3 playoff for the final spots. "I didn't have my best stuff on the greens. I was watching the leader board, seeing what some of the guys were doing. I knew we were playing for second. I had my opportunities to put a little heat on [Kaymer] and I got it to 4 under, then I made a bogey [at No. 7]. But all in all, finishing second, the up and down I made on 18, just makes the whole week really, really sweet."

## Championship History

On Oct. 4, 1895, the first U.S. Open Championship was conducted by the United States Golf Association on the nine-hole course of Newport (R.I.) Golf and Country Club.

The first U.S. Open was considered something of a sideshow to the first U.S. Amateur, which was played on the same course and during the same week. Both championships had been scheduled for September but were postponed due to a conflict with a more established Newport sports spectacle, the America's Cup yacht races.

Ten professionals and one amateur started in the 36-hole competition, which was four trips around the Newport course in one day. The surprise winner was Horace Rawlins, 21, an English professional who was the assistant at the host course. Rawlins scored 91-82-173 with the gutta-percha ball.

Prize money totaled \$335, of which Rawlins won the \$150 first prize. He also received a gold medal and custody of the Open Championship Trophy for his club for one year.

In its first decade, the U.S. Open was conducted for amateurs and the largely British wave of immigrant golf professionals coming to the United States.

As American players began to dominate the game, the U.S. Open evolved into an important world golf championship. Young John J. McDermott became the first native-born American winner in 1911 and repeated as champion in 1912.

In 1913, the U.S. Open really took off when Francis Ouimet, a 20-year-old American amateur, stunned the golf world by defeating the famous English professionals Harry Vardon and Ted Ray in a playoff.

Another surge in the championship's popularity coincided with the amazing career of Georgia amateur Robert T. Jones Jr., who won the U.S. Open four times (1923, 1926, 1929, 1930). Spectator tickets were sold for the first time in 1922 and a boom in entries caused the USGA to introduce sectional qualifying in 1924.

In 1933, John Goodman became the fifth and last amateur to win the U.S. Open. The others were Ouimet, Jerome D. Travers (1915), Charles Evans Jr. (1916) and Jones.

In each era, the world's greatest players have been identified by surviving the rigorous examination provided by the U.S. Open. Ben Hogan's steely determination boosted him to four victories (1948, 1950, 1951, 1953). Arnold Palmer's record comeback win in 1960, when he fired a final-round 65 to come from seven strokes off the lead, cemented his dashing image. Jack Nicklaus' historic assault on the professional record book began when he won the first of his four U.S. Open Championships in 1962, his rookie season as a professional.

Nicklaus, who also won in 1967, 1972 and 1980, is one of only four golfers to capture four U.S. Open titles. The others are Willie Anderson (1901, 1903, 1904, 1905), Jones and Hogan.

In 1954, the U.S. Open course was roped from tee to green for the first time. That year also marked the first national television coverage. Coverage was expanded by ABC Sports in 1977 so that all 18 holes of the final two rounds were broadcast live. In 1982, the first two rounds were broadcast live for the first time on ESPN. NBC began televising the U.S. Open in 1995.

The format of the U.S. Open has changed several times. The USGA extended the championship to 72 holes in 1898, with 36 holes played on each of two days. In 1926, the format was changed to 18 holes played each of two days, then 36 holes on the third day. In 1965, the present format of four 18-hole daily rounds was implemented for the first time.

In 2002, a two-tee (No. 1 and No. 10) start was used for the first and second rounds. In addition, Bethpage State Park's Black Course in Farmingdale, N.Y., became the first facility owned by the public to host a U.S. Open. International qualifying sites were added in 2005 and the champion at Pinehurst (N.C.) Resort was Michael Campbell, who qualified in England.

## Montgomerie Wins the 2014 Championship

If Colin Montgomerie needed a spark as he pursued Gene Sauers on a 100-degree day in the final round of the 35th U.S. Senior Open at Oak Tree National, he received it on the 12th hole.

Montgomerie, who held the solo lead through the first two rounds, only to stumble with a third-round 74, was the only player within striking distance of Sauers as the holes began to dwindle on a steamy Oklahoma Sunday. Then along came the bagpiper.

"I'll tell you what, never mind the bagpipes — he was dressed in a kilt, which is heavy material," marveled Montgomerie, a native of Glasgow. "And he played 'Flower of Scotland' as we were coming up the hole. It was amazing to have that. I'm 5,000 miles from my home and to have him playing was a thrill."

For most of a 10-hole stretch, from the par-4 fifth through the par-4 15th, the dogged Montgomerie trailed Sauers by one stroke. His pursuit was finally rewarded when Sauers missed a 6-foot par putt on No. 16, dropping him to 5 under and into a share of the lead with Monty. When Sauers narrowly missed a birdie effort on the 72nd hole, the second three-hole aggregate playoff in Senior Open history was assured.

Sauers and Montgomerie each bogeyed the first playoff hole, No. 16, after they found the fairway bunker. Sauers bogeyed the par-3 17th after again being bunkered off the tee, and Montgomerie made a comfortable two-putt par. After both players missed the 18th green, Sauers seemed poised to extend the playoff, with a 4-footer left for par while Monty was 16 feet away. However, Monty ran in the putt for his first USGA championship after several hard-luck finishes.

"I've been close in these USGA championships a few times," said Montgomerie, 51. "I've lost in a playoff and been one shot behind a couple of times and I had to wait till 50 to finally win one. To follow the PGA Senior victory a month ago with the U.S. Senior Open is fantastic. I'm really on top of the world right now."

Montgomerie had a rough time on Saturday, when he hit only six greens and fell four strokes behind Sauers, and one behind Bernhard Langer and Scott Dunlap. But he served notice early on Sunday that he was back in the game.

"The 5-iron I hit at the second hole from 195 yards, I hit it to 8 feet and holed it," said Montgomerie. "That was important, for the scoreboard to change so that the three guys ahead of me understood that OK, Monty means business as well."

While Montgomerie was climbing closer, Dunlap (41 on the first nine) and Langer (41 on the inward nine) were slipping away, both eventually ending with scores of 77, tied for ninth. Montgomerie and Sauers both birdied the par-5 seventh to

move to 5 and 6 under, respectively, and they were still in that position nine holes later, when Sauers drove into the fairway bunker on No. 16 for the first of what would be two times on the day.

"I just underestimated the wind going left to right too much there," said Sauers. "Maybe I just didn't put a good swing on it. I did the same thing in the playoff. I had a fairly good chip, and I missed the putt low. That probably was the turning point right there."

Sauers hit a brilliant approach on the 72nd hole, but his 8-foot birdie putt barely missed — "a hair's breadth short of pace or else he would have won," said Monty — to set up the playoff and Montgomerie's par-saving winner on the same green, three holes later.

From his birdie on No. 7 on Sunday, Montgomerie played the remaining 14 holes — including the playoff — in 1 over par. He thought there were two keys to eventually drawing even with Sauers.

"Really, 74 was a disappointing score [on Saturday], but I played particularly badly and it could have gone to 76 or 77 very easily," he said. "Today, I knew how difficult the course would play and I was really very patient. You saw me two-putt a lot of holes. I didn't want to rush it by or do something silly."

Montgomerie has now won two majors since turning 50, after narrowly missing out numerous times on the regular tour.

"You know, I waited 22 years to win over in America," said Montgomerie. "My first major was the U.S. Open at Pebble Beach in 1992. I think I've matured on the golf course. I'm more patient than I was. I think I felt that in majors when I was contending that I had to play perfect golf, that I had to go out and score 64 — and you don't. Pars are usually good enough, especially in USGA events."

Montgomerie could empathize with Sauers' tough finish.

"To start with the lead — I've had it myself, and it's not easy," said Montgomerie. "It's tough, but all credit to him for persevering through that illness."

Montgomerie knows something about perseverance, and about overcoming adversity, some of it brought on by his difficult relationship with golf fans in U.S.

"Again, I've matured — I've realized that you need the fans on your side," he said. "There's no point in fighting against a few thousand of them out there. This week was a delight; the Oklahoma fans were superb."

Particularly one fan in a traditional tartan kilt.

## Championship History

The first U.S. Senior Open Championship was played June 26–29, 1980, on the East Course of Winged Foot Golf Club in Mamaroneck, N.Y. The championship was conducted for golfers 55 and older, with a handicap limit of eight strokes for amateurs.

Established as a result of the remarkable growth in senior golf, both at the professional and amateur levels, the championship attracted 631 entries. The final two rounds of the U.S. Senior Open were broadcast live on national television beginning with the inaugural championship, and it has been telecast nationally ever since.

The 1980 field included former U.S. Open champions Lew Worsham, Julius Boros, Ed Furgol, Jack Fleck and Tommy Bolt. Former U.S. Amateur champion William C. Campbell was also a competitor. Roberto De Vincenzo, a national hero in his native Argentina, won with a 1-over 285, four strokes ahead of runner-up Campbell.

In 1981, the USGA lowered the age minimum to 50 to make the championship more competitive. The USGA also believed that lowering the minimum age would place the Senior Open in the mainstream of other senior competitions.

The second Senior Open was won by another national hero, Arnold Palmer, 51, at Oakland Hills Country Club in Birmingham, Mich. Palmer won in an 18-hole playoff with Bob Stone and Billy Casper. With his victory, Palmer joined JoAnne Gunderson Carner as the only players to win three different USGA championships (Jack Nicklaus, Carol Semple Thompson and Tiger Woods have since accomplished this feat).

In 1982, at Portland (Ore.) Golf Club, Miller Barber won the first of his three Senior Open titles. Barber shot a final-round 65 and set the 72-hole scoring record of 282. He also won the 1984 and 1985 championships.

Dale Douglass broke Barber's record in 1986 with a 72-hole score of 279. In 1987, Gary Player lowered Douglass's record by a remarkable nine strokes when he shot a 72-hole score of 270 at Brooklawn Country Club in Fairfield, Conn., to win. He was the only player to shoot four rounds in the 60s until Tom Weiskopf turned the trick in his 1995 victory on the Blue Course of Congressional Country Club in Bethesda, Md.

Don Pooley and Tom Watson staged the first three- or four-hole playoff in 2002, after the format was installed in 1999. Pooley won with a birdie on the fifth hole. His 63 in the third round was the lowest score in Senior Open history until Loren Roberts shot a 62 in the third round at Prairie Dunes Country Club in Hutchinson, Kan. Besides Pooley, three others have shot 63s, including Kenny Perry en route to his title.

U.S. Open champions have performed extremely well in the U.S. Senior Open, winning 10 of the 30 championships. U.S. Open champions who have also won the Senior Open are: Arnold Palmer (1960 U.S. Open; 1981 Senior Open), Billy Casper (1959, 1966 U.S. Open; 1983 Senior Open), Gary Player (1965 U.S. Open; 1987, 1988 Senior Open), Orville Moody (1969 U.S. Open; 1989 Senior Open), Lee Trevino (1968, 1971 U.S. Open; 1990 Senior Open), Jack Nicklaus (1962, 1967, 1972, 1980 U.S. Open; 1991, 1993 Senior Open) and Hale Irwin (1974, 1979, 1990 U.S. Open; 1998, 2000 Senior Open).

## Wie Wins the 2014 Championship

When Michelle Wie arrived at the 2003 U.S. Women's Open as a wide-smiling, big-dreaming 13-year-old, one of the first questions posed to her was whether she could win the national championship.

"I guess everyone comes here to win," she said at the time. Wie tied for 39th that year, but the subsequent years brought disappointments, frustrations and even more questions.

Until Sunday.

Wie, 24, finally answered with a definitive yes by winning the 69th U.S. Women's Open at Pinehurst Resort and Country Club's Course No. 2. It is her second career USGA championship, but first since she won the 2003 U.S. Women's Amateur Public Links as a big-hitting 13-year-old.

Wie played poised and confidently throughout, including when she calmly rolled in a 25-foot birdie putt on the 17th hole after a double bogey on the previous hole narrowed her lead to one stroke. Wie shot an even-par 70 and finished with a 2-under-par 278 total, two strokes ahead of world No. 1 and fellow American Stacy Lewis, who matched the championship's low round of 66 and finished at even-par 280.

Wie's U.S. Women's Open disappointments include her twice holding or sharing the 54-hole lead. In 2005, as an amateur, she finished with an 82 and tied for 23rd. The following year, she shot a final-round 73 and tied for third, missing out by two strokes on a playoff won by Annika Sorenstam.

The frustrations continued in 2007 and 2013, when she withdrew following opening rounds of 82 and 80, respectively. In 2007 she cited a wrist injury and in 2013, she withdrew because of illness, failing to return to the course with one hole left in her second round on Saturday morning at Sebonack Golf Club.

Precocious is a word often used when referring to Wie, for good reason. As a 13-year-old, she was already nearly 6 feet tall and could drive a ball 300 yards. Though she grew up in the golf spotlight, she has come of age as one of the game's more dominant players since graduating from Stanford University in June 2012.

Wie wins her first major at the same age that Annika Sorenstam won the first of her three U.S. Women's Open titles. It comes at what is considered the home of American golf — and aptly, it is her first professional win on the U.S. mainland.

For the second straight day, Wie bogeyed the first hole. Playing partner Amy Yang also opened with a bogey, and she also three-putted the par-4 second hole for a double bogey on her way to an outward 39 that dropped her down the leader board.

Wie, meanwhile, eased into the rest of her day with eight consecutive pars and appeared unfazed by her pursuers. Early on, 2011 champion So Yeon Ryu moved to within two strokes at 1

over with three birdies in the first four holes, but that charge stalled with sporadic play over the last 14 holes.

Then there was world No. 1 Stacy Lewis, who held the opening-round lead after a bogey-free 67, but followed with rounds of 73 and 74.

Lewis began her day at 4 over for the championship, six strokes back of Wie and Yang. Given that the week's low round had been a 4-under 66 and that the largest final-round comeback to win was five strokes — done last by Sorenstam in 1995 — Lewis appeared to be the supreme long shot.

After she made her second bogey of the day at the par-4 fourth, Lewis remained five strokes back. She continued to battle, however, and her fifth birdie in nine holes at the 241-yard, par-4 13th hole pulled her to within a stroke of Wie at even par.

Lewis' charge stalled with bogeys at the 14th and 16th holes, but she was not finished. She birdied the 161-yard, par-3 17th and 391-yard, par-4 18th to keep a bit of pressure on Wie.

"Coming into the day I thought if I could get back to even par it would be a good spot," Lewis said. "I thought with the pressure of a major and the way this golf course played, I thought I had a chance. On the back nine all I was trying to do was hit good golf shots. And the nerves kind of came in. I made some bad swings, hit some good putts that didn't go in, but to birdie 17 and 18 and put the pressure on, you can't ask for a better finish."

Wie would not be denied this time. At the 452-yard, par-5 10th hole, she extended her lead to three on Lewis by hitting her second shot to within 10 feet and making the eagle putt.

Five more pars were followed by Wie's biggest drama of the day, at the 453-yard, par-4 16th. Her approach shot buried at the bottom of a clump of wiregrass in a natural sandy area short of the green. With a three-shot lead, Wie took an unplayable lie, played to the center of the green and two-putted for double bogey.

"Stuff happens like that," said Wie, whose lead was back to one stroke. "It's a U.S. Open; I just wanted to keep my calm."

Wie did by hitting her tee shot at the 161-yard, par-3 17th to within 25 feet. The birdie putt was Wie's 25th one-putt of the championship and gave her some space to enjoy the walk up the 18th.

"It just means so much more to me," she said. "I think life is just so ironic. I think that without your downs, without the hardships, I don't think you appreciate the ups as much as you do. I think the fact that I struggled so much, the fact that I kind of went through a hard period of my life, the fact that this trophy is right next to me, it means so much more to me than it ever would have when I was 15."

The win was a long time in coming, but it finally came.

Entries were received from 46 states (all except Delaware, Maine, South Dakota and Vermont), the District of Columbia and Puerto Rico, as well as 52 foreign countries ... For the first time in championship history, international qualifying was conducted at sites in the People's Republic of China, England, Japan and the Republic of Korea ... Lucy Li, 11, of Redwood Shores, Calif., was the youngest championship competitor. Li, who earned medalist honors at the Half Moon Bay (Calif.) Golf Links sectional qualifier, surpassed Lexi Thompson as the youngest qualifier in championship history. Li was 11 years, 8 months and 19 days old on the first day of competition. Thompson was 12 years, 4 months and 18 days old when she competed in the 2007 Women's Open at Pine Needles Lodge & Golf Club in Southern Pines, N.C. Although Li is the youngest player to qualify for the U.S. Women's Open, she is not the youngest to compete in the championship. Beverly Klass played in the 1967 U.S. Women's Open at Virginia Hot Springs Golf & Tennis Club in Hot Springs, Va., at 10 years, 7 months and 21 days old. Sectional qualifying was introduced in 1976 ... Nineteen teenagers advanced through sectional qualifying, led by 18-year-old Minjee Lee, of Australia, who won the 2012 U.S. Girls' Junior Championship and was then ranked No. 1 in the Women's World Amateur Golf Ranking. Three additional teenagers — Moriya Jutanugarn, Lydia Ko and Thompson — were fully exempt into the championship ... Inkster was the

oldest championship competitor at age 53. Inkster competed in her record 35th Women's Open, but stated at a pre-championship press conference that 2014 was likely her final championship ... At age 50, 1987 U.S. Women's Open champion Laura Davies, who advanced through sectional qualifying, was the second-oldest player in the championship. The week prior to the championship, Davies was named a Dame Commander of the Order of the British Empire by Queen Elizabeth II ... Michelle Wie became the first U.S. Women's Amateur Public Links champion to also win the U.S. Women's Open title. Wie won the 2003 WAPL at age 13 ... The 2014 U.S. Women's Open was the 28th USGA championships to be conducted in North Carolina.

## Championship History

The U.S. Women's Open was added to the USGA's roster of championships in 1953, 58 years after the first U.S. Women's Amateur. The reason for the USGA's relatively late assumption of the Women's Open is simple: women's professional golf is fairly new. When Opal Hill turned professional in 1938, she and Helen Hicks were two of the very few women golf professionals in the world.

Unlike the other 12 national championships conducted by the USGA, the Women's Open was created by another organization. In 1946, the short-lived Women's Professional Golfers Association introduced the Women's Open at match play at the Spokane (Wash.) Country Club. The Spokane Athletic Round Table, a men's fraternal organization, contributed the \$19,700 purse from its slot machines proceeds.

The first Women's Open was the only one conducted at match play. Patty Berg won the 36-hole qualifying medal in 1946, with rounds of 72-73-145, then won the championship by defeating Betty Jameson, 5 and 4, in the 36-hole final.

The small membership of the WPGA ran the championship for three years. By 1949, however, women's professional golf was making significant strides and the Ladies Professional Golf Association was founded. A group of 11 women, including Berg, Jameson, Louise Suggs and Babe Didrikson Zaharias, established the new association to provide organized tournaments for women professionals. The LPGA ran the Women's Open for four years, but in 1953 asked the USGA to conduct the championship. The first Women's Open under the USGA flag was played at the Country Club of Rochester, in upstate New York, where Betsy Rawls won the second of her four Women's Open titles (1951, 1953, 1957, 1960).

Conducted by the USGA ever since, the Women's Open is the oldest championship open to women professionals and amateurs. Rawls and Mickey Wright, the only other four-time winner (1958, 1959, 1961, 1964) were the championship's dominant players from 1957 through 1964, winning six Women's Opens between them during those eight years. In 1967, Catherine

Lacoste, daughter of French tennis player Rene Lacoste and 1927 British Ladies Amateur Champion Simone Thion de la Chaume, became the only amateur to win the Women's Open.

In its 68-year history, the U.S. Women's Open has reigned as the world's greatest women's championship, attracting steadily increasing numbers of entries and spectators. Whereas only 37 contestants played in 1953, in 1976 the field jumped to 205 players and sectional qualifying was introduced. In 2001, a then-record 980 contestants entered. A four-day attendance record of 41,200 was set in 1979 at Brooklawn Country Club in Fairfield, Conn. At the 50th Women's Open, in 1995, that record was more than doubled at The Broadmoor Golf Club in Colorado Springs, Colo.

In recent years, the U.S. Women's Open has truly become the world arena of women's golf. Since 1990, 13 championships have been won by foreign-born players, while only three of the first 41 champions were foreign-born. The emergence of the Women's Open as a great international contest came in 1987, when England's Laura Davies prevailed in an 18-hole playoff against Japan's Ayako Okamoto and JoAnne Gunderson Carner of the United States.

Another foreign-born player, Annika Sorenstam, of Sweden, established the 72-hole scoring record of 8-under-par 272 at Pine Needles Lodge & Golf Club in 1996. Juli Inkster matched that 72-hole score of 272, also setting a record in relation to par at 16 under, in 1999.

In 2002, qualifying for the Women's Open was held in two stages for the first time — 18 holes for local qualifying and 36 holes for sectional qualifying. Since 2010, there has been one stage — a 36-hole sectional qualifier. Additionally, in 2014, the USGA held international qualifying for the first time in championship history. Qualifying was conducted at sites in the People's Republic of China, England, Japan and the Republic of Korea.

Entries for the U.S. Women's Open also have topped the 1,000 mark every year since 2004, illustrating the global growth of women's golf.

## Superal Wins the 2014 Championship

Princess Mary Superal, of the Philippines, survived a late comeback from Mexico's Marijose Navarro and captured a hard-fought 37-hole victory at the 2014 U.S. Girls' Junior Championship on Saturday at Forest Highlands Golf Club's Meadow Course.

Despite leading for the majority of the match, Superal went to the par-5 36th hole trailing by one. Needing to force extra holes with a birdie, Superal converted a 10-foot uphill putt and when Navarro missed from 8 feet, the match went to extra holes.

Navarro's tee shot on the first playoff hole — the par-5 14th — found the water, and Superal parred the hole to take the title.

"I really didn't expect it," said Superal, who becomes the first player born in the Philippines to win a USGA championship. "I feel very, very proud."

The battle of 17-year-olds was just the second time since the championship final was extended to 36 holes in 2006 that extra holes were required to decide the title. Jenny Shin needed 37 holes to beat Vicky Hurst eight years ago.

The morning round was a quiet affair. After halving the opening three holes, Superal knocked in a 3-foot birdie at the par-4 fourth for a 1-up lead. She stretched the advantage to 2 up after Navarro three-putted for bogey at the par-4 eighth. Superal successfully got up and down from the greenside bunker, and watched her ball circle the hole and finally drop for a hole-winning par.

Navarro, a three-time Women's Mexican Amateur champion, struck right back, winning the par-4 10th with a 5-foot birdie.

Superal regained her 2-up lead at the par-3 17th when Navarro failed to get up-and-down for par. But when Superal's birdie try at the par-5 18th just burned the left edge of the hole, Navarro smoothly converted her 4-foot birdie, giving Superal a 1-up lead going into the lunch break.

Navarro was able to square the match on the 22nd hole when she stuffed her 58-degree wedge approach to 3 feet and won with a birdie. But Superal answered with birdies at holes 23 and 27 to again go 2 up.

At the 32nd hole, the match turned in Navarro's favor. She hit the green in two and though she left her eagle putt short, she won the hole when Superal's birdie attempt rolled past the hole.

With the momentum firmly in her favor, Navarro hit her second shot at the par-4 33rd hole to 10 feet. Superal two-putted for par, and Navarro drained her birdie putt to square the match.

Navarro took her first and only lead at the 35th hole. After missing the green 15 feet left, she made a superb recovery shot to 6 feet. When Superal's par putt lipped out, Navarro owned a 1-up lead.

"It was nerve-racking," said Navarro of that clutch chip. "But like my caddie (Northern Arizona University golfer Jacquie LeMarr) said to me, you've been practicing this all your life and just trust yourself."

Superal found herself in a position she had not known the entire round — being the chaser, not the leader. The petite Filipina knew what she had to do.

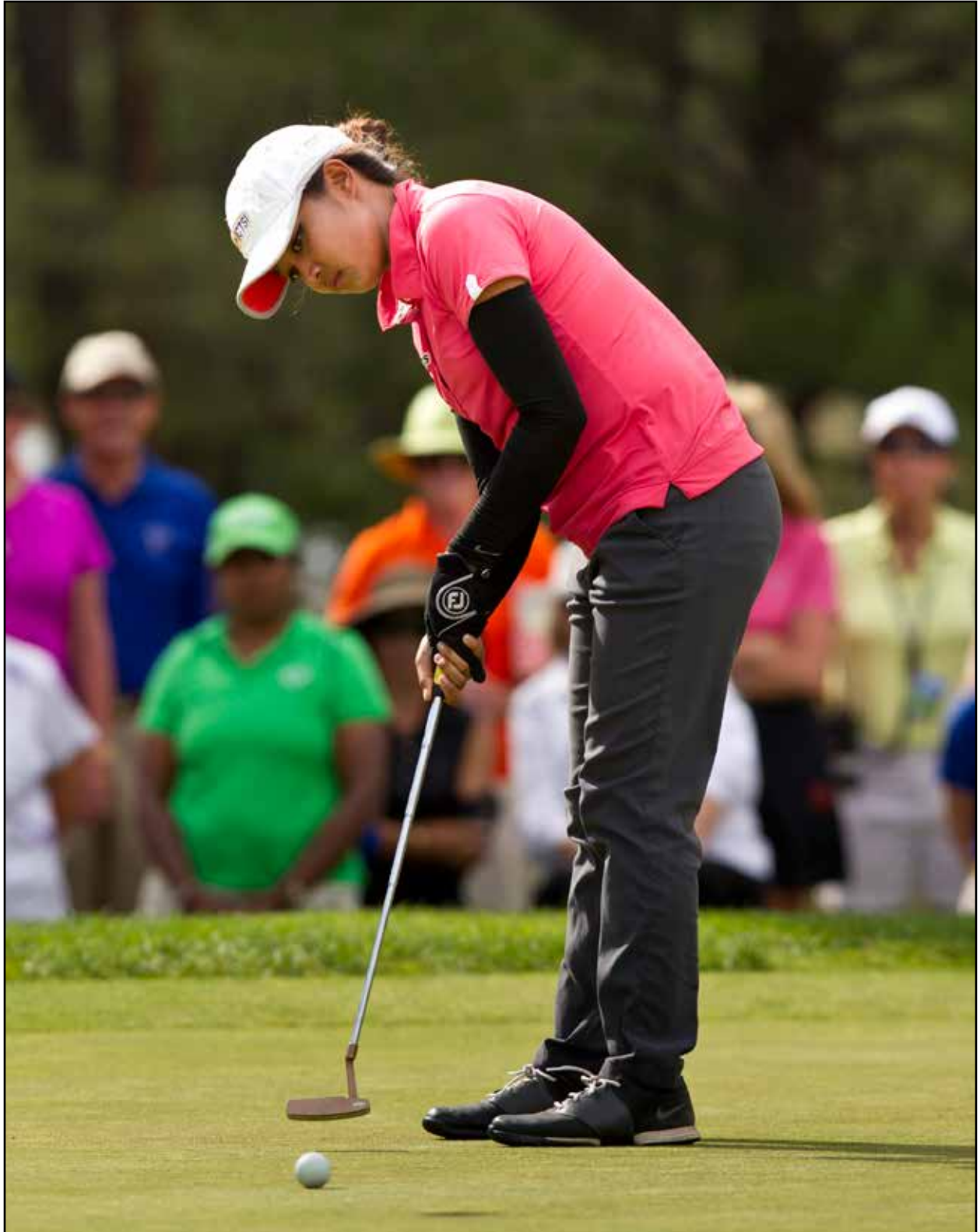
"Just to make a birdie on that hole" was Superal's plan heading to the final hole of regulation.

Always the longer hitter of the match, Navarro nearly reached the 36th green in two. After Superal knocked her approach to 10 feet, Navarro's chip from the rolled 8 feet past the flagstick. Superal put pressure on her opponent by draining her birdie putt, and Navarro's attempt just grazed the edge, sending the match to extra holes.

"It was a difficult putt, but I wasn't (confident)," said Navarro, who has already completed a semester at Texas A&M University after graduating 1½ years early from high school last October. "Since yesterday, I wasn't putting very good."

That extra hole immediately spelled the end for Navarro. She hooked her tee shot at the 14th hole into the pond that runs to the left of the fairway. Forced to take a drop, Navarro reached the green in four, while Superal was on in two. Superal missed her birdie putt, but when Navarro pushed her par attempt long, she conceded the hole and the match to Superal.

The match showcased two talented young golfers. Superal played to the equivalent of 8 under par, with the usual match-play concessions, and did not card her first bogey until the 35th hole. Navarro was 7 under.

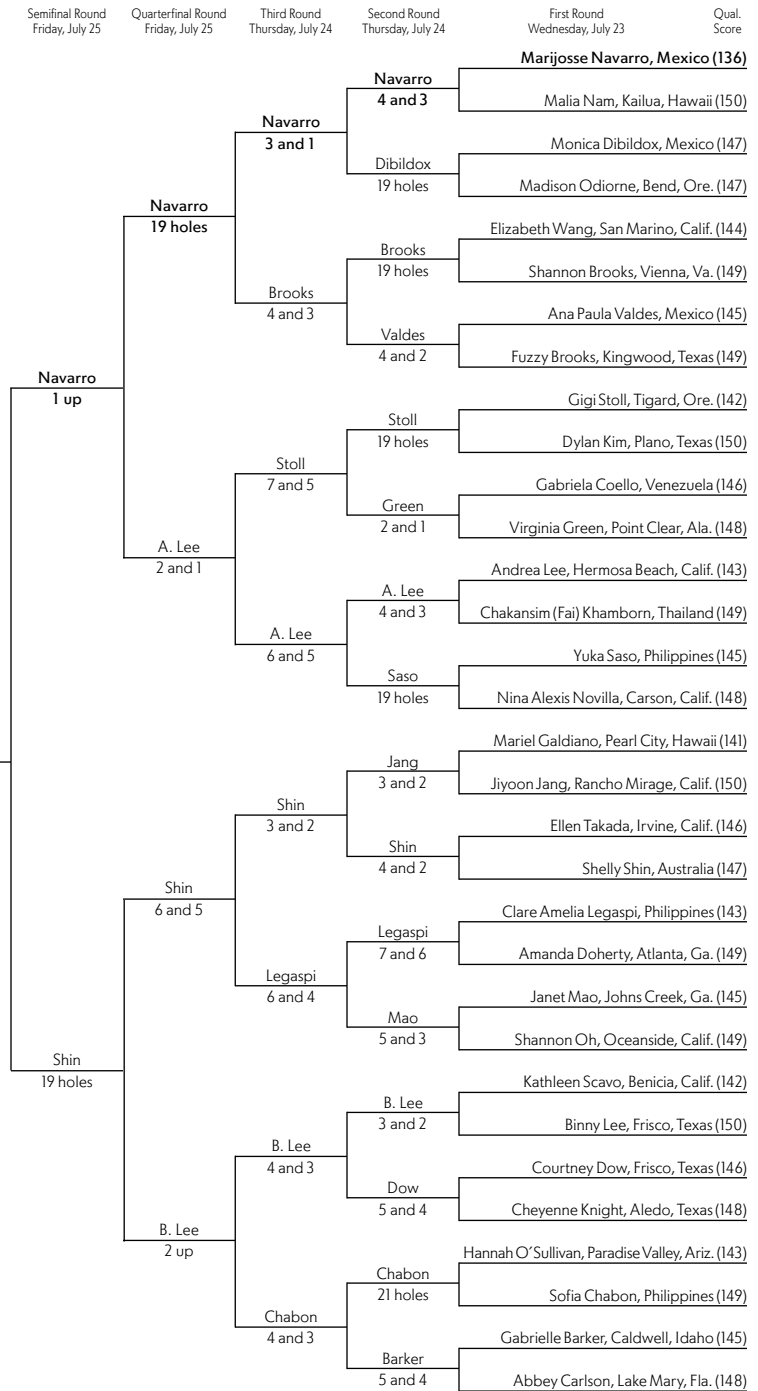

## Championship History

The U.S. Girls' Junior Championship was established in 1949, one year after the U.S. Junior Amateur Championship. Philadelphia (Pa.) Country Club, one of the oldest golf courses in the nation, was the host club for the USGA's newest championship. The club's Bala Course was constructed in 1891, three years before the birth of the USGA.

The inaugural Girls' Junior drew a starting field of 28 girls from 17 states, although 10 of the players were from the Philadelphia area.

More impressive than the size of the field or the styles of play was the wonderful spirit and sportsmanship the contestants brought to the game, and their complete lack of pretense.

The first champion, 15-year-old Marlene Bauer, came all the way from Los Angeles to win her first national golf title. While golf for girls beyond the club level was still a novelty, Bauer had been encouraged by her father, a golf professional, since the age of 3. Her victory in the first Girls' Junior was the springboard for a long and distinguished career.

The championship has also helped launch the careers of such outstanding players as Mickey Wright, who won in 1952 and later captured four U.S. Women's Open Championships, and JoAnne Gunderson Carner, who won the first of her eight USGA titles in the 1956 Girls' Junior. Nancy Lopez won in 1972 and 1974, interrupted in 1973 by Amy Alcott, who went on to win the Women's Open in 1980.

Considering the brevity and time limitations on a junior golf career, Hollis Stacy's record of three consecutive Girls' Junior Championships, from 1969 to 1971, is among the most remarkable accomplishments in USGA history. Stacy, however, never made it easy. The final matches of her first two championships went 18 holes. In her last victory, in 1971, Stacy needed 4-under-par golf to eventually defeat Alcott at the 19th hole. From the third through the 17th holes, neither player made a bogey; between them they made nine birdies. The match is regarded as one of the finest in USGA history.

With her last victory, Stacy became only the seventh golfer to win USGA championships in three successive years. She later won the Women's Open Championship in 1977, 1978 and 1984.

Kay Cornelius, the 1981 winner, is among the noteworthy champions. Her mother, Kathy Cornelius, won the 1956 U.S. Women's Open. They remain the only mother-daughter tandem to have captured USGA championships.

While victory in the U.S. Girls' Junior by no means guarantees a successful career in women's golf, Girls' Junior champions have won the Women's Amateur 11 times and the Women's Open 12 times. Furthermore, 19 Girls' Junior champions have gone on to represent the USA on the Curtis Cup Team through 2014, including such names as Heather Farr, Gunderson Carner, Lopez, Stacy and Lexi Thompson.

## Zalatoris Wins the 2014 Championship

In a memorable match that was closer than the final score indicated, William Zalatoris, of Plano, Texas, defeated Davis Riley, of Hattiesburg, Miss., 5 and 3, to win the 2014 U.S. Junior Amateur Championship at The Club at Carlton Woods' Nicklaus Course. It is the first USGA championship title for Zalatoris and the second consecutive U.S. Junior runner-up finish for Riley.

"This is the one I've always wanted to win," said Zalatoris, who was making his fifth and final appearance in the championship he first qualified for when he was 12. "This is the tournament that really pushed me to play golf. And I really, really wanted to win this, and this is the first week that I really felt like I could do it. My emotions are running like crazy."

The battle between these two accomplished 17-year-olds began at 8 a.m. CDT and got off to the kind of start that is worthy of a championship final. Zalatoris and Riley hit their approach shots to the par-4 first hole to 25 feet and 15 feet, respectively, and both drained the birdie putts. It was one of four holes that they would halve with birdies in a match that was rarely without precise shot-making and clutch putting.

The players went back and forth between 1 up and all square through the 10th hole. Riley made his first surge after that, birdieing 11 and 12, the latter when he knocked in a curling, downhill putt from the back fringe on the 160-yard par 3.

The 2-up margin was short-lived, however. Zalatoris won the next hole to cut the deficit in half, and the players arrived at the dramatic par-5 18th hole, which has been the site of clutch shots and exciting finishes all week, with Riley nursing a 1-up lead.

On 18, both players hit wayward drives and had to lay up, and Zalatoris was first to play his third. He executed a near-perfect shot from 105 yards that landed close to the hole and settled 5 feet away. Riley, trying to match it, instead came up just short in the greenside bunker, and Zalatoris rolled in the birdie to square the match at the midway point.

"It did mean a lot, having a little bit of momentum," said Zalatoris about the birdie on 18. "The morning was awesome, just back and forth. And this afternoon I really played the round of my life."

Indeed, Zalatoris emerged from the lunch break with his foot on the gas. He birdied the first two holes — the 19th and 20th of the match — to take his first 2-up lead of the day. Though Riley birdied the next hole to cut the margin to 1 up, it was clear that Zalatoris was on top of his game and Riley, though also playing well, would have a hard time regaining the lead.

With Zalatoris holding a 3-up advantage through 30 holes, the match was effectively decided over the next two holes. On the par-5 13th hole (the 31st of the match), Riley hit a driver off the deck from more than 275 yards, reaching the first cut of rough just short and right of the green. His chip ran roughly 8 feet past the hole, but with Zalatoris facing a 4-footer for par, it was Riley's chance to get to within 2 down of his opponent. The putt stopped one inch to the right of the hole, much to Riley's frustration.

The 437-yard 14th hole is fairly straight but has a narrow fairway and a difficult green that slopes away from the players. Here, on the 32nd hole of the match, Riley hooked his drive into the rough on the left yet hit a lovely approach shot that bounced in the front of the green and rolled over a ridge to within 10 feet of the hole. Zalatoris, from the middle of the fairway, then hit the shot of the championship.

From 119 yards, he selected his 56-degree wedge and, sticking to the game plan that he and his caddie, Scott Fawcett, had agreed upon, Zalatoris took dead aim at the flagstick. The shot soared high and landed just short of the hole, then took one hop and went in for an eagle-2 that must have felt like a dagger to a stunned Riley.

"That's the shot I'll never forget," said Zalatoris. "That hole has been giving me fits all week. To see that go in and not have to deal with putting on that green was great satisfaction. I really had to slow myself down after that."

Four up and dormie, Zalatoris needed to simply avoid a big mistake to gain the victory. He ripped a drive down the middle of the fairway on the next hole and reached the green safely, while Riley missed long and left with his approach. Zalatoris ended up with a conceded par and the 5-and-3 victory, soaking in the applause and adulation of his family, friends and the gallery.

"You know, this one, it touches my heart, to be honest with you," said Zalatoris. "Just spin this trophy around and look at the names, it's amazing."

The victory continued a sizzling summer for Zalatoris, who won the Texas State Amateur in June and the Trans-Miss Championship in July.

Riley, who became the only player in U.S. Junior Amateur history to lose in two finals, was magnanimous in defeat.

"He played well, and congrats to him," said Riley. "I'm really proud of how I played. I didn't beat myself; he just deserved it."

### Leaders

Round 1 — Davis Riley, at 5-under 67, by one stroke over Joshua Sedeno and Sam Horsfield. Round 2 — Sean Crocker and Horsfield were medalists at 7-under 137, by one stroke over Riley, Will Grimmer and Dominic Foos.

### Cut

At 5-over 149, with a 9-for-5 playoff that lasted two holes to determine the final match-play spots.

### Weather

Partly cloudy and light winds with temperatures topping out in the low 90s for stroke play on Monday and Tuesday. Cloudy to partly-cloudy skies with temperatures again in the low 90s for first-round matches on Wednesday. Sunny skies and temperatures in the mid-90s, with slightly breezier conditions, were in effect from Thursday to Saturday for the remaining rounds.

### Notes

The Club at Carlton Woods' Nicklaus Course, which opened for play in 2001, hosted its third USGA championship, following the 2007 USGA Men's and Women's State Team Championships, also held on the club's companion Fazio Course ... The course, at 7,284 yards, was the second-longest in U.S. Junior Amateur history ... The U.S. Junior Amateur was held in the state of Texas for the third time ... There were 17 fully exempt players in the field, including 2013 runner-up Davis Riley but not 2013 champion Scottie Scheffler, who turned 18 prior to the championship and was ineligible ... Fourteen of the 17 exempt players advanced to match play, and three of the four semifinalists were exempt, though not eventual champion William Zalatoris ... One exempt player, Will Grimmer, played in the 2014 U.S. Open at Pinehurst No. 2 ... Three players in the field — Zecheng Dou, Sam Horsfield

and Easton Paxton — competed in the week before in the 2014 U.S. Amateur Public Links Championship in Newton, Kan. ... The field had players from 39 U.S. states and 13 countries, including Australia, Canada, China, Chinese Taipei, Colombia, England, Germany, India, Korea, Mexico, Norway and Singapore ... Riley shot a 5-under 67 to lead after the first round of stroke play, one stroke ahead of Horsfield and Joshua Sedeno ... Sean Crocker and Horsfield were co-medalists following the second round of stroke play, with 36-hole totals of 7-under 137 ... Eric Bae, who shot a first-round 76, followed it up with a second-round 67 that included a championship-record 29 on his inward nine ... A nine-way playoff for the final five match play spots commenced on Tuesday evening at the par-3 12th hole, where Justin Conant and Joshua McCarthy each made birdie to advance. The playoff continued at the par-5 13th hole, where David Laskin and Priyanshu Singh birdie and Dylan McCabe made a par to fill out the 64-player bracket ... Only two matches in the Round of 64 were decided in extra holes ... Charles Kim was disqualified when he was found to be in breach of Rule 14-3 during his round of 64 match against Philip Barbaree. Kim used an alignment device during his stipulated round ... Zalatoris was making his fifth appearance in the U.S. Junior Amateur, tying the championship record. He first qualified for the championship in 2009 as a 12-year-old, and narrowly missed qualifying for the 2013 U.S. Junior Amateur. No one has ever qualified for six U.S. Juniors ... Of the four semifinalists, only Riley did not already have a spot in the field at the 2014 U.S. Amateur at Atlanta Athletic Club, which he earned by making the championship final ... Zalatoris became the sixth Texan since 1999 to win the U.S. Junior Amateur.

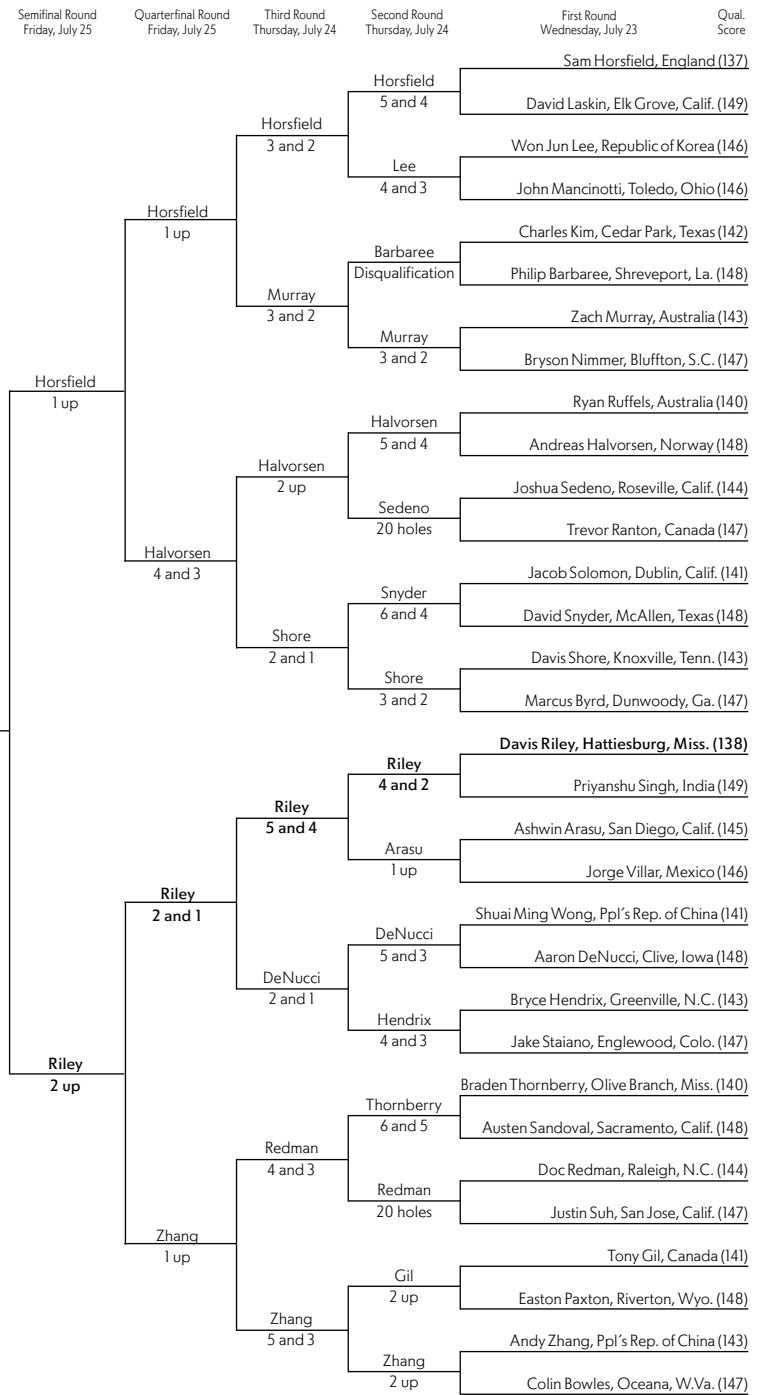

## Championship History

In 1948, the USGA inaugurated the U.S. Junior Amateur Championship to determine the best junior golfer in the United States and also to help junior golfers learn how to realize the most from the game, win or lose.

The Junior Amateur was hardly the first junior competition to attract a national field. The Western Junior had been established in 1914. In 1946, two more competitions appeared, each with a claim on the national title. One was sponsored by the U.S. Junior Chamber of Commerce, the other by the Hearst Newspapers.

The first U.S. Junior Amateur was played at the University of Michigan Golf Course and drew 495 entries. The starting field of 128 players was determined by sectional qualifying rounds at 41 sites. Dean Lind, of Rockford, Ill., was the first champion. Lind defeated Ken Venturi, of San Francisco, a future U.S. Open champion, in the final.

By 1963, entries had surged to 2,230, a record for the 13th consecutive year. At the time, there was no handicap limitation for entrants. That changed in 1964 when a handicap limit of 10 strokes was introduced. In 1999, the championship attracted a record 4,508 entries.

In 1978, the USGA conducted the Junior Amateur over the South Course of the Wilmington (Del.) Country Club, while the Girls' Junior was being staged on the North Course. This was the first time the USGA conducted two national championships simultaneously at the same golf club.

The Junior Amateur is among the most difficult of all USGA championships to win due to two factors: the age limit and the tremendous number of fine young players who enter each year. Only one player, Tiger Woods, has won the Junior Amateur three times, winning in 1991, 1992 and 1993. Jordan Spieth, who first won in 2009, became the second player to claim more than one title when he won the 2011 championship. In fact, only seven players have reached the final at least twice: Mason Rudolph (1949, 1950), Eddie Pearce (1968, 1969), Mike Brannan (1971, 1973); Tim Straub (1982, 1983); Woods; Spieth; and Jim Liu (2010, 2012).

Woods, who was 15 years, 6 months and 28 days old when he won in 1991, was the youngest champion until 2010. At 14 years, 11 months and 15 days, Liu broke Woods' record by more than six months with his victory.

The Junior Amateur has another, more dubious, distinction. It is the only USGA championship for which Jack Nicklaus has been eligible that he did not win at least once. Nicklaus qualified for the championship five times; however, his best finish came in 1956, when he was a semifinalist.

The Junior Amateur remains today an educational opportunity as well as a competitive outlet. Pre-championship players' dinners have attracted guest speakers such as Francis Ouimet, Arnold Palmer, Johnny Miller and Annika Sorenstam, all willing to share their knowledge and experience with young players.

### U.S. Women's Amateur Championship Trophy

The Cox Trophy was presented in 1896 by Robert Cox of Gorgie, Edinburgh, Scotland, a member of Britain's Parliament. It is a 2-foot-high silver vase of Etruscan design and the only USGA trophy donated by a person from another country. The Cox Trophy is the oldest survivor among trophies for USGA championships. ## Gillman Wins the 2014 Championship

Kristen Gillman earned a come-from-behind 2-up victory over Brooke Mackenzie Henderson in the 36-hole championship match of the 2014 U.S. Women's Amateur Championship, being conducted at the 6,297-yard, par-70 Nassau Country Club.

Gillman, 16, of Austin, Texas, was 3 down through 26 holes to Henderson, 16, of Canada. But Gillman, a junior at Lake Travis High School, birdied five of the final 10 holes to complete the remarkable rally.

"I just keep fighting because I don't want to leave here without the ultimate prize," said Gillman, who has verbally committed to the University of Alabama for the fall of 2016. Gillman rallied from deficits in all six of her Women's Amateur matches, including an inspired comeback from 4 down with six to play against Su-Hyun Oh in her 20-hole quarterfinal win on Friday.

"I wanted to get my name on the trophy, but that's not necessarily success for me," said Henderson, No. 2 in the Women's World Amateur Golf Ranking™ and low amateur at this year's U.S. Women's Open. "I played well, and I had a lot of fun this week."

Henderson struck first, nearly reaching the par-5 fourth in two and making a 6-foot birdie.

She maintained the advantage to the par-4 ninth, where Gillman holed a 20-foot birdie putt to put pressure on her opponent. Henderson's birdie attempt rolled just left of the hole to square the match.

Gillman grabbed her first 1-up lead at the par-4 12th after Henderson made a poor approach shot from the right rough and missed her par putt. Just short of the green in two, Gillman pitched 4 feet above the hole and converted the par putt.

But Henderson immediately atoned for her mistake. After Gillman three-putted for bogey at the par-4 13th, Henderson nailed a 3-foot comebacker to win the whole.

Henderson caught fire at the end of the morning round. She stuffed her wedge approach from 116 yards to within a foot at No. 17 for a conceded birdie, and Gillman's pitch-and-run from the left rough just short of the green rolled 4 feet past the hole. Henderson closed out the round with another beautiful approach for a 7-foot birdie and a 2-up lead.

Following the lunch break, Henderson went on another hot streak, winning holes 25 and 26 to build a 3-up lead, her largest of the match.

Desperately in need of a pick-me-up, Gillman directed her thoughts to the previous week's Junior PGA Championship, where she posted a runaway 11-stroke win.

"I kept hitting shots right into the pin," said Gillman, who earned berths in the 2015 Swinging Skirts LPGA Classic and the 2014 Junior Ryder Cup in Scotland by virtue of her Junior PGA win. "That's what I did all last week, and so I thought I'd get back to what I was doing then."

Those positive thoughts worked, as Gillman's birdie-3 at the 27th marked the beginning of her comeback. After sticking her approach to 2 feet, Gillman watched Henderson's birdie try run a foot past. She knocked in her short putt to pull within two.

Another birdie, this one from 15 feet at the par-4 30th, brought Gillman within one hole. She completed the comeback with a tough, uphill birdie putt from 8 feet at No. 32.

Gillman's first afternoon lead came courtesy of her near-flawless approach shots. Gillman again stuffed her wedge approach at the par-5 33rd hole to 2 feet. Henderson's pitch from 75 yards sailed long, and her birdie try veered left.

"She was throwing darts, and that definitely affected my game a little bit," said Henderson. "I was trying to match it, and a couple holes I was able to, and others I just didn't."

Henderson had a prime opportunity to square the match at the par-3 34th hole. But after putting her tee shot within 10 feet, she two-putted for par.

Gillman had her own opportunity at the par-4 35th, this one to end the match. After another beautiful 9-iron approach to 3 feet, Gillman uncharacteristically sent her birdie putt 2 feet past the hole.

"I was definitely nervous," said Gillman. "I think it showed a little bit on 17. ... I had to just calm myself down and not think about it."

Gillman's sparkling ball-striking again gave her a tremendous advantage at the 36th hole. Another 9-iron approach was stuffed within 2 feet. And when Henderson failed to convert her 7-footer for birdie, Gillman calmly tapped in for the victory.

"Ball-striking has always been a strength," said Gillman. "I hit a lot of fairways and a lot of greens, and then throughout the last year my ball-striking has gone a lot better."

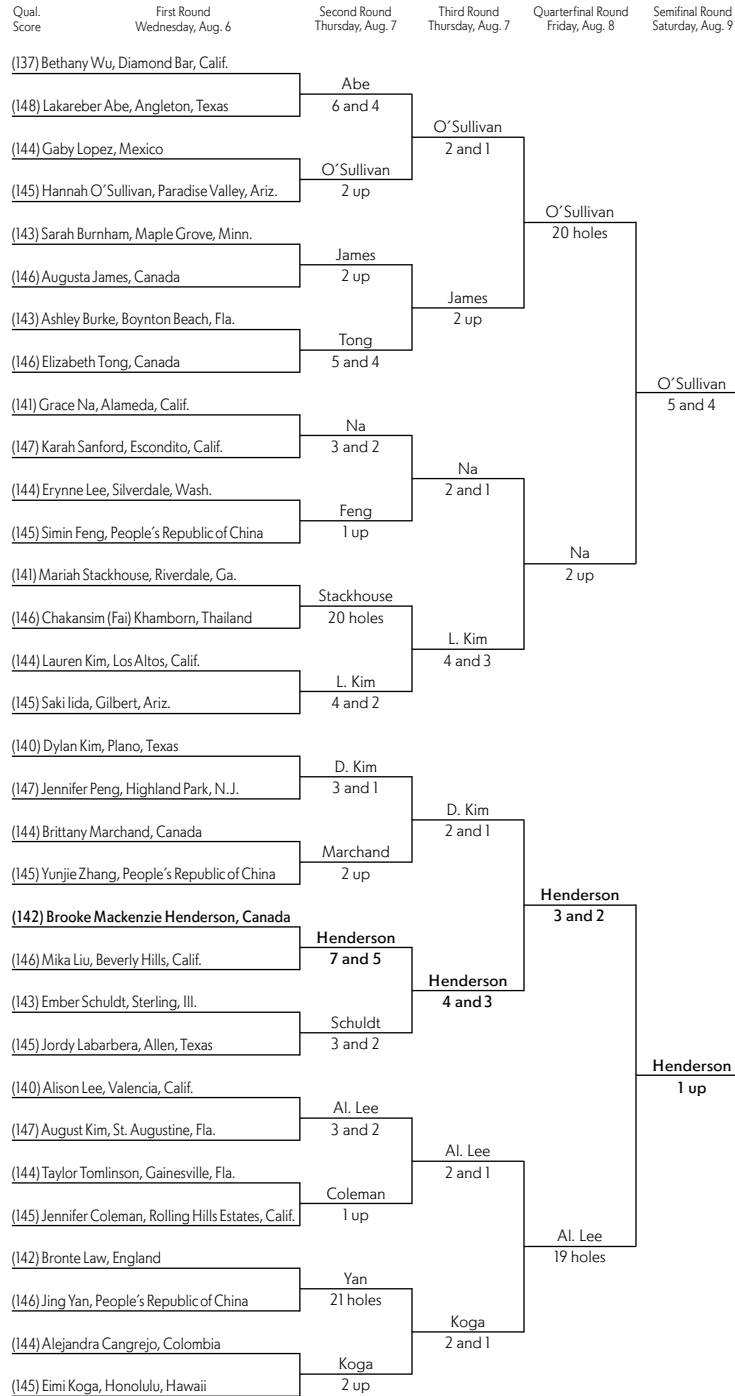

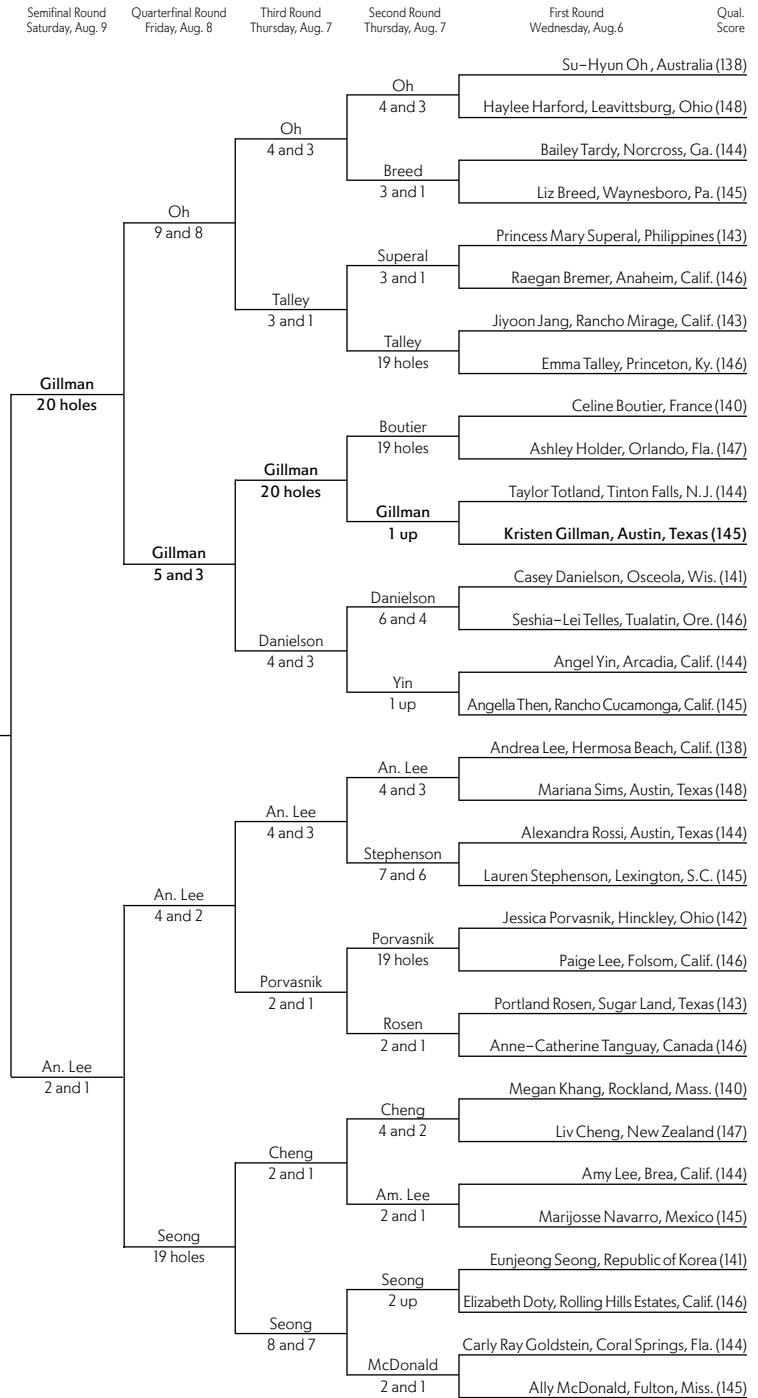

## Championship History

The U.S. Women's Amateur Championship marks the beginning of women's competitive golf in this country. Along with the U.S. Amateur and the U.S. Open, the Women's Amateur was one of the USGA's first three championships.

The first Women's Amateur Championship was arranged one month after the 1895 Amateur and Open Championships.

The following small item appeared in the social column of a New York newspaper shortly after the completion of play: "Thirteen ladies played 18 holes of golf at the Meadow Brook Club, in Hempstead, recently. Mrs. Charles S. Brown, whose husband plays at the Shinnecock Hills Club, in Southampton, L.I., made the best score and thus won the United States championship for lady golfers."

Very few early golf clubs encouraged women to play. There were exceptions, of course, most notably Shinnecock Hills, whose private property the Women's Amateur title would become for the first four years. When Lucy Barnes Brown elected not to defend in 1896, Shinnecock came up with a replacement in Beatrix Hoyt, who would become its best-known player. Hoyt, the granddaughter of Supreme Court Chief Justice Salmon P. Chase, won the next three championships.

Although a stroke-play format was selected for the first championship, the Women's Amateur became a match-play competition in 1896 and has remained so since.

The most noteworthy champion is Glenna Collett Vare, a lifelong amateur who won the Cox Trophy a record six times. In the 1920s and 1930s, Vare was the darling of the sports world, much as Bob Jones was during that era.

Second only to Vare is JoAnne Gunderson Carner, who won five U.S. Women's Amateur Championships. Combined with her two wins in the U.S. Women's Open and one victory in the U.S. Girls' Junior, Carner's record of eight USGA titles is eclipsed only by Jones and Tiger Woods, who have each won nine.

U.S. Women's Amateur champions seem to possess a remarkable facility to repeat. Beatrix Hoyt, Alexa Stirling, Vare, Virginia Van Wie and Juli Simpson Inkster have all won the U.S. Women's Amateur three times consecutively. Another seven champions — Genevieve Hecker, Dorothy Campbell, Margaret Curtis, Betty Jameson, Kay Cockerill, Kelli Kuehne and Danielle Kang — have won twice in succession.

The U.S. Women's Amateur has long identified some of golf's greatest female players, many of whom have gone on to successful professional careers. Along with the champions listed above, Patty Berg, Babe Didrikson Zaharias, Louise Suggs, Marlene Stewart Streit, Anne Quast Sander, Barbara McIntire, Catherine Lacoste, Carol Semple Thompson, Beth Daniel, Morgan Pressel and Lydia Ko have secured a place in golf history.

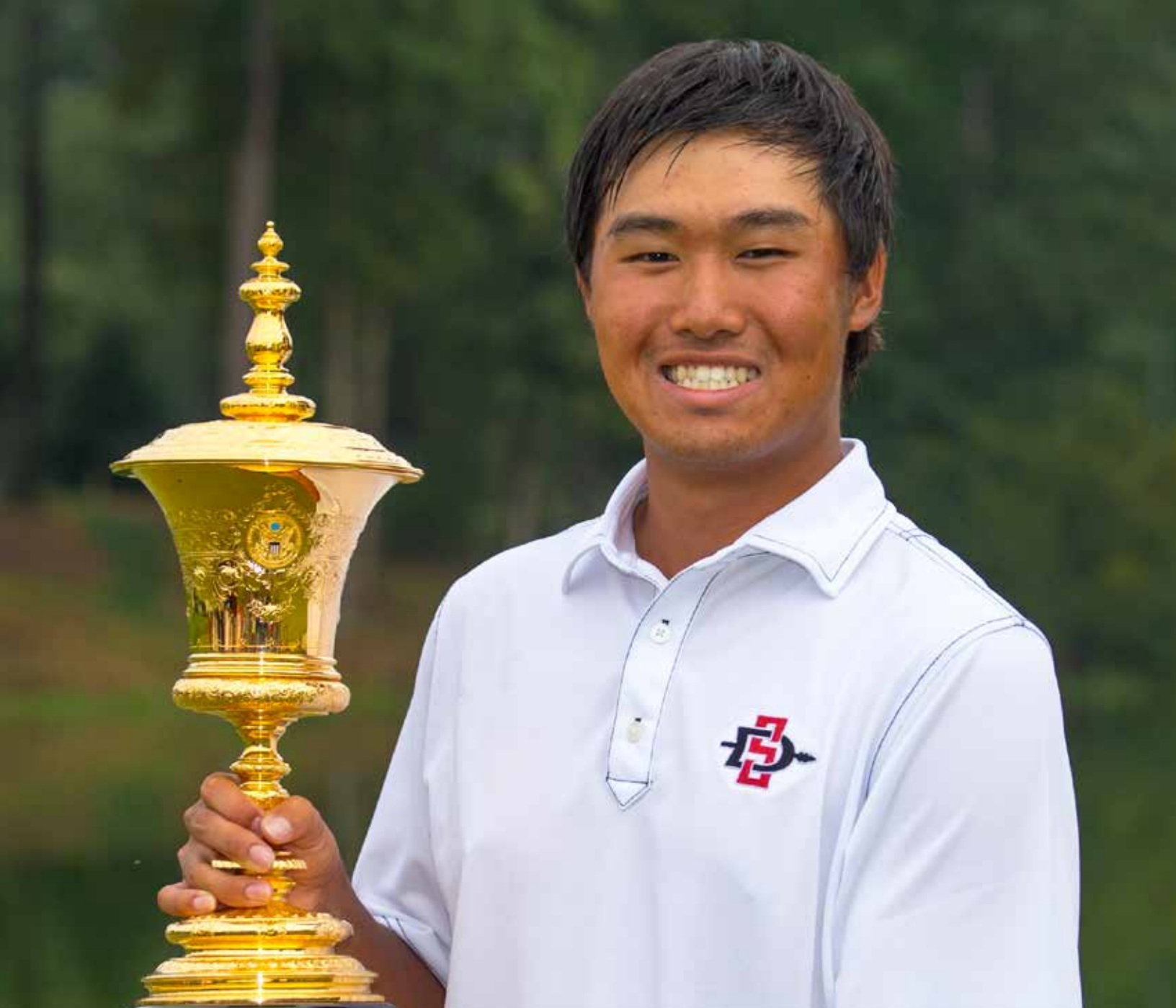

### **U.S. Amateur Championship Trophy**

The original U.S. Amateur Championship Trophy, the Havemeyer Trophy, was destroyed by a fire in 1925 at East Lake Country Club in Atlanta, Ga., where it was being displayed by virtue of Robert T. ## Yang Wins the 2014 Championship

Gunn Yang, 20, of the Republic of Korea, defeated Corey Conners, of Canada, 2 and 1, in the 36-hole final match to win the 2014 U.S. Amateur Championship at Atlanta Athletic Club's 7,208-yard, par-71 Highlands Course.

"I was just trying to make it to the match-play portion, really," said Yang, a San Diego State University sophomore who had back surgery in May 2013. "That was the goal, first of all. And then when I made it to the match play, I was like, maybe I can do this. I was just trying to go through by every single match, just trying to play my game and trying to see how it goes, and I got the trophy. So, I'm really excited and really happy about it."

Yang, who grew up in Korea and played competitive amateur golf in Australia for five years, is the second Korean-born player to win the U.S. Amateur, joining Byeong-Hun An, who claimed the title at Southern Hills Country Club in Tulsa, Okla., in 2009.

Conners, 22, a recent graduate of Kent State University in Ohio who lost to eventual champion Matt Fitzpatrick in the 2013 semifinals, was vying to become the first Canadian winner since Gary Cowan in 1971. He was the first player since Patrick Cantlay in 2010 (semifinals) and 2011 (final) to advance to at least the semifinals in back-to-back years.

Yang, who was playing in his first U.S. Amateur after qualifying on July 21 at Hacienda Golf Club in La Habra Heights, Calif., held a 1-up lead through the morning 18 holes. He never trailed in the match.

"I haven't won a tournament for a long time, like maybe five or six years," said Yang. "I was going through my injury, also. I was just trying to play my game. Obviously, it just popped in my head that if I beat Corey, then I win the trophy. But, I was just trying to concentrate and just trying to hit balls and just put it next to the hole and make the putt."

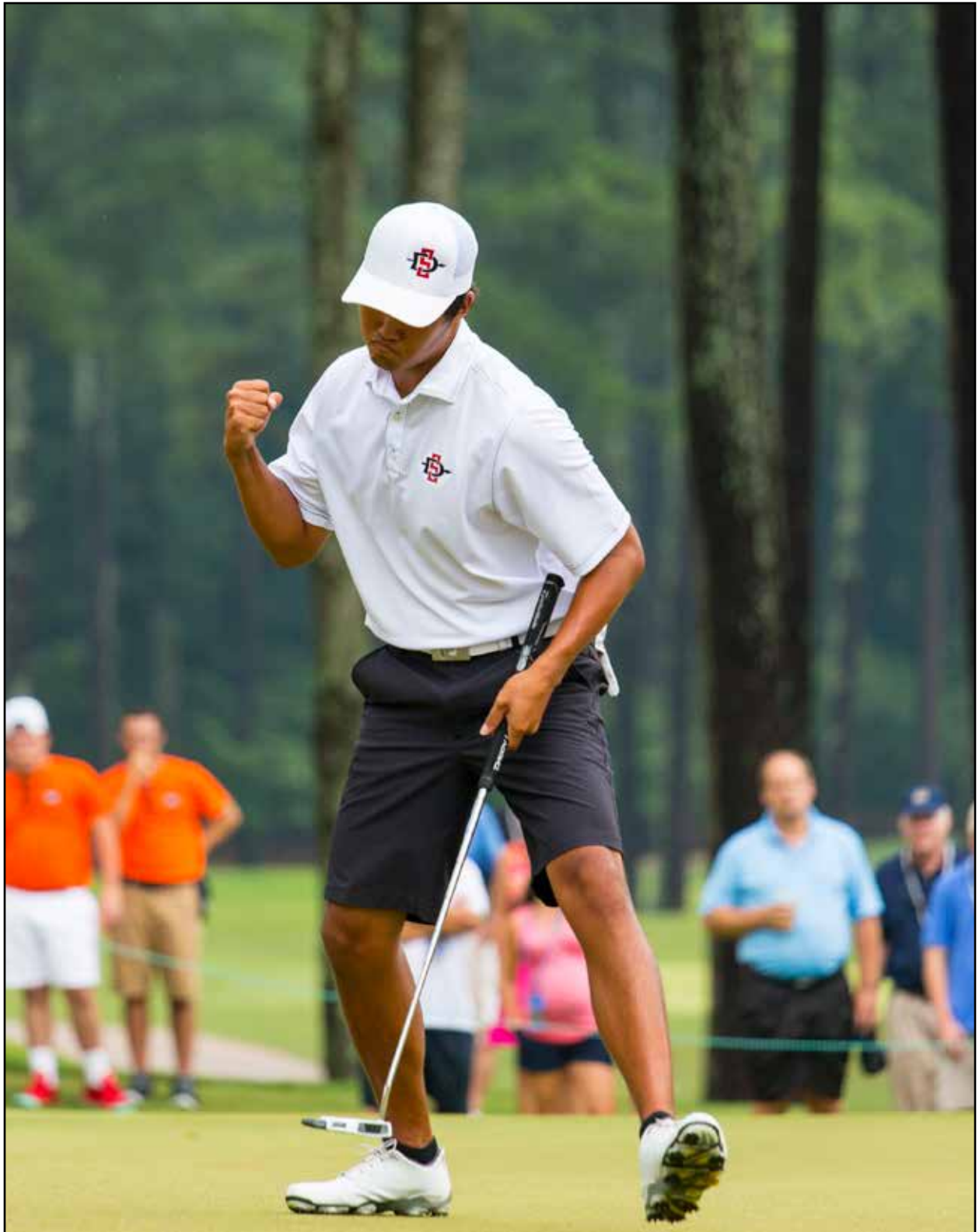
Conners, a member of the Canadian national team, won the first hole of the afternoon 18 to square the match and that status held until Yang won the 24th and 25th holes for a 2-up advantage.

Yang led 1 up through 28 holes when the match was suspended at 4:25 p.m. because of dangerous weather. Both players had hit their drives in the fairway on the 29th hole. Play resumed at 6:02 p.m.

"He struck the ball great," Conners said of Yang. "He made a lot of key putts when he needed to and didn't really have any weaknesses out there. He didn't give me any openings to climb through."

Yang's sloping, 18-foot birdie putt on the 32nd hole pushed him to 2-up. Conners, the Mid-American Conference co-player of the year, missed birdie opportunities on the next three holes and Yang's two-putt for a halving par on the par-3 35th hole closed the match.

"Especially the second round, I had a lot of looks for birdie," Conners said. "I had a bunch of birdie tries. I thought I hit nice putts. They just slipped by and that was kind of frustrating not to have any of those drop and win some holes."

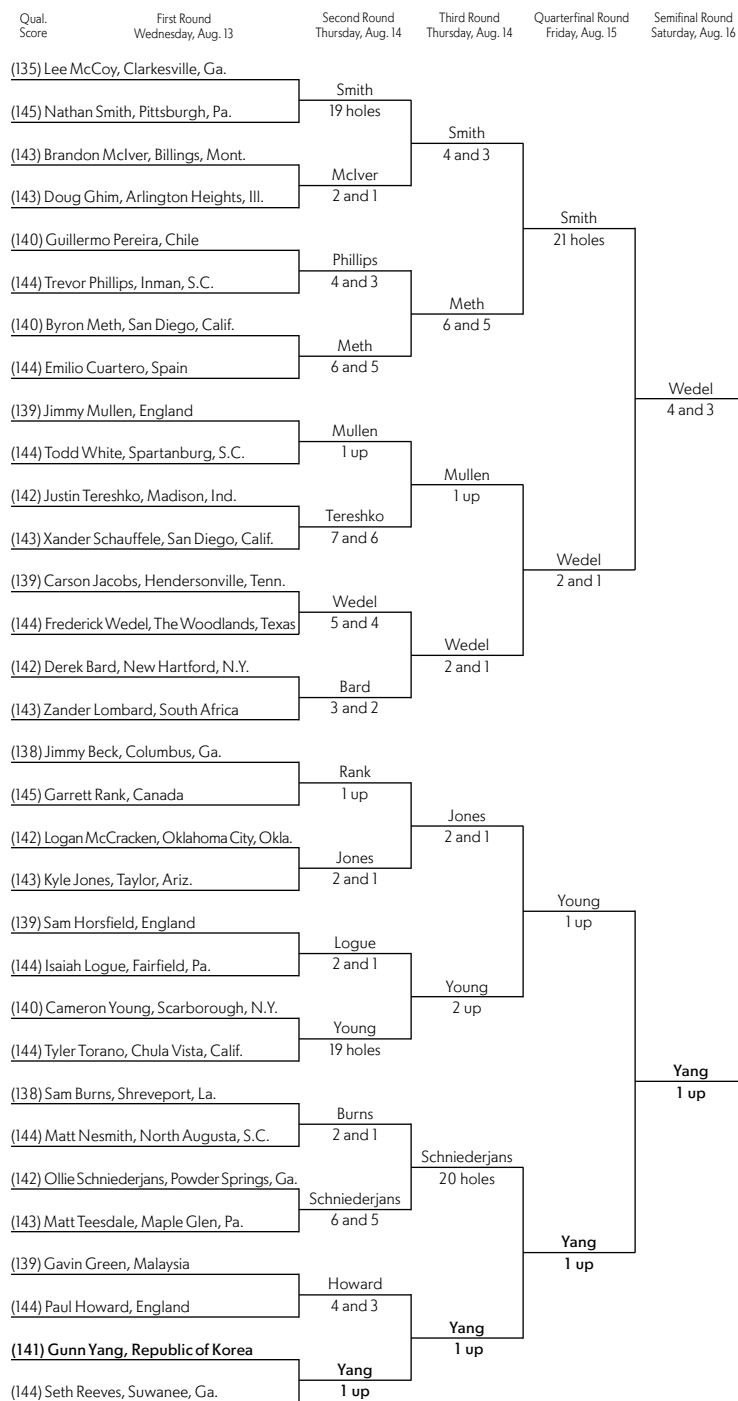

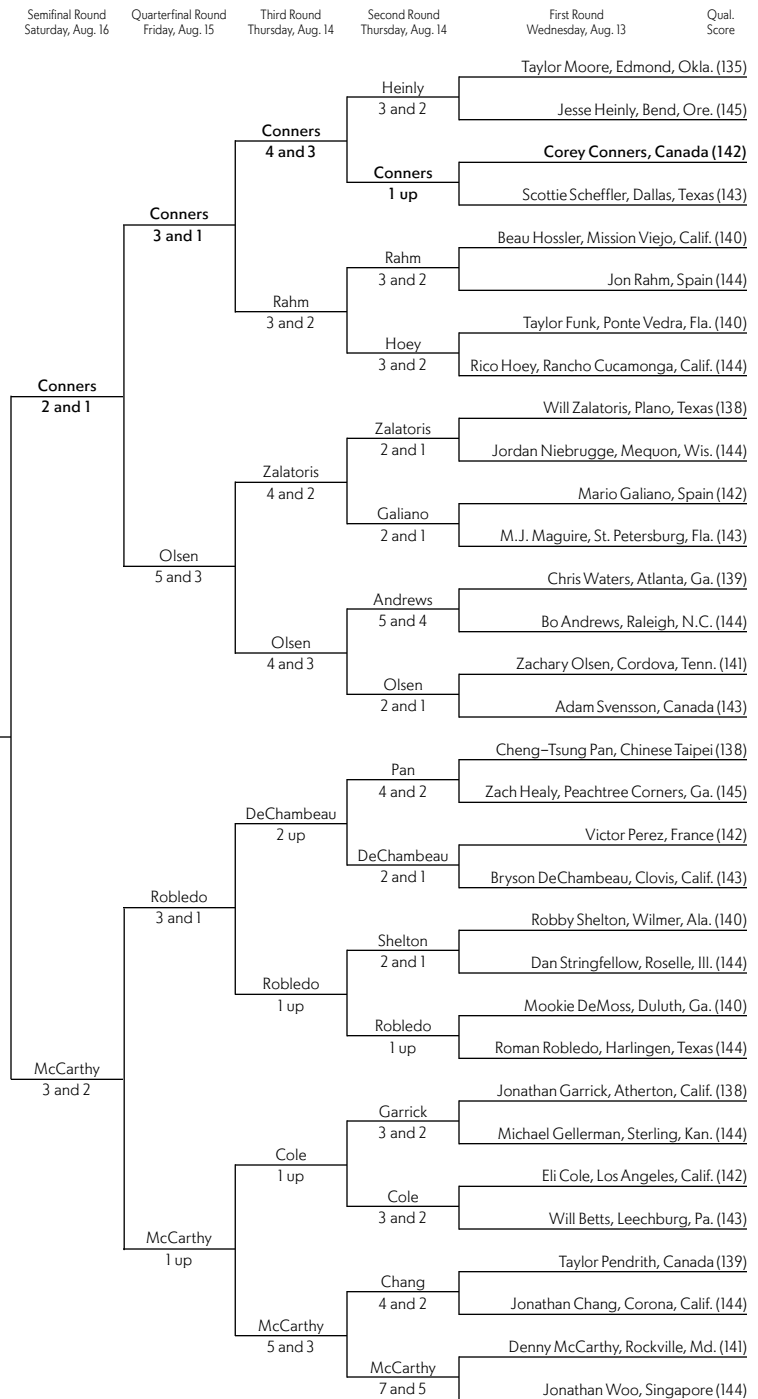

The U.S. Amateur Championship was born in 1895 because of a controversy. In 1894, two clubs — Newport (R.I.) Golf Club and New York's St. Andrew's Golf Club — had conducted invitational tournaments to attract the nation's top amateur players.

Newport's stroke-play tournament was won by club member W.G. Lawrence, who triumphed over a field of 20 competitors. The match-play competition at St. Andrews attracted 27 golfers and was won by Laurence Stoddart of the host club.

Both clubs proclaimed their winners as the national champion. Clearly, golf needed a national governing body to conduct national championships, develop a single set of rules for all golfers to follow and promote the best interests of the game. With that, representatives from five clubs founded the USGA on Dec. 22, 1894.

As a result, in 1895, its first full year of operation, the USGA conducted Amateur, Open and Women's Amateur Championships. The Amateur and Open Championships were conducted at Newport Golf Club during the same week of October and Charles B. Macdonald became the first U.S. Amateur champion.

The Amateur Championship is the oldest golf championship in this country — one day older than the U.S. Open. Except for an eight-year period from 1965–1972, when it was stroke play, the Amateur has been a match-play championship.

Over the years, as interest in the game grew and the number of quality players increased, it became necessary to establish a national handicapping system to determine who was eligible to compete in the Amateur. The USGA's first national handicap

list, which was published for the 1912 championship, was the forerunner of the present-day USGA Handicap System.

Throughout its history, the U.S. Amateur has been the most coveted of all amateur titles. Many of the great names of professional golf, such as Gene Littler, Arnold Palmer, Jack Nicklaus, Lanny Wadkins, Craig Stadler, Jerry Pate, Mark O'Meara, Hal Sutton, Phil Mickelson and Tiger Woods, grace the Havemeyer Trophy.

It was, however, longtime amateur Robert T. Jones Jr. who first attracted media coverage and spectator attendance at the Amateur Championship. Jones captured the championship five times (1924, 1925, 1927, 1928, 1930). His 1930 victory was a stunning moment in golf history when, at Merion Cricket Club in Ardmore, Pa., Jones rounded out the Grand Slam, winning the four major American and British championships in one year.

Sixty-six years later, in 1996, Tiger Woods attracted similar interest and enthusiasm when he won a record third consecutive U.S. Amateur at Pumpkin Ridge Golf Club in North Plains, Ore. In 1994, Woods, at 18, had first entered the record book as the youngest ever to win the Amateur Championship. In 1996, he broke yet another record when he won, having registered 18 consecutive match-play victories.

International players also have made a major impact in the last 15 years, with Nick Flanagan (Australia), Edoardo Molinari (Italy), Richie Ramsay (Scotland), Danny Lee (New Zealand), Byeong-Hun An (Korea), Matthew Fitzpatrick (England) and Gunn Yang (Korea) taking the title in 2003, 2005, 2006, 2008, 2009, 2013 and 2014, respectively.

## 2015 Conditions of Play

### The Teams

All states and the District of Columbia and Puerto Rico may enter teams of three players. Entries are open to female amateur golfers whose permanent residence is in the state they represent and who have been nominated by the USGA-designated state or regional golf association. College golfers are not eligible under NCAA rules.

### Format

54 holes of stroke play; 18 holes played on each of three days.

### Scoring

In each round, the total of the two lowest scores by players on each team constitutes the team score for the round. The three-day total is the team's score for the championship.

## New Jersey Wins the 2013 Championship

Led by a record-setting three days from 17-year-old Alice Chen, New Jersey captured a three-stroke victory over Florida at the 2013 USGA Women's State Team Championship, conducted at the par-73, 6,153-yard South Course at NCR Country Club. It is the state's first victory in the 10 times the championship has been contested, besting a previous high of seventh in 2011.

"To be in this position right now was not even in my scope of reference," said New Jersey's playing captain Tara Fleming, 46, of Jersey City. "These young ladies are such great players and it's just a thrill to be in their company."

Chen tied the championship's single-round, 36-hole and 54-hole scoring records and helped her team to a 54-hole score of 8-over 446. Florida returned an 11-over 449, followed by a surging Virginia at 12-over 450. First-round leader Arizona finished fourth at 13-over 451, with Maryland rounding out the top five at 16-over 454.

Chen, of Princeton, shared medalist honors with fellow 17-year-old Bryana Nguyen, of Columbia, Md. Their 6-under 213s tied the low mark held by Brenda Corrie Kuehn, of North Carolina (1997), Marla Jemsek-Weeks, of Florida (1997) and Candace Schepperle, of Alabama (2005).

New Jersey withstood an early, final-round charge from Arizona, which at one point was 4 under par for the day and held the lead at six over. But Chen and teammate Cindy Ha kept thinking back to the sage advice that they received from Fleming during a practice round the previous week at New Jersey National Golf Club.

"We wanted to finish within the top seven, because New Jersey finished seventh two years ago," said Chen, a high school senior who will attend Furman University in the fall of 2014. "But after that was brought up, the entire time we just wanted to have fun. You're going to play good if you have fun. Those were Tara's wise words."

New Jersey's patience, combined with Arizona's slide to a 3-over-par total for the day, brought the Judy Bell Trophy to New Jersey for the first time. Chen returned a 1-over 74 on Thursday, her highest score of the championship. Ha bounced back from an 81 on Wednesday to card her personal championship-best round of 2-over 75, while Fleming added a non-scoring 82.

Ha, 17, of Demarest, opened with four bogeys in her first six holes. As the only member of New Jersey's 2011 squad to return to the team competition, she knew that there was more riding on her shoulders than just her own performance.

"I told myself to snap out of it. You've got to get it together for your team, not for yourself," said Ha, who carded four birdies to two bogeys over her final 12 holes. "I had a really good comeback. I was just in a better mental state."

"I'm really proud of Cindy after yesterday's round," said Fleming, a reinstated amateur who returned to competitive golf in 2012 after a 16-year hiatus. "She really pulled it together today and without her this wouldn't have happened."

Florida, which came into the final round tied for the lead with New Jersey, never quite found a groove on Thursday. Four-time U.S. Women's Mid-Amateur champion Meghan Stasi, 35, of Oakland Park, returned the team's low round of 1-over 74, while Tara Joy-Connelly, 40, of Palm Beach Gardens, added a 5-over 78. Ericka Schneider, 22, of Bradenton, returned a non-counting 80.

"I should have been a lot better today," said Stasi. "I had two bad three-putts and a couple par 5s that I should have definitely done a lot better on. But I made an eagle (at the 16th hole), so that was fun."

"I got off hot today, was two under through four, and just leaked one, leaked one, so a little disappointed with my 78," added Joy-Connelly, who was competing in her first State Team for Florida, having previously represented Massachusetts. "The week was great, my teammates were great. A pleasure to be with."

Nguyen and Oklahoma's Jade Staggs returned 3-under 70s on Thursday, the lowest rounds of the day. Chen's 67 on Wednesday was the lowest round of the championship and tied the 18-hole mark shared by three others.

"I just came in with an open mind thinking I could score on this course," said Nguyen, who will attend the University of North Carolina in the fall of 2014. "This is the lowest (cumulative score) I've ever shot in a tournament. I'm really proud of it."

Two-time defending champion Georgia finished seventh and never seriously threatened to capture a fourth championship.

(2003 U.S. Women's Mid-Amateur); Mina Hardin, 53, of Fort Worth, Texas (2010 U.S. Senior Women's Amateur); and Meghan Stasi, 35, of Oakland Park, Fla. ## Championship History

The USGA Women's State Team Championship, in 1995, like the men's version, grew out of the celebration of the Association's Centennial and was fashioned after the biennial World Amateur Team Championship.

Each state was invited to send its three best players, and 43 states sent women's teams to compete for the new title at the Lake Buena Vista (Fla.) Club. State associations were given the option to choose their teams by any method, with one restriction: college players were ineligible because of NCAA bylaws. The NCAA rule states that a player may only play in an international team match when that team is sponsored by the national governing body, such as the Curtis Cup, or the Women's World Amateur Team Championship. Any infraction of that rule means the college player is faced with being declared ineligible for the remainder of the season and the following season.

As a result, the field for the Women's State Team Championship was made up almost entirely of mid-amateur and senior players. Some states used a point system to select the three-woman team. Others used the top finishers in their state championships or conducted qualifying tournaments. A few states employed a selection committee to determine team members.

Just as in the Women's World Amateur Team Championship, the Women's State Team Championship format meant that only the best two scores of each state's three players were counted on each of three days.

The winning team in the inaugural championship was from Pennsylvania and was made up of Liz Haines, of Gladwyne, Judy Oliver, of Sewickley, and Carol Semple Thompson, also of Sewickley. Oliver and Thompson have both played for the United States of America in the Curtis Cup Match. The competition was close, as Pennsylvania's score of 442 edged the Texas team by only one stroke.

While no individual prizes were awarded, Toni Wiesner, of Fort Worth, Texas, and Lancy Smith, of Snyder, N.Y., recorded the lowest individual scores. Each scored 219 for 54 holes, 3 over par.

The first Women's State Team Championship proved to be such a popular competition that the decision was made to conduct the championship every two years. Georgia holds the most titles with three (2005, 2009, 2011), and Laura Coble has been a member of all three victorious teams.

The Walker Cup Match is played by male amateur golfers, one team from the United States of America and one team from England, Ireland, Northern Ireland, Scotland and Wales (GB&I). The teams consist of not more than 10 players and a captain.

The USA Team is selected by the United States Golf Association, and the GB&I Team by The R&A.

### Schedule of Play

- Saturday, Sept. 12 — Four foursomes matches (18 holes); eight singles matches (18 holes)
- Sunday, Sept. 13 — Four foursomes matches (18 holes); 10 singles matches (18 holes)

### Scoring

Victory in a match scores one point. When a match goes 18 holes without a decision, one-half point is awarded to each side.

### Miscellaneous

The Match is held every two years, alternately in the United States of America and Great Britain and Ireland. The country winning the Match takes custody of the Walker Cup for the ensuing two years. In case of a tie, the cup stays with the previous winner until the next Match is played.



## United States of America Wins the 2013 Match

The United States of America dominated singles play on both days and defeated Great Britain and Ireland, 17–9, to win the 44th Walker Cup Match at the 6,995–yard, par–72 National Golf Links of America in Southampton, N.Y., the site of the inaugural Match in 1922.

“It’s something I have been wanting for a long, long time, particularly after we lost in 2011,” said USA Captain Jim Holtgrieve of winning the Cup. “I was hoping I would get a mulligan for ‘13 and when I knew it was going to be at National Golf Links, which is where it all started, I wanted so bad to come here. Yes. I wanted to win but I wanted to do something good for golf and this, to me, was truly good for golf.”

In winning seven of the 10 afternoon singles matches Sunday, the USA captured 13½ of the possible 18 points in the singles sessions over two days. The host team has won four of the last five Matches and has not been defeated on home soil since the USA lost in 2001.

Nathan Smith, 35, playing in his third Match, clinched the 14th point and the Match for the USA with a 4–and–3 decision over Nathan Kimsey. He is one of two mid–amateur players (25 years and older) on the USA Team and has won four U.S. Mid–Amateur Championships and played in four Masters Tournaments.

“This ranks at the top of the list,” said Smith of winning the clinching point. “I never wanted a point so much in my life. This (Match) means the most. I’m happy for Jim (Holtgrieve). Nobody deserves it more than him and loves the game of golf and put more hard work into a team than him.”

Before Smith clinched the Cup victory, the other mid–amateur, 45–year–old high school teacher Todd White, won his match over Rhys Pugh, GB&I’s star in their 2011 victory in Scotland, for the team’s 13th point.

Bobby Wyatt, one of three USA Team members from the University of Alabama’s NCAA Division I championship squad, won his foursomes and singles matches on Sunday and was undefeated for the Match. He was the team’s top point–getter with 3½.

Also recording an undefeated mark for the USA was Michael Kim of the University of California–Berkeley, who was the low amateur at the 2013 U.S. Open Championship. Kim was 3–0 with two singles wins and one foursomes victory.

Wyatt and Alabama teammate Justin Thomas won the first two matches of the Sunday singles session handily as the USA captured four of the first five matches.

“They all focused together,” Holtgrieve said. “They all played together. They all worked together and they helped each other with their games. There were no individuals. It was a team.”

“They adapted to conditions a little bit better – the greens changed and there were very, very severe pin positions,” GB&I captain Nigel Edwards said of the USA. “They holed out a little bit better and I would say the short shots into the green, the distance control, that’s where they outdid us. When they did hit it over the back they got up and down and we didn’t.”

The morning foursomes (alternate–shot) matches were split at 2–2 for a 10–6 USA lead entering the afternoon singles and the Americans needing just 3½ more points to clinch victory.

University of Alabama teammates Wyatt and Cory Whitsett snagged one of the morning foursomes points with a 2–and–1 win over Kimsey and Max Orrin.

The other USA foursomes win was by Max Homa and Kim, who edged Pugh and Garrick Porteus, 1 up.

The GB&I wins came from the teams of 2013 U.S. Amateur champion Matt Fitzpatrick and U.S. Amateur co–medalist Neil Raymond, and Gavin Moynihan and Kevin Phelan.

Fitzpatrick and Raymond topped Michael Weaver and White, 3 and 2. Moynihan and Phelan beat Patrick Rodgers and Jordan Niebrugge, 2 up, recovering from a 4–down deficit with 11 holes to play.

Fitzpatrick finished as the top scorer for GB&I with a 3–1 record.

The USA is a perfect 6–0 in Matches held in the state of New York and holds a 35–8–1 lead in the series.

## Match History

The Walker Cup Match began in the wake of World War I with a view toward stimulating golf interest on both sides of the Atlantic. The match grew in part out of two international matches between the USA and Canada, in 1919 and 1920.

At the same time, British and American amateurs considered each nation's national amateur championship a great plum. Meanwhile, the USGA Executive Committee had been invited to Great Britain for a series of meetings with the Royal and Ancient Golf Club of St. Andrews Rules Committee. The meeting was to look at the advisability of modifying various rules of the game. Among the participants was George Herbert Walker, USGA president in 1920.

Upon the Executive Committee's return to the United States of America, international team matches were discussed. The idea so appealed to Walker that he soon presented a plan and offered to donate a trophy. Walker had been a low handicap player and was a keen advocate of the game. When the press dubbed the trophy the Walker Cup, the name stuck.

In 1921, the USGA invited all golfing nations to send teams to compete in the Match, but no country was able to accept that year. The Americans stuck to their mission, however, and William C. Fownes, the 1910 U.S. Amateur champion, who had twice assembled the amateur teams that played against Canada, rounded up a third team in the spring of 1921 and took it to England. At Hoylake, the American team defeated a British team, 9-3, in an informal match the day before the British Amateur.

Early in 1922, The R&A announced that it would send a team to compete for the Walker Cup at the National Golf Links of America, Walker's home club, in Southampton, N.Y.

Originally, the competition was open to any country that might care to challenge. The USGA invited all countries to compete. Except for Great Britain, however, no other country was able to accept.

Fownes was the American captain for the inaugural match and his team consisted of Charles Evans Jr., Robert Gardner, U.S.

Amateur champion Jesse Guilford, Robert T. Jones Jr., Max Marston, Francis Ouimet, Jess Sweetser and Rudolph Knepper, who did not play.

Robert Harris was captain of the British side, and his players were Cyril Tolley, Roger Wethered, Colin Aylmer, C.V.L. Hooman, W.B. Torrance, John Caven and W. Willis Mackenzie. Ernest Holderness, the British Amateur champion, was unable to make the trip.

Bernard Darwin, the golf writer of The Times of London, had accompanied the team and wound up playing in the Match. When Harris fell ill, Darwin was invited to compete in his place and serve as playing captain. He defeated Fownes, 3 and 1. The American Team, however, prevailed, winning the first Walker Cup Match, 8-4.

Until recent years, the USA clearly dominated the series, but the number of American victories never clouded the true purpose of the Walker Cup Match. A much higher value has been placed upon the series as a medium of international friendship and understanding between The R&A and the USGA.

The Match was played on an annual basis until 1924, when it was decided that the financial strain of annual encounters was too severe. It was also believed that interest might drop if the Matches were played too frequently. A decision was made to meet in alternate years.

The series was interrupted by World War II after the 1938 Match at St. Andrews, Scotland. When the Match resumed, in 1947, St. Andrews was again selected as the site. Under normal peacetime conditions, the Match would have been played in the USA, but postwar economic conditions would have made the trip difficult for the British.

Many Walker Cup alums have gone on to have tremendous professional success, including Jack Nicklaus, Phil Mickelson, Tiger Woods, Corey Pavin, Davis Love III, Rickie Fowler, Webb Simpson and Jordan Spieth.

## John “Spider” Miller, 2015 USA Walker Cup Captain

The United States Golf Association has named John “Spider” Miller, of Bloomington, Ind., as the captain of the USA Team for the 2015 Walker Cup Match at Royal Lytham and St. Anne’s Golf Club in Lancashire, England.

Miller is a two-time U.S. Mid-Amateur champion, winning in 1996 and 1998, and a member of the 1999 USA Walker Cup Team.

“I’m very excited about it,” said Miller. “I am extremely thrilled and honored. It’s one of the goals that amateurs aspire to and I’m very fortunate to have been selected to follow Jim Holtgrieve. I will be reaching out to former captains, all of whom are my friends, to help me prepare.”

“Spider Miller has the experience as a competitive amateur at the highest level as well as all the requirements necessary to provide superb leadership for the USA Walker Cup Team in 2015,” said USGA vice president and Championship Committee chairman Thomas J. O’Toole Jr. “Tapped as guardian of one of golf’s greatest traditions, Spider’s patriotism, competitive spirit, camaraderie and passion for the game will help make the 2015 competition exceptional and memorable,” O’Toole added.

Miller defeated Randy Lewis, 3 and 2, to capture the 1996 U.S. Mid-Amateur title at Hartford Golf Club, in West Hartford, Conn. In 1998, he became the oldest Mid-Amateur champion at the time, by winning at age 48. Miller posted a 1-up victory over Chip Holcombe in the final at NCR Country Club’s South Course, in Kettering, Ohio.

Miller, who played in two Masters Tournaments as a result of his Mid-Amateur victories, represented the United States at the 1999 Walker Cup Match, played at Nairn Golf Club in Scotland. He teamed with Hunter Haas to win a pair of foursomes matches before losing to Paul Casey, 3 and 2, in singles. Miller also led Indiana to a tie for third at the 1997 USGA Men’s State Team Championship by carding a 54-hole score of 209 (four under par).

A native of Bloomington, Ind., Miller was inducted into the Indiana Golf Association (IGA) Hall of Fame in 2000. He twice was chosen IGA Player of the Year and is a two-time IGA Mid-Amateur champion. He and partner Jerry Nelson claimed five IGA Four-Ball championships and he was the low amateur at the Indiana State Open three times.

Miller also won the 1999 Crump Cup at Pine Valley Golf Club and has won the Gasparilla Invitational and Tri-State Championship twice each.

A 1973 graduate of Indiana University, Miller owns Best Beers, Inc. He and his wife, Kathy, have four children.

## Nigel Edwards, 2015 GB&I Walker Cup Captain

Nigel Edwards has been reappointed as the captain of the Great Britain and Ireland Walker Cup Team that will face the United States of America at Royal Lytham & St Annes Golf Club in the 2015 match.

Edwards will also captain the GB&I Team as they take on the Continent of Europe in the St Andrews Trophy match at Barseback in Sweden on Aug. 29–30, 2014.

Edwards, originally from Caerphilly, Wales, will serve as Walker cup Captain for the third time in succession as the GB&I Team tries to win back the trophy in England next year. He is the first person in the modern era to be invited to captain the GB&I Team three times.

He will also serve as captain of the St Andrews Trophy team for the third time in the biennial match as GB&I look to reclaim the trophy after the Continent of Europe's narrow 12½ – 11½ victory at Portmarnock in 2012.

A long-time member of Whitchurch Golf Club in Cardiff, Edwards played in four successive Walker Cup Matches between 2001 and 2007. He was instrumental in GB&I's 2003 victory at Ganton Golf Club, holing the winning putt, finishing undefeated and as the match's leading points-scorer.

After twice playing on the winning side, Edwards completed a hat trick of wins by captaining GB&I to victory in the 2011 Match at Royal Aberdeen. Defeated by the USA side in the 2013 Match at the National Golf Links of America in Southampton, N.Y., the GB&I Team will look to reclaim the Walker Cup on home soil in 2015.

"I'm very proud to have the opportunity to captain the Great Britain and Ireland Walker Cup Team for a third time in 2015," said Edwards. "It will also be a privilege to lead the St Andrews Trophy team for a third time this year. Both events have long histories and we will be aiming to win back the trophies. I am looking forward to continuing my involvement and using my past experience as both a player and captain to make sure the players are prepared to play to the best of their ability."

In addition to his Walker Cup successes, Edwards has been part of three victorious GB&I Teams in the St Andrews Trophy, featuring in the winning 2002, 2004 and 2006 teams at Lausanne in Switzerland, Nairn in Scotland and Marianske Lazne in the Czech Republic respectively. He captained the teams which lost to the Continent of Europe at Castelconturbia in Italy in 2010 and Portmarnock in 2012.

Edwards was also part of two winning European teams in the Bonallock Trophy match against the Asia-Pacific.

"Nigel has demonstrated great passion and pride for the Walker Cup and the St Andrews Trophy and we are very pleased that he has accepted the invitation to lead the GB&I teams both this year and next," said Jonathan Plaxton, chairman of The R&A Selection Committee.

"He has proven to be very popular with the players and his experience in the amateur game will continue to be a tremendous asset as he prepares teams for the St Andrews Trophy and the Walker Cup."

Edwards is currently performance director for England Golf, and previously served as director of player development and coaching at The Golf Union of Wales.

## Higgins Wins the 2014 Championship

Joan Higgins, of Glendora, Calif., defeated Judith Kyrinis, of Canada, 1 up, in the final match to win the 2014 U.S. Senior Women's Amateur Championship, held at the 6,109-yard, par-73 Hollywood Golf Club.

Higgins, 58, became the third player to win both the U.S. Senior Women's Amateur and U.S. Women's Mid-Amateur, a championship she captured in 2008. She joins World Golf Hall of Famer Carol Semple Thompson, who won four Senior Women's Amateurs and two Women's Mid-Amateurs, and Ellen Port, who captured the 2012 and 2013 Senior Women's Amateur and four Women's Mid-Amateurs.

"It's unbelievable," said Higgins of winning her second USGA championship. "I never thought it would happen. As someone said, I play well on tough golf courses, because if you keep it in the fairway, it becomes your advantage."

Higgins did not miss one fairway off the tee in the 18-hole final. She also came from behind on the inward nine against Kyrinis, just like she did in her quarterfinal and semifinal matches.

Kyrinis, 50, took the lead on No. 13 with a two-putt par after Higgins was unable to get up and down from the left green-side bunker. Higgins, who played collegiate tennis at the University of Wisconsin in the 1970s, split the middle of the fairway with her tee shot but came to rest in a grassy depression that left her with an awkward lie.

Higgins, who is not ranked in the World Amateur Golf Ranking™, squared the match on No. 14 with a par. Her approach shot hit the flagstick and caromed 19 feet past the hole. Meanwhile, Kyrinis found the left rough off the tee and sent her second shot over the green, leading to a bogey.

"I hit it a little low," Higgins said. "I was 135 (yards), so I choked down on my 6-iron. I was thinking if it hadn't hit the flagstick it could have gone in, but she hit it over the green and didn't hit a great chip."

The key hole turned out to be the par-5 16th. Both players were in perfect position in front of the green after laying up short with their second shots. Higgins struck her third shot to within 16 feet, but Kyrinis got under the ball with her approach and was well short of the putting surface. She eventually misfired on a 5-½ foot putt in an attempt to halve the hole.

"There are lots of different times during the match to think where I could have taken advantage that I didn't," said Kyrinis, a registered nurse in Toronto who was playing in her first Senior Women's Amateur. "To move all over that little pitch shot was not very good."

Higgins added, "She's long enough on these par 5s that especially on 16, she should have been able to get there. She laid up just where I was. I was very surprised."

After each player bogeyed the par-3 17th after missing the green with their tee shots, Higgins closed out the match with a hard-working par on the finishing hole. She hit a 155-yard rescue club to the right fringe, while Kyrinis' approach shot rolled through the putting surface and over the green. Higgins later converted an 8-foot putt.

"I was very happy to hit the putt first, because I knew if I made it, I won," Higgins said about her winning stroke and Kyrinis facing a 7-foot par putt. "If she made it, it's a tougher putt to make because I have got to make it on top (of her)."

Kyrinis, who defeated two past Senior Women's Amateur champions in Mina Hardin (2010) and Terri Frohnmayer (2011) in the quarterfinals and semifinals, respectively, made a 10-foot bogey putt on No. 7 and a 3½-foot par putt on No. 8 to halve both holes and keep the match all square. She took the lead just before the turn on the par-4 ninth when she two-putted over a ridge and down a slope from 30 feet.

"The greens were pretty slick," said Kyrinis, who reached the U.S. Women's Mid-Amateur semifinals in 2000 and is No. 2,005 in the WAGR. "The pins were like every Sunday position I think they had out there. [I] felt like I was playing prevent defense."

Higgins, who never got past the quarterfinals in seven previous U.S. Senior Women's Amateur appearances and took out the No. 3 seed (Kyrinis), the No. 4 seed (Andrea Kraus) and the Canadian Women's Senior Amateur champion (Helene Chartrand) on her way to the title, regrouped on the 484-yard, par-5 10th when she made a 16-foot birdie putt to square the match.

"Oh, that was huge," said Higgins about the match's lone birdie. "I was struggling a little bit before that, and that was a turning point. I said, hey, I actually might be able to win this if I don't do too many bad things on the way in."

Kyrinis, who held a 1-up lead on three occasions on the outward nine, was attempting to become the third Canadian to win this championship, joining Marlene Stewart Streit, a three-time champion, and Gayle Borthwick, a two-time winner.

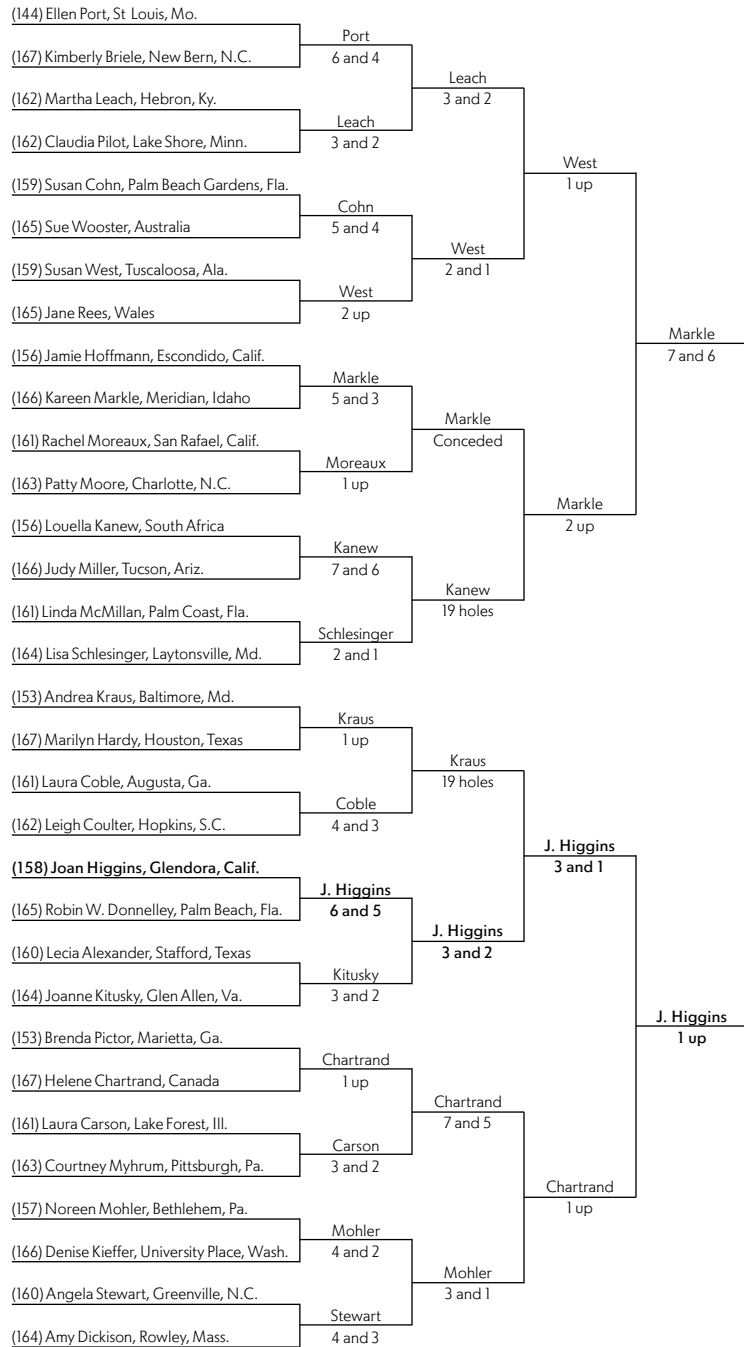

There were 28 players in the field who also competed at the U.S. Women's Mid-Amateur ... She joined Thompson, who won four Senior Women's Amateurs and two Women's Mid-Amateurs, and Port, who claimed four Women's Mid-Amateur and two Senior Women's Amateurs, in that category ... 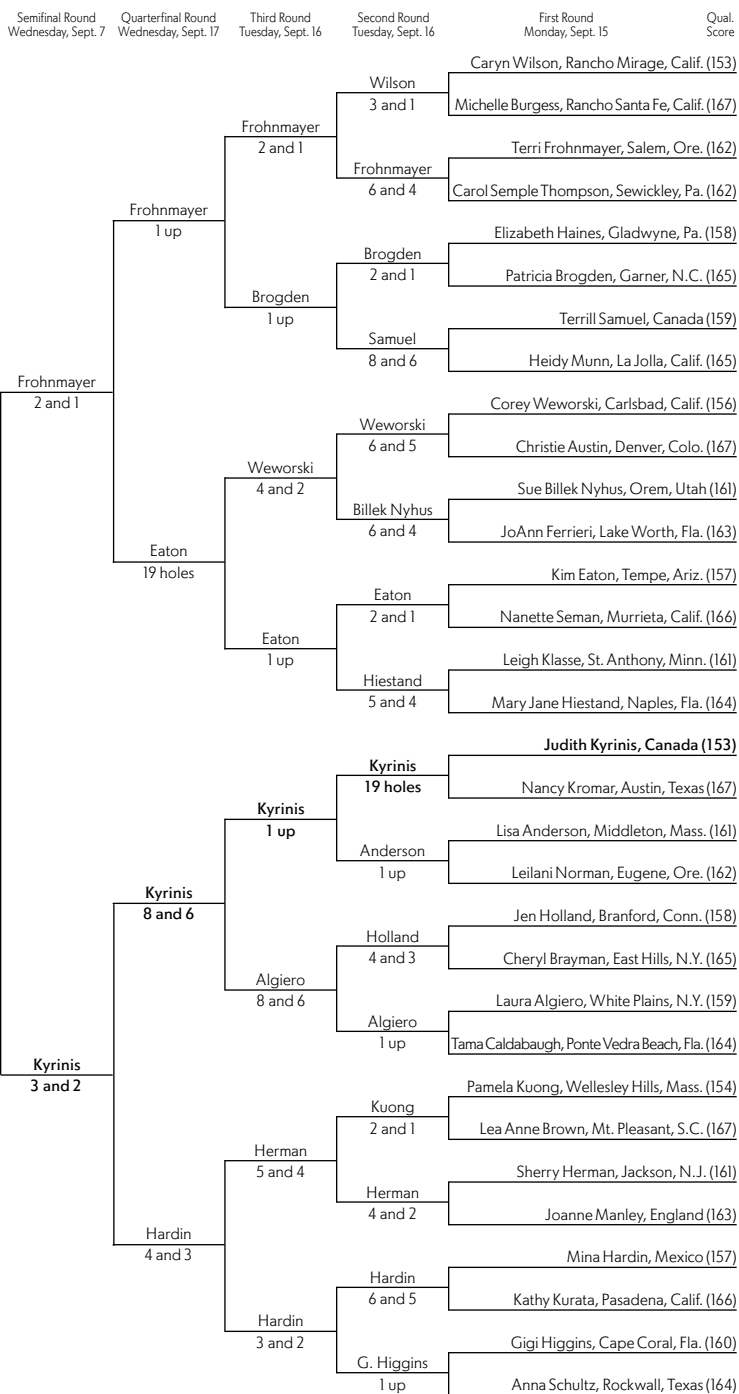

## Championship History

The U.S. Senior Women's Amateur Championship was inaugurated in 1962 for women golfers age 50 and older.

By the late 1950s, a number of senior women's golf organizations had been formed, principally to conduct tournaments, but there was no existing tournament to determine the national champion. The USGA was requested to step in, and in January 1962, the Executive Committee approved such a competition.

In its own quiet way, senior women's golf has flourished over the years. Several major competitions have sprung up throughout the country, and with the expansion of women's golf, the number of quality senior players has increased dramatically. Many women, age 50 and over, for the first time find they have the requisite time for top-level competitive golf. Additionally, some of the nation's finest amateurs have advanced into this age group and still seek to test their talent and experience on a championship level. Many women who enter these competitions also have been instrumental in the development of women's golf in this country, encouraging younger players and conducting tournaments at all levels.

The first Senior Women's Amateur Championship, in 1962 at the Manufacturers' Golf and Country Club in Oreland, Pa., was a stroke-play showdown of two longtime rivals. Maureen Orcutt, a four-time Curtis Cup player, finished with a 54-hole score of 240, seven strokes ahead of Glenna Collett Vare. In the 1920s

and 1930s, Vare reigned as this country's finest woman player with a record six victories in the U.S. Women's Amateur.

Great players of the past have thus far dominated the Senior Women's Amateur. Carolyn Cudone, another former Curtis Cup Team member, won the championship five times in succession between 1968 and 1972.

Dorothy Porter won four Senior Women's Amateur Championships and is one of only four players to have also captured the U.S. Women's Amateur. In 1993, Anne Sander, the Women's Amateur champion in 1958, 1961 and 1963, won her fourth Senior Women's Amateur.

Marlene Stewart Streit, U.S. Women's Amateur champion in 1956, won the Senior Women's Amateur in 1985, 1994 and 2003, and was runner-up a record five times. The 47-year span between Streit's first and last USGA titles is the longest among all USGA champions.

Carol Semple Thompson won the 1973 Women's Amateur and the 1990 and 1997 Women's Mid-Amateurs, and captured her fourth consecutive Senior Women's Amateur title in 2002.

After 35 years of a stroke-play format, the 1997 championship was the first Senior Women's Amateur to be conducted at match play. It was the last of the USGA's 10 national amateur championships to adopt a match-play format.

## Tallent Wins the 2014 Championship

Patrick Tallent, of Vienna, Va., defeated Bryan Norton, of Mission Hills, Kan., 2 and 1, to win the 2014 U.S. Senior Amateur Championship, held at the 6,825-yard, par-72 Big Canyon Country Club.

Tallent, 61, who was playing in his 27th USGA championship, took home his first victory and custody of the Frederick L. Dold Trophy for one year.

The morning started well for the 2010 Senior Amateur runner-up, who won two of the first three holes. He birdied the ninth hole from 12 feet for a 4-up advantage at the turn, Norton, 55, staged a comeback by picking up holes 11, 12 and 14.

"I had no pressure at all," said Tallent. "After I made that birdie on 9, I thought this is pretty much over, and then I come out and I parred 10 and made a tremendous par on 11, and I'm thinking, that should have shrunk that hole up to about that big after I knocked that putt in for par, and yet he made it [for birdie], and then on 12 it was shocking."

Tallent was surprised that his tee shot flew the green into a bunker on the par-3 hole that resulted in a bogey. He made another mistake on the 14th hole, hitting his approach over the green.

"I made a bad shot on 14 there," said Tallent. "I got a little too aggressive; hit it over there to the left [and made bogey]."

While Tallent was hitting a rough patch, Norton saw his chance to rally.

"I felt like it was a matter of Pat getting up early, and for 10 or 11 holes he hit it exactly where he wanted to and it put a lot of pressure on me," said Norton, who reached the championship match of the 2003 U.S. Mid-Amateur but was forced to default to Nathan Smith after nine holes because of a calf injury. "Kind of like how I was putting pressure on guys in early matches. I was able to get the momentum, but after I got it I wasn't able to get anything to go in that was meaningful. I had my chances."

Tallent hit his approach shot over the green on the par-4 14th and was unable to convert a par putt from 5½ feet, which allowed Norton to trim his deficit to one hole.

However, after Norton's tee shot came up short of the green on the 216-yard, 15th hole, Tallent selected a hybrid club and hit it to 14 feet.

"Man, I hit the best shot you ever saw on that hole, didn't I?," said Tallent. After Norton pitched up for a conceded par, Tallent sank his putt to restore his 2-up lead.

Both players would struggle with the 546-yard par-5 16th hole, and after Tallent bogeyed, Norton failed to capitalize by missing a par putt from 3½ feet.

"I did a nice job fighting my way back," said Norton. "When you do that, you can't make many mistakes and I didn't on the back, but 16 was certainly a mistake."

Tallent would complete the match in dramatic fashion on No. 17 by sinking a 30-foot birdie putt with Norton just 3 feet away for his own birdie.

The final was almost a reversal of Tallent's experience in 2010. Paul Simson built a 4-up lead at the turn, then held on for a 2-and-1 victory at Lake Nona Golf & Country Club in Orlando, Fla.

"I never thought I would win one," said Tallent. "You know, when I was young and foolish, I thought I might be good enough to do something, and I played pretty well in the Mid-Am a couple times, got to the Round of 16 [in 1995], and Jerry Courville beat me, and he went on to win."

Tallent, who was the No. 60 seed in the match-play bracket, is the lowest seed to win the title since the USGA began seeding players at the Senior Amateur based on qualifying scores in 1992. Bill Shean was No. 58 in 2000 when he won, and O. Gordon Brewer was No. 53 in 1996.

"This is nerve-racking because we're not used to playing under conditions like this," said Tallent. "Although I'll be honest with you, you can get nervous playing in anything, but it's certainly more nervous playing in a USGA event, so it's spectacular, fantastic. I can't express my joy at having won this event."

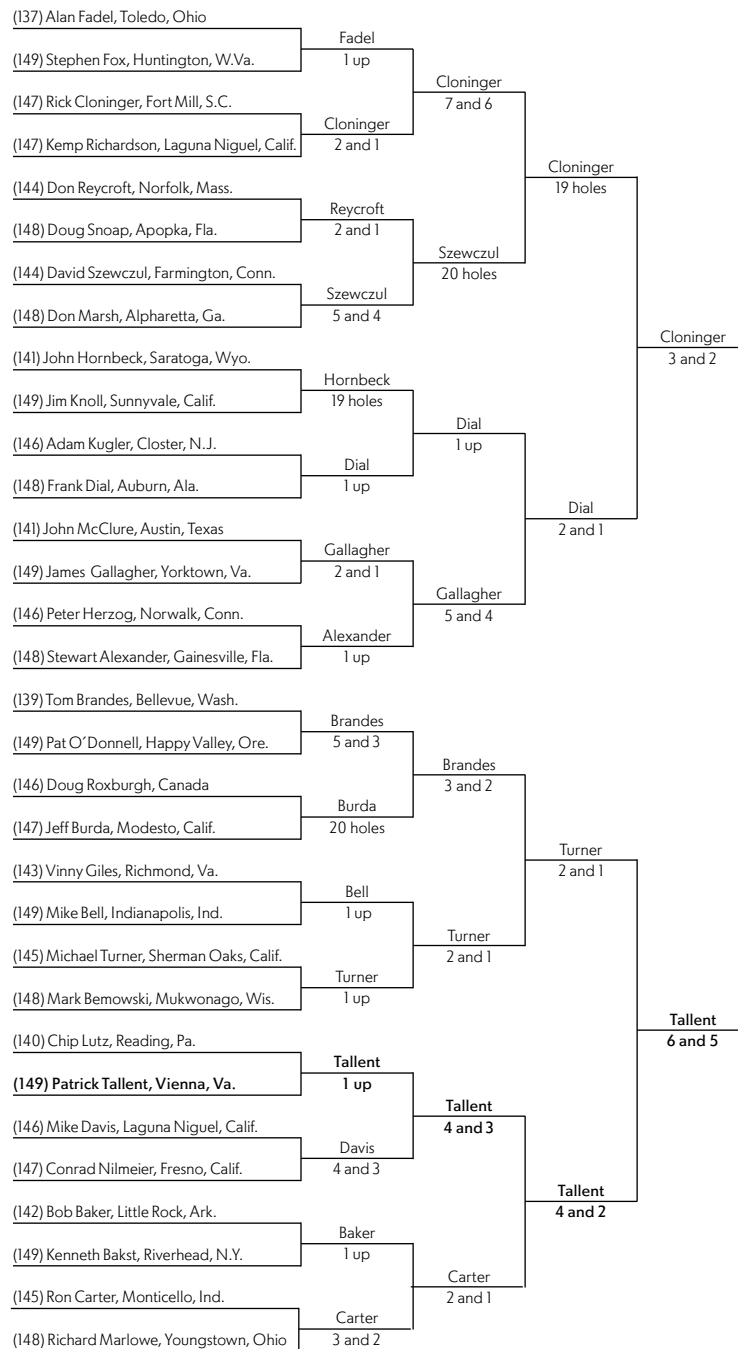

## Championship History

The remarkable growth of senior golf prompted the USGA to establish the Senior Amateur Championship in 1955. Many senior golf associations had been founded on the local, state and regional levels, proving that the competitive instinct among golfers was not diminished by age.

In 1955, the notion of a tournament only for seniors was not a new one. Fifty years earlier, The Apawamis Club in Rye, N.Y., had started the oldest senior competition still in existence, which led directly to the formation of the U.S. Senior Golf Association, a private organization not linked to the USGA.

Apawamis extended invitations to golfers 60 years of age and older. When the response was not overwhelming, the age minimum was dropped to 55 to gather a representative field. Thus was the definition of a senior amateur golfer established.

The U.S. Senior Golf Association conducted a fine tournament, but membership in the organization was limited, and a long waiting list developed. Because there was no single event open to all senior amateurs, the USGA was asked to start a true national championship. The Senior Amateur was added to the schedule in 1955. Entries were open to golfers age 55 and over who had handicaps not over 10 strokes.

The addition of the Senior Amateur gave the USGA exactly twice as many championships as it had conducted before World War II, when there were just four: the Amateur, Open and Women's Amateur, started in 1895, and the Amateur Public Links (1922). From World War II until 1955, the USGA added four more: the Junior Amateur (1948), the Girls' Junior

(1949), the Women's Open (1953) and the Senior Amateur (1955). The USGA now conducts 13 national championships for individuals, 10 of which are strictly for amateurs.

The first Senior Amateur at Belle Meade Country Club in Nashville, Tenn., drew 370 entries from 30 states and the District of Columbia. J. Wood Platt, 56, the eight-time Philadelphia Amateur champion, defeated George Studinger of San Francisco, 5 and 4, in the final.

In 1959, J. Clark Espie, who also won in 1957, became the Senior Amateur's first two-time champion. Lewis W. Oehmig, a record six-time finalist, is the only three-time winner (1972, 1976, 1985).

Since 1994, O. Gordon Brewer, Bill Shean Jr., Kemp Richardson and Paul Simson have won multiple titles. Richardson's father, John, won the 1987 Senior Amateur, making them the first father/son duo to win USGA championships. Brothers Stan and Louis Lee also won Senior Amateur titles in 2007 and 2011, respectively. George "Buddy" Marucci Jr., the runner-up to Tiger Woods in the 1995 U.S. Amateur, won the 2008 championship. In 2007 and 2009, Marucci captained the USA Walker Cup Teams to victory.

Senior Amateur contestants may ride in carts, a concession not allowed when the championship was first played. Traditionalists, who believed walking was vital to a valid national title, finally gave in because the championship is played in the fall, when it is difficult to obtain caddies. Carts have been allowed since 1963.

## Shirley Wins the 2014 Championship

Stroke-play medalist Margaret Shirley never trailed en route to a 5-and-3 win over defending champion Julia Potter in the 2014 U.S. Women's Mid-Amateur Championship, conducted at the 6,117-yard, par-72 Harbour Trees Golf Club.

"It just doesn't feel real right now," said Shirley, who was runner-up to Potter in 2013. "It's obviously the pinnacle of our sport, a USGA championship, and to be able to say I'm a USGA champion now is incredible."

"I was going to need birdies to beat her," said Potter, who was trying to become just the fourth back-to-back Women's Mid-Amateur champion. "I just wasn't knocking them close enough or really sinking putts to be able to put any pressure on her. She played an amazing front nine, an amazing round and she's much deserving of this championship."

Shirley, 28, of Atlanta, joins Carol Semple Thompson (1997), Ellen Port (2000) and Potter (2013) as the only stroke-play medalists to take the championship title. This also marked the first rematch of championship finalists in Women's Mid-Amateur history, and made them the third pair of players to meet in back-to-back USGA championship finals.

Shirley struck first, knocking her hybrid approach at the par-4 first hole to 12 feet and holing the birdie.

"That putt kind of got me going for the rest of the round," said Shirley, a director of Rules and competitions for Atlanta Junior Golf.

Shirley extended her advantage to 2 up with a two-putt par at No. 3. Potter had a chance to halve the hole, but could not convert her comebacker after sending her birdie try long.

Potter pulled within one with a conceded par at the fourth hole. But perhaps the defining moment of the match came at the par-4 seventh. Shirley drained a 25-foot birdie to regain her 2-up advantage and start her championship charge.

"That's actually the first time I've hit that green all week," said Shirley, who graduated from Auburn University in 2008. "I was just happy to be on that green. And that putt was dead center."

On the inward nine, Shirley kept putting pressure on her opponent. Potter's tee shot at No. 10 flew into the right rough, and her second shot clipped a tree and fell well short of the green. Shirley found the left greenside bunker, but converted the up-and-down par for the win and a 3-up lead.

Shirley's hot hand with the putter again played to her advantage on the par-4 11th. After Potter chipped to within 3 feet for par, Shirley drained an 18-foot birdie putt for a 4-up lead.

Potter had a prime opportunity to end Shirley's momentum at No. 12. With Shirley's bogey conceded, Potter missed her short par putt. When Potter missed a par comebacker on No. 13, Shirley had a dormie-5 lead.

"At the end I was trying to push and trying to hit some closer shots," said Potter, a 2011 alumna of the University of Missouri who works for the Indiana Golf Office. "It didn't work out, and that was really one of the reasons why I missed that putt so badly on 13 was because at that point I need to make. I can't just tie with her."

Potter won the 14th with a par to extend the match. But after she chipped on well short of the hole at No. 15 and missed her par attempt, she conceded Shirley's par putt and the championship title.

Families were a weeklong presence for Shirley and Potter. Both players had their father as caddie, and other family supporting from the clubhouse. They each pointed to their father — and their own close friendship that blossomed in 2013 — as the highlights of this championship week.

"Julia is a great champion, obviously a phenomenal player but an even better person," said Shirley. "We had so much fun out there. It was kind of relaxing this last match. It really was, to play someone that you know."

"Your father is going to be your biggest support out there," added Potter. "They're going to believe in you when you don't even believe in yourself. That's what my dad was out there for me, and I'm sure that's the same for Margaret."

"Clearly we have a lot in common and a lot to talk about, but I'm very happy for her and her family to experience what my family and I experienced last year."

This was the fourth time in championship history that the final match included two players in their 20s, including the 1993 and 1994 finals as well as the Potter-Shirley match in 2013.

Both players needed to finish their semifinal matches on Thursday morning due to torrential rains and storms that halted play on Wednesday. Shirley cruised to a 5-and-4 win over four-time champion Meghan Stasi, while Potter took a 2-and-1 victory over Tara Joy-Connelly.

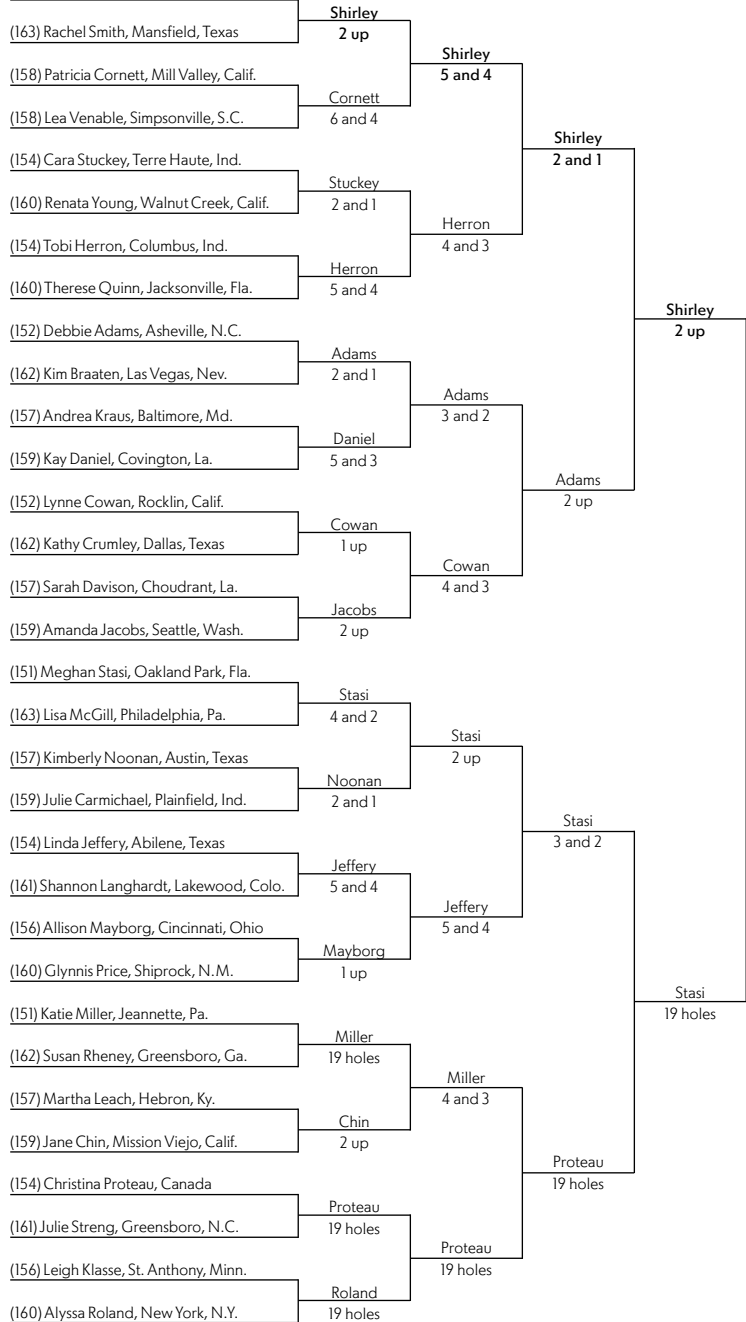

The average age of the 132 Women's Mid-Amateur competitors was 43.46 years old ... The average age of the Women's Mid-Amateur competitors was 43.11 years old ... The youngest player in the championship was Alisha Matthews, who turned 25 on Aug. 2. Three other players were in their first year of championship eligibility: Katelynn Hogenson, Julia Puscheck and Alyssa Roland ... Taffy Brower, 69, was the oldest player in the championship. Brower first qualified for the Women's Mid-Amateur in 1987, and has played in at least one championship in each ensuing decade ... There were four countries and 34 states represented at the championship ... There were six USGA champions in the field: Mina Hardin (2010 U.S. Senior

Women's Amateur); Martha Leach (2009 U.S. Women's Mid-Amateur); Julia Potter (2013 U.S. Women's Mid-Amateur); Anna Schultz (2007 U.S. Senior Women's Amateur); Meghan Stasi (2006, 2007, 2010, 2012 U.S. Women's Mid-Amateur); and Corey Weworski (2004 U.S. Women's Mid-Amateur) ... Five players were members of victorious teams in the USGA Women's State Team Championship: Brower (Florida, 1999); Laura Coble (Georgia, 2005, 2009, 2011); Leigh Klasse (Minnesota, 2001); Claudia Pilot (Minnesota, 2001); and Lynn Thompson (Ohio, 2003) ... Two-time USGA champion Alice Dye was the championship's honorary chairman. Dye's husband, noted golf course architect Pete Dye, designed the Harbour Trees course. The Dyes were honored guests at the USGA Players Dinner, and Alice Dye visited the championship on the first day of match play, following defending champion and Indiana native Potter ... The Shirley/Potter final was the first rematch of championship finalists in Women's Mid-Amateur history. They are also only the third pair of players to meet in back-to-back USGA championship finals, joining Patty Berg and Estelle Lawson Page (1937-38 U.S. Women's Amateur) and J. Clark Espie and Frederick J. Wright (1956-57 U.S. Senior Amateur) ... Christina Proteau reached the quarterfinals while six months pregnant. All four of her matches were decided on the 19th hole.

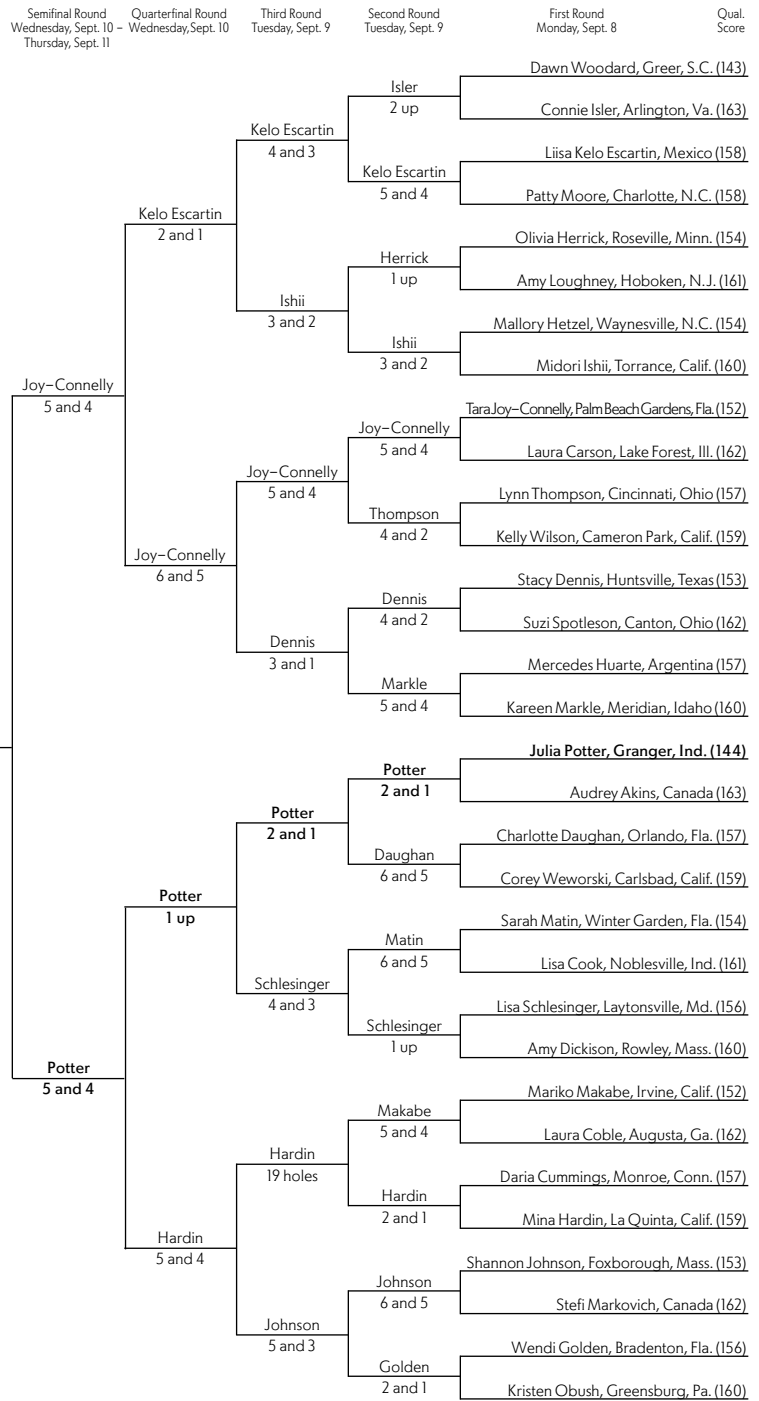

## Championship History

The U.S. Women's Mid-Amateur Championship began in 1987 as a result of a need determined by an ad hoc committee headed by Dena Nowotny, a member of the USGA Women's Committee.

The Women's Mid-Amateur, the USGA's 13th championship, was created to provide a national competitive arena for amateurs age 25 and older.

By 1987, it had become increasingly difficult for female amateur golfers beyond college to compete equitably with their collegiate counterparts, for whom golf was nearly a full-time vocation.

One must go back to 1973 and Carol Semple Thompson to find the last career amateur to win the U.S. Women's Amateur.

As with any new championship, there was initial concern with the level of entries. In this case, women amateurs responded with enthusiasm. The first championship attracted 320 entries, only 29 fewer than the number that had entered the 1987 Women's Amateur a few weeks earlier.

The starting field of 135 players was determined by sectional qualifying. The first Women's Mid-Amateur was played at Southern Hills Country Club in Tulsa, Okla. The inaugural championship was won by Cindy Scholefield, 27, of Malibu, Calif.

The Women's Mid-Amateur has been the setting for a number of noteworthy finals. In 1989, Robin Weiss, of Palm Beach Gardens, Fla., defeated Page Marsh Lea on the 22nd hole. In 1990, despite the tremendous pressure of competing on her home course as a crowd favorite, Carol Semple Thompson, 41, of Sewickley, Pa., defeated Marsh Lea, 3 and 1, at the Allegheny Country Club, where Semple Thompson had learned the game.

Two women have won the Women's Mid-Amateur on four occasions. In 2011, Ellen Port, of St. Louis, Mo., captured her fourth championship title with a 2-and-1 victory over 2009 champion Martha Leach at Bayville Golf Club in Virginia Beach, Va. Having previously won in 1991, 1993 and 2000, Port's 11-year span between victories broke the record of seven years, set by Thompson in 1997.

The following year, Meghan Stasi, of Oakland Park, Fla., won her fourth Women's Mid-Amateur, taking a 6-and-5 victory over Liz Waynick at Briggs Ranch Golf Club in San Antonio, Texas. She won back-to-back titles in 2006 and 2007 under her maiden name of Bolger, and also took the victory in 2010.

Sarah LeBrun Ingram, of Nashville, Tenn., in 1994 became the first player to take consecutive Women's Mid-Amateur championships. She had previously won in 1991 and 1993.

## Harvey Wins the 2014 Championship

Scott Harvey, 36, of Greensboro, N.C., defeated fellow stroke-play co-medalist Brad Nurski, 35, of St. Joseph, Mo., 6 and 5, in the 36-hole championship match of the 2014 U.S. Mid-Amateur Championship, conducted on the par-71, 7,076-yard Old Course at Saucon Valley Country Club.

Harvey, a real estate property manager competing in his seventh consecutive U.S. Mid-Amateur, was the equivalent of 3 under par over 31 holes, with the usual match-play concessions.

The victory earns Harvey, No. 109 in the World Amateur Golf Ranking™, custody of the Robert T. Jones Memorial Trophy for one year, a gold medal, a 10-year exemption from qualifying for the U.S. Mid-Amateur, exemptions into the next two U.S. Amateurs and a likely invitation to the 2015 Masters in April. He also receives an exemption from local qualifying for the U.S. Open for the next three years.

"I just can't really put it into words," said Harvey. "This tournament has been my No. 1 goal every single year. I can't even put it into words."

In only the second matchup between co-medalists in the 34-year history of the championship, Harvey grabbed a 4-up advantage following the morning round and then withstood an early rally by Nurski at the outset of the afternoon round before pulling away.

Harvey admitted to being anxious to play the final. He woke up at 12:08 a.m. Thursday morning and never went back to sleep. But he never publicly showed signs of exhaustion, crediting his caddie and close friend Rocky Manning for keeping him focused on the match and not the exemptions that come with being the champion.

"I'm tired, but you can't let that stop you," said Harvey, who was taking Ibuprofen for a sore back. "My back was tingling all day [Wednesday]. It was tingling all day today.

"Rocky, my buddy, was saying, 'Look, you belong here, believe it.' And that's what we did."

In between rounds, Nurski, who missed 10 of 14 fairways in the morning round, found something on the practice range to correct his ball-striking and it appeared to work, at least for the opening three holes. Birdies on 19 and 21 – with a winning par on No. 20 – quickly trimmed the deficit to one hole..

Harvey, however, squashed any hopes of a major comeback by making a challenging downhill 10-footer for birdie on the par-3 22nd hole. Nurski's spirits dampened one hole later when he failed to get up and down for par after a wayward tee shot.

"I didn't play badly, I just didn't play good enough," said Nurski, who was vying to become the Mid-Amateur's first left-handed champion and just the sixth southpaw to claim a USGA

title. "Obviously, he is a wonderful golfer and his résumé speaks for itself. No regrets for me."

Harvey, who played collegiately one season at Division II West Florida in Pensacola, Fla., before transferring to Division I High Point University in North Carolina, birdied the par-3 27th from 22 feet for a 4-up advantage and when Nurski three-putted No. 28, the margin ballooned to 5 up.

The exclamation point came at the par-4 30th hole, as Harvey punctuated his 16-foot uphill birdie with an emphatic fist-pump. Nurski, a railroad conductor and switchman who was playing in his second U.S. Mid-Amateur, but first in six years, still had a chance to halve the hole, but burned the left edge from 8 feet.

After Wednesday's 1-up quarterfinal win over 2013 USA Walker Cup competitor Todd White, Nurski mentioned his struggles on the greens. Despite his balky putter, he still managed to grind out a 19-hole semifinal win over Tom Werkmeister, but he couldn't overcome his struggles in the final.

"I couldn't get anything to go," said Nurski of his putting. "As you could see, a lot of the putts got right next to the hole and didn't go in. But that's the way it goes. I was just proud to be here, and obviously wanted to win, but I just didn't come out on top today."

Played under overcast skies the entire match, the threat of inclement weather never arrived, even though the start of the afternoon round was moved up 45 minutes. In the morning 18, Harvey shot the equivalent of 2-under-par 69 to Nurski's 73.

Even though Nurski rolled in a 15-foot birdie putt on No. 12 to get the match back to 1 down, Harvey started to pull away by winning Nos. 13, 15 and 18 to take a 4-up advantage into the lunch break.

"Similar to yesterday when things started clicking with my swing," said Harvey of his late run. "It just started to feel simple. I wasn't afraid of anything. Just take it back and hit it. [It was] kind of like I said earlier, I almost blacked out and just got caught up in the moment and did what I needed to do, and just let the golf take care of itself."

A key moment came at the 502-yard 16th hole when it appeared Nurski might win the hole and trim the deficit to 2 down. Harvey managed to scramble for a bogey-5 to halve the hole after sending his approach shot into the lateral hazard left of the green. He punched out and followed with a chip to 4 feet.

On the 307-yard 18th hole, both players drove the green and had comparable long, uphill eagle putts. But Nurski lipped out his 5-footer for birdie, while Harvey converted his 4½ -footer.

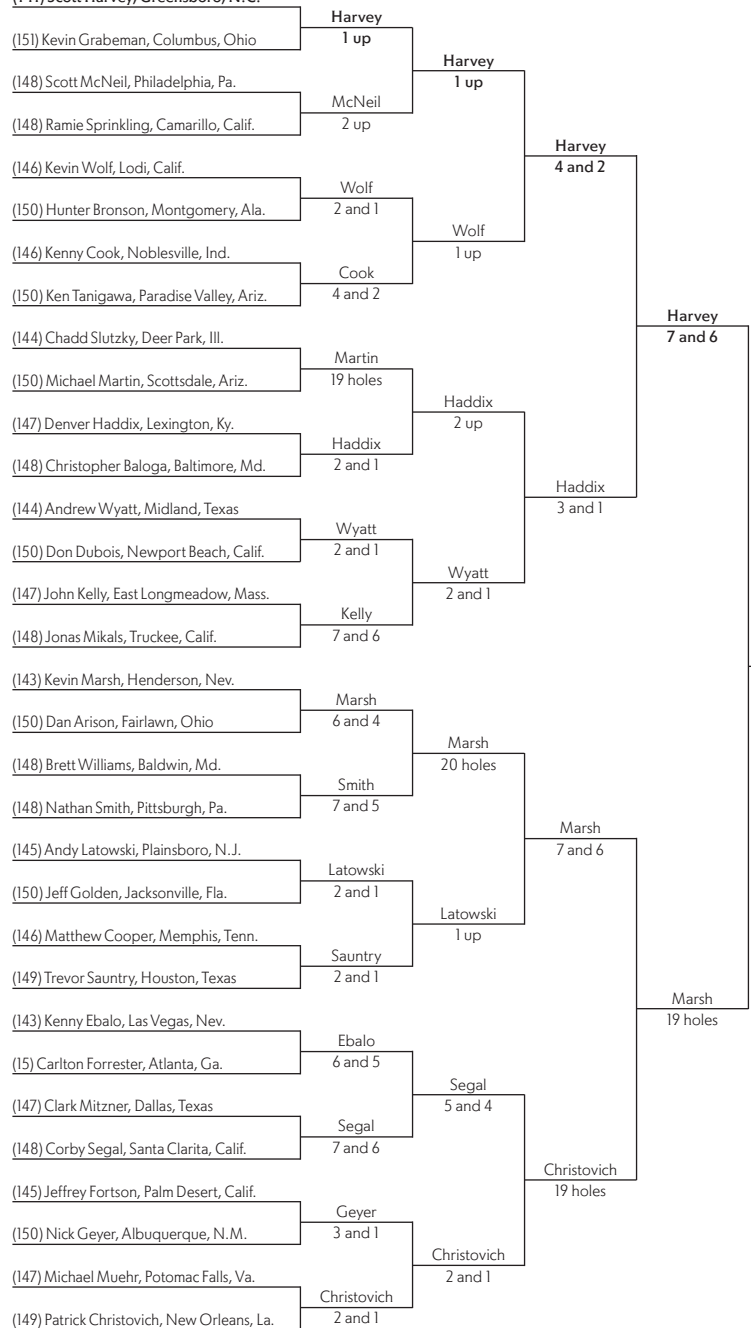
Saucon Valley Country Club hosted its seventh USGA championship ... Pennsylvania joins California and Minnesota as the only states to host all 13 USGA championships ... There were 19 fully exempt players in the field, including four-time Mid-Amateur champion Nathan Smith (2003, 2009, 2010, 2012) ... Nine past champions, along with Smith, competed: Ken Bakst (1997), Austin Eaton III (2004), Tim Jackson (1994, 2001), Randal Lewis (2011), Kevin Marsh (2005), Michael McCoy (2013), Steve Wilson (2008) and Dave Womack (2006) ...

The field comprised players from five countries (Argentina, Canada, Peru, Zambia and the United States) ... Forty-four states were represented and California had the most players with 30 ... The oldest competitor was Thomas Olson (age 68), while Joseph Rice IV (age 25) was the youngest ... The average age of the field was 37.08 ... Michael McCoy, the defending Mid-Amateur champion, was the lone player in the field to compete in the U.S. Amateur, U.S. Senior Open and U.S. Mid-Amateur in 2014 ... Scott Harvey, the stroke-play co-medalist and eventual champion, had the best round on the Old Course with a 6-under 65. His first-round play included making an eagle on the par-4 17th and tied the fifth-lowest score in Mid-Amateur stroke-play history ... Harvey's 65 was one stroke off the competitive course record established by Bruce Fleisher when he carded a 7-under 64 in the first round of the 2000 U.S. Senior Open ... Warren Vickers turned in the best round on the Weyhill Course with a 3-under 68 in the second round, but unfortunately he shot an 85 in the first round and failed to qualify for match play ... Marsh and Smith met in the Round of 32 for the second consecutive year ... The Mid-Amateur champions forged a classic duel that was decided in dramatic fashion when Marsh made a 40-foot birdie from just off the green that hit the flagstick and dropped in on the 20th hole ... Matthew Mattare, whose father, Gene, is the general manager and director of golf at Saucon Valley Country Club, advanced to the Round of 16 on the course where he grew up. Mattare, last year's stroke-play medalist, fell to Todd White, a member of the 2013 USA Walker Cup team, 2 and 1 ... Harvey and Brad Nurski became the first top seeds to square off in the Mid-Amateur final since 2010 ... Harvey's father, Bill, played in 23 USGA championships and advanced to the 1973 U.S. Amateur quarterfinals ... Lou Holtz, college football coach, author and network broadcaster, was the keynote speaker at the U.S. Mid-Amateur Players Dinner on Sept. 5.

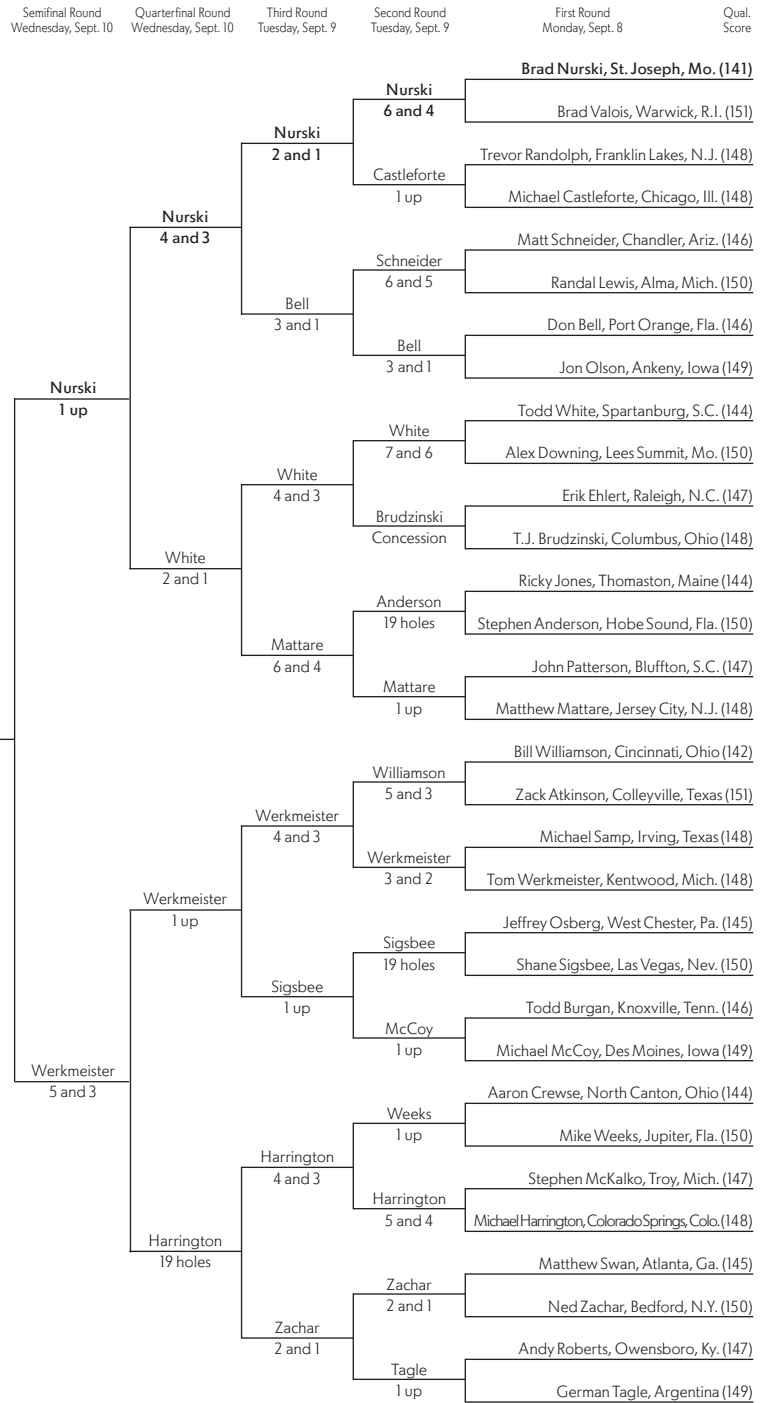

## Championship History

In 1981, the USGA inaugurated its first new championship for amateurs in 19 years, the U.S. Mid-Amateur. The Mid-Amateur, for amateur golfers of at least 25 years of age, provides a formal national championship for the post-college amateur, for whom the game is truly an avocation.

Before the arrival of the Mid-Amateur, the post-collegiate player could compete in the Amateur Championship, sometimes successfully, but these older amateurs faced greater odds. While they fit their golf around their work and families, they were most often competing against college golfers, for whom the game is close to a full-time activity.

Only about 40 percent of those who qualify for the U.S. Amateur each year are at least 25, although several have been quite successful. For example, Bob Lewis Jr., then 35, reached the Amateur final in 1980, and the semifinals in 1981 and 1986. Jay Sigel won consecutive Amateur titles in 1982 and 1983 (at ages 38 and 39, respectively), and then added the Mid-Amateur title in 1983, 1985 and 1987. In 1986, Buddy Alexander, 33, a reinstated amateur, won the U.S. Amateur and in 1993, 41-year-old John Harris won the Amateur. Harris remains the last mid-amateur to win the U.S. Amateur.

In general, however, most post-collegiate amateurs found themselves at a disadvantage competing against college golfers. Thus, the Mid-Amateur Championship was born.

Played at the Bellerive Country Club in St. Louis, the first Mid-Amateur drew 1,638 entries in 1981. The field included three former Amateur champions: Gary Cowan (1966, 1971), Marvin "Vinny" Giles III (1972) and Fred Ridley (1975). Jim Holtgrieve, 33, of Des Peres, Mo., defeated fellow Walker Cup Team member Bob Lewis Jr., 37, of Warren, Ohio, in the final,

2 up. Holtgrieve and Lewis each later captained a pair of USA Walker Cup Teams.

Nathan Smith is the only four-time U.S. Mid-Amateur champion. He won his first title in 2003 after his opponent, Bryan Norton, withdrew due to injury after nine holes. Smith took back-to-back victories in 2009 and 2010, and won his fourth title in 2012, becoming just the 15th person to win the same USGA championship on at least four occasions.

In 1983, Sigel became the first golfer in 53 years to win two USGA championships in the same year when he added the Mid-Amateur Championship to the U.S. Amateur he had won just 32 days earlier. Sigel became the Mid-Amateur's first two-time winner when he again captured the championship in 1985. Sigel won his third Mid-Amateur in 1987. Combined with his two U.S. Amateur titles (1982, 1983), Sigel won a total of five USGA championships.

In 1987's first qualifying round, Don Bliss made holes-in-one on the eighth and 10th holes at Brook Hollow Golf Club in Dallas, Texas. Bliss is the only player to score two holes-in-one in one round of a USGA championship.

The U.S. Mid-Amateur Championship has continued to grow in popularity and in 1989 topped 3,000 entries for the first time. In its short history, the championship's unique age qualification has inspired similar tournaments throughout the country and there are now Mid-Amateur events in nearly every state. The Mid-Amateur also has helped several players earn berths to the USA Walker Cup Team. Sigel, Smith, Jackson, Todd White, Danny Green, Zahringer and William Hoffer are among those selected to represent their country off the strength of performances in the Mid-Amateur.

## 2016 Conditions of Play

### The Teams

The Curtis Cup Match is played by women amateur golfers, one team from the United States of America and one team from England, Ireland, Northern Ireland, Scotland and Wales (GB&I). The teams consist of not more than eight players and a captain.

The USA Team is selected by the USGA International Team Selection Committee. The Ladies Golf Union selects the team from Great Britain and Ireland. Players must be citizens of the country they represent.

### Schedule of Play

To be determined.

### Scoring

Victory in a match scores one point. When a match is all square after 18 holes, one-half point is awarded to each side.

### Miscellaneous

The Match is conducted every two years, alternately in the United States of America and Great Britain and Ireland. The country winning the Match takes custody of the trophy for the ensuing two years. In case of a tie, the trophy remains with the previous winner.



## United States of America Wins 2014 Match

The USA won three singles matches and halved a fourth to regain the Curtis Cup, 13–7, and cap a dominant week over Great Britain and Ireland (GB&I) at St. Louis Country Club.

The winning point came courtesy of 2013 U.S. Women's Amateur champion Emma Talley. Playing in the opening singles match, the 20-year-old from Princeton, Ky., made a 3-foot par putt on the 15th green to defeat Bronte Law, 19, of England, 4 and 3.

"Dreams do come true, that's for sure," said a jubilant Talley, who went 3–0–1 during the Match. "This was the best week ever. I'm just happy to play with my friends and to do it for my country is even better."

"That is the coolest trophy of all the seven that I've ever won," said a proud USA Captain Ellen Port, who has captured six individual USGA championships. "That is the most special trophy, always, that I will ever have, and ever have been a part of."

Talley, a rising junior at the University of Alabama, continued the steady play that was the hallmark of the USA Team throughout the three days of competition. After taking a 2–up lead with consecutive wins at the fourth and fifth holes, Talley maintained the advantage for the remainder of the match.

Talley knew that the honor of leading her team onto the course – and potentially securing the winning point – was not something to be taken lightly.

"It was a privilege that I got to go out first," said Talley, one of three Curtis Cup players who competed in the U.S. Women's Open at Pinehurst No. 2 two weeks following the Match. "I was very happy that I got that opportunity and glad I got to secure the point."

Ally McDonald, 21, of Fulton, Miss., earned the second point for the USA. The 2013 North & South Women's Amateur champion won the par–4 sixth with a birdie to go 1 up and cruised to a 4–and–3 victory over Annabel Dimmock, 17, of England.

"It was a blessing to have been chosen (for the team), and I just wanted to take advantage of this opportunity and make memories and play the best golf that I could," said McDonald, who joined Talley and GB&I's Stephanie Meadow at the Women's Open. "I expected coming in to be a big part of the team and to contribute as much as I could, and I think I played really well."

GB&I rallied to take four of the remaining six singles matches and tighten the large deficit.

"I'm so proud of the girls for how they rallied all day today," said GB&I Captain Tegwen Matthews, who is now 1–1 as captain after she led her team to victory in 2012. "Especially when they knew the match was gone, and yet they never gave up. That could have put the chins really even further down.

"But no, we won the afternoon singles session. So that's a great way to finish and gives everyone a bit of a boost to say the least from a pretty disastrous two days."

Annie Park, 19, of Levittown, N.Y., won the third singles match for the USA, taking a 5–and–4 win over Gabriella Cowley, 18 of England.

Georgia Hall, 18, of England, holed out for eagle from the fairway on 15 in her 3–and–2 victory over Kyung Kim, 20, of Chandler, Ariz. The hole–out came after Kim's approach landed a foot from the hole.

Gemma Dryburgh, 20, of Scotland, lost a 3–up lead to Ashlan Ramsey, 18, of Milledgeville, Ga., but was able to eke out a 1–up victory.

Charlotte Thomas, 22, of England, notched her only point of the Match with a 2–up win over Erynne Lee, 21, of Silverdale, Wash.

The final GB&I point went to Meadow, 22, of Northern Ireland. The University of Alabama graduate rallied from an early deficit to notch a 2–and–1 win over Alison Lee, 19, of Valencia, Calif.

Mariah Stackhouse, 20, of Riverdale, Ga., carried a 1–up lead over Eilidh Briggs, 21, of Scotland, to the 18th. However, Stackhouse's double bogey after going long over the green halved the match.

On Friday's first day of play, the USA Team swept the morning four–ball matches for a quick 3–0 lead. The morning was truly dominated by the Americans, who never trailed in any of the three matches. They were all square for only four holes, none later than the fourth. The USA pairings combined for a score of 17 under par and carded only two bogeys combined, both in the Park/McDonald pairing.

The afternoon foursomes (alternate shot) matches saw GB&I rally to halve two matches, with the USA pulling clear in the third.

Another impressive four–ball performance on Saturday morning gave the USA a 7–2 lead over GB&I going into the afternoon foursomes matches. The GB&I duo of Dimmock and Law mounted a furious four–ball comeback over Erynne Lee and Park, winning the final three holes to earn the first full GB&I point of the three–day competition.

The USA then captured two of the afternoon foursomes matches, with the third being halved.

The USA's 9½–2½ lead following the first four sessions was the largest four–round lead since the playing format was expanded to five sessions over three days in 2008, bettering the 2010 USA mark of 8½–3½.

## 2014 Match Notes

### Weather

---

Hot and humid on Friday, with temperatures in the upper 70s and low 80s. On Saturday, play was suspended at 11:39 a.m. due to dangerous weather conditions. Play resumed at 1:45 p.m., but was again suspended at 3:50 p.m. due to dangerous conditions. Play resumed at 5:18 p.m., and was finally suspended due to darkness at 8:30 p.m. The suspended fourth round resumed at 10:57 a.m. on Sunday, which saw sunny skies and temperatures in the upper 70s.

### Notes

---

There were two USGA champions competing: Kyung Kim (2012 U.S. Women's Amateur Public Links) and Emma Talley (2013 U.S. Women's Amateur) ... GB&I's Bronte Law and Stephanie Meadow were the only players to have previously competed in the Curtis Cup, having been members of the winning team in 2012. Erynne Lee represented the United States at the 2013 Women's World Amateur Team Championship ... Three USA players went undefeated: Ally McDonald (2-0-2), Mariah Stackhouse (2-0-2) and Talley (3-0-1) ... USGA champions and LPGA stars Beth Daniel and Meg Mallon were among the crowd at St. Louis Country Club. Daniel was a member of the 1976 and 1978 USA Curtis Cup Teams, while Mallon served as captain of the 2011 USA Junior Solheim Cup Team, which included USA Curtis Cup Team members Kim, Alison Lee, Ashlan Ramsey, Stackhouse and Talley ... Honorary chair and former Secretary of State Condoleezza Rice was the guest speaker at the Opening Ceremony. Rice, a professor at Stanford University, is the long-time mentor of Stanford student Stackhouse, who became the first African-American player in Curtis Cup history ... Both teams were honored on the field of a St. Louis Cardinals game on June 2, and USA Captain Ellen Port and GB&I Captain Tegwen Matthews each threw out a first pitch ... Ramsey and Meadow turned professional immediately following the Curtis Cup Match. Meadow made her professional debut two weeks later at the U.S. Women's Open, where she finished third. She was joined in the field by USA Team members McDonald, who missed the cut, and Talley, who finished T63.

## Match History

Officially named “The Women’s International Cup,” the cup for the Curtis Cup Match was officially presented in 1932 by Harriot and Margaret Curtis, sisters who won the U.S. Women’s Amateur four times between them. The cup, a silver bowl of Paul Revere design, is inscribed, “To stimulate friendly rivalry among the women golfers of many lands.” The cup was first presented in 1927 to give momentum to the proposed competition, but play didn’t begin until 1932, largely due to financial reasons.

As beloved as the Curtis Cup Match is among those who have battled for it, no other USGA competition has had such problems getting off the ground.

The Match has its origins in an informal match played in 1905. Frances Griscom of Philadelphia, the 1900 U.S. Women’s Amateur champion, suggested that it would be fun for a group to play in the British Ladies Open Amateur, at Cromer, England. Eight Americans made the trip to play, including Griscom, Georgianna Bishop, the 1904 Women’s Amateur champion, and Harriot and Margaret Curtis.

An informal match developed between the Americans and a team from Britain. Although the USA was soundly beaten, the exhilaration and goodwill established by their visit always stayed with the competitors, particularly with Margaret and Harriot Curtis.

Interest in an international match was revived at a 1924 meeting of the Women’s Eastern Golf Association and became a subject of discussion among the Association, the British Ladies’ Golf Union and the French Golf Union over the next five years. In 1927, the Curtis sisters gave the idea another push by donating a cup for an international match. Fanny Osgood of Boston was appointed to again take up the matter with the LGU.

A match was tentatively planned for 1928, but financial obstacles made it impossible.

In 1928, the USGA Women’s Committee appointed a subcommittee to consider an international match, but the idea was stymied by the usual lack of funding. In 1930, the great

American amateur Glenna Collett Vare took matters into her own hands and arranged for a group of her countrywomen to play in Great Britain.

In 1931, the LGU agreed to regular matches with the United States. The USGA then decided to finance the American Team and administer the competition. The Curtis Cup was accepted that same year as the official trophy.

The series began the following year with the United States opposing Great Britain, with a proviso that France might join in whenever it was able to do so. While it was hoped that many nations would eventually join in the Match, the Curtis Cup has remained a two-sided competition.

The first Curtis Cup Match was played in 1932 at Wentworth Golf Club in England. Marion Hollins captained the American Team, which consisted of Vare, Maureen Orcutt, Virginia Van Wie, Opal Hill, Helen Hicks, Leona Pressler Cheney and Dorothy Higbie. The team representing Great Britain and Ireland was made up of Joyce Wethered, the famous English champion who also served as captain, Wanda Morgan, Enid Wilson, Molly Gourlay, Doris Park, Diana Fishwick, Elsie Corlett and Mrs. J.B. Watson. The Americans prevailed, 5½ to 3½.

The 2008 Match at St. Andrews marked a change in format. The Match changed to a three-day format, featuring three foursomes and three four-ball (better-ball) matches on the first two days. On the final day, there are eight singles matches, meaning all eight players from each side compete in singles.

The true meaning of the Curtis Cup Match has never been overshadowed by the results and the Match has always been regarded as a vehicle of international friendship and understanding.

The Match also has proved to be launching ground for future professional stardom. Those competitors include U.S. Women’s Open champions JoAnne Gunderson Carner, Paula Creamer, Juli Inkster, Cristie Kerr, Hilary Lunke, Hollis Stacy and Michelle Wie as well as LPGA Tour stars Beth Daniel, Jessica Korda, Stacy Lewis, Nancy Lopez and Lexi Thompson.

## Robin Burke: 2016 USA Curtis Cup Captain

Robin Burke, of Houston, Texas, has been selected as captain of the 2016 USA Curtis Cup Team.

“To captain the 2016 Curtis Cup Team and represent the United States of America and the USGA in Europe where the game began is an honor and a privilege,” said Burke. “When I was selected to play on the 1998 Curtis Cup Team, it was the most gratifying experience in my golf career. My captain, Barbara McIntire, made a huge impression on my game and in the way I conduct myself both in and out of golf. She is a great player and person.”

“We are very happy to add Robin to the impressive list of Curtis Cup players who have gone on to serve as captain,” said Dot Paluck, chairman of the USGA Women’s Committee. “As inscribed on the trophy, the Curtis Cup Match has long served to stimulate friendly rivalry among women golfers. Robin will undoubtedly carry on this fine tradition.”

Burke was the runner-up in the 1997 U.S. Women’s Amateur Championship, falling to Silvia Cavalleri at Brae Burn Country Club in West Newton, Mass. The following year, she was a member of the USA Team that took a 10–8 victory over GB&I at The Minikahda Club in Minneapolis, Minn. Burke paired with Virginia Derby Grimes for two foursomes victories and lost her singles match.

Burke has competed in more than 35 USGA individual championships, including three U.S. Women’s Opens. She has reached the semifinals of the U.S. Women’s Mid-Amateur Championship three times, and in 2003, she took stroke-play medalist honors in the Women’s Mid-Amateur at Long Cove Club in Hilton Head Island, S.C. Her 38 Women’s Mid-Amateur match-play victories are tied for third-most in championship history with four-time champion Meghan Stasi, trailing only past Curtis Cup captains Ellen Port (58 victories; 2014 captain) and Carol Semple Thompson (56 victories; 2006, 2008 captain). Additionally, Burke has played for Texas in four USGA Women’s State Team Championships, helping her team to runner-up finishes in 1995 and 2011.

Burke won the 2001 Lone D. Jones/Doherty Championship, as well as the 1992 and 2001 Southern Women’s Amateur Championships. She won the 1990 and 1991 Texas Women’s Amateur Championships, and she is an eight-time Greater Houston Women’s City Amateur champion.

Burke is married to two-time major champion and World Golf Hall of Fame member Jack Burke Jr. The Burkes own Houston’s famed Champions Golf Club, where Robin Burke serves as vice president. The club has hosted numerous professional and amateur events, including the 1967 Ryder Cup (won by the USA), the 1969 U.S. Open Championship (won by Orville Moody), the 1993 U.S. Amateur Championship (won by John Harris), the 1998 U.S. Women’s Mid-Amateur Championship (won by Derby Grimes) and five PGA Tour Championships.

“My husband played on five Ryder Cup Teams, was a Ryder Cup captain twice and an assistant captain to Hal Sutton in 2004,” said Burke. “Hopefully, this new responsibility will provide me equal talking time over dinner! I am excited about calling my friend Ellen Port and seeing if she kept good notes. I look forward to taking it all in.”

## 2016 Conditions of Play

### Conducting Organization

The International Golf Federation, previously known as the World Amateur Golf Council, which is represented by national federations and 23 professional members, conducts the Women's World Amateur Team Championship. The IGF is the international federation for golf for the International Olympic Committee (IOC).

### Host Organization

The Mexican Golf Federation is the host.

### The Teams

May be two or three players per team.

### Format

72 holes stroke play; 18 holes played on each of four days.

### Scoring

In each round, the total of the two lowest scores by players from each team constitutes the team score for that round. The four-day total is the team's score for the championship.

### Schedule of Play

Wednesday, Sept. 14 — First round

Thursday, Sept. 15 — Second Round

Friday, Sept. 16 — Third round

Saturday, Sept. 17 — Fourth round

### Miscellaneous

Players must be amateur golfers under the Rules of Amateur Status of The R&A and the United States Golf Association. Players must be nationals of the country represented.

### Sites

The championship is rotated biennially among three geographic zones: Asia-Pacific, American and European-African. The 2018 championship will be played in Ireland.



## Australia Wins the 2014 Championship

Australia, with a combined final-round score of 13-under-par 131 from Minjee Lee and Su Oh, rallied from seven strokes behind Canada to win the 2014 Women's World Amateur Team Championship (WWATC) at Karuizawa 72 Golf East's Iriyama Course.

"They never thought they were out of it, but they were close to possibly being out of it," said Australian Captain Matt Cutler, whose team posted a 72-hole total of 29-under 547. "We had a really slow start to the week with an even-par round at Iriyama (Wednesday) and we thought we might have too much work to do. But, it was the fastest start you could ever see coming."

Australia, which won the Espirito Santo Trophy for the third time, took the lead through six holes of the final round as Lee, No. 1 in the Women's World Amateur Golf Ranking™, was 4 under through five holes on an eagle and two birdies and Oh was 3 under with three birdies.

Lee, 18, who tied for 22nd at the 2014 U.S. Women's Open and won the 2012 U.S. Girls' Junior, finished the day with an eagle and five birdies for a 65 while Oh, No. 6 in the WWAGR, tallied six birdies for a 66. Neither recorded a bogey. Shelly Shin, a semifinalist in the 2014 U.S. Girls' Junior, posted a non-counting 72 in the 3-count-2 format.

The Australians broke the mark for a final-round comeback of three strokes, which was set by their countrymen in 2002 in Malaysia. The team's 72-hole total of 547 was one stroke shy of Korea's record low in 2010 and the final-round 131 is second-best all-time.

With scores of 64 in the third round and 65 in the final round, Lee fueled the Australians' move up the leader board. They moved from 12th to fourth after the third round.

"I wanted to make this something to remember," said Lee. "I have matured so much in two years and I wanted this to be a priceless experience for everyone."

Canada, which led each of the first three days and was vying for its first WWATC win, finished second at 27-under 549 behind the outstanding play of world No. 2 Brooke Mackenzie Henderson. It was Canada's fourth silver medal. The Republic of Korea, which won the title in 2010 and 2012, finished third at 550.

Denmark (556) was fourth, followed by the USA and Sweden, who shared fifth at 557. The USA, owners of a record 13 WWATC titles, was seeking its first championship since 1998. Mexico (560), England (562), host country Japan (562) and the Philippines (563) rounded out the top 10.

"Australia had a great round today; I was really impressed," said Henderson, who finished tied for 10th to earn low-amateur honors at the 2014 U.S. Women's Open and was runner-up at the 2014 U.S. Women's Amateur. "They have very skilled players, including two in the top 10 in the world rankings, which is unbelievable. It's a little disappointing to finish second, but overall we had a really great week and played really well as a team."

Although there is no official recognition, Henderson led the individual standings at 19-under 269, which breaks the WWATC mark of 274 by 2012 U.S. Women's Amateur champion Lydia Ko, of New Zealand, in 2012. Minjee Lee finished second at 16-under 272.

Alison Lee, a member of the victorious 2014 USA Curtis Cup Team, led the Americans with a 14-under total of 274, which tied for third in the individual standings with Bronte Law, of England. Lee and Law are sophomores at UCLA. Lee closed with a 4-under 68 on the Iriyama Course. Three of her four rounds were in the 60s and she bettered par each day.

Kristen Gillman, who defeated Henderson to win the U.S. Women's Amateur last month, added a final-round 71 for the Americans. She finished at 3-under 285 for the championship. Emma Talley, the 2013 U.S. Women's Amateur champion and Lee's Curtis Cup teammate, had a non-counting 74 and finished at 291 for the week.

"Alison was hitting the ball as well as she had any other day, maybe even better, but she just couldn't buy a putt," said USA captain Martha Lang. "Her birdies were tap-ins. Kristen was 3 under before she made three straight bogeys, but she hung in there. And today, unfortunately, Emma never got it going. Overall, we are pleased and disappointed at the same time."

"We felt the course was very gettable and there are some really good scores out there. But we just couldn't make as many putts as we wanted. When you finish 11 or 12 strokes back and you divide that over four days with two players, it's really just a shot or two here and there. But I guess everyone could say that."

### Championship Notes

---

Australia's comeback in the final round broke the record by four strokes (previous mark was three by Australia in 2002) ... Australia's 72-hole winning score of 457 is just one off record held by Korea (456) in 2010 ... WAGR™ No. 1 Minjee Lee's 65 and Australia's 131 were both championship marks for individual and team scoring in the fourth round. She also shot a third-round 64, the second-lowest score in history ... Canada fired the lowest first round score with a 135 (66 by Brooke Henderson and 69 by Augusta James) on the Oshitate Course ... Henderson's 66 was the second-lowest first-round score in history ... In the second round, Japan fired the second best team score in history at 132 behind a 65 from Minami Katsu and a 67 from Eri Okayama and moved from 16th to second place .... Poland's Nastasia Kossack scored a hole-in-one on Iriyama's seventh hole in the third round ... More sub par scores (156) were recorded at the 2014 WWATC than the previous record of 105 in Argentina in 2010.

### General Notes

---

A total of 50 teams competed in the 26th Women's World Amateur Team Championship, which is the third highest in championship history ... 53 teams played in Turkey in 2012 and 52 played in 2010 ... The WWATC celebrated 50 years in 2014. The first championship, won by France, was played Oct. 1–4, 1964, at St. Germain Golf Club, St. Germain (Paris), France. 25 teams competed that year and each of those nations was represented at the 2014 championship except Chile and Bermuda ... Six of the top 10 finishers at the 2014 Youth Olympic Games in Nanjing, China, competed in the 2014 WWATC: gold medalist So-Young Lee, of the Republic of Korea, and silver medalist Ssu-Chia Cheng, of Chinese Taipei,

as well as Olivia Cowan, of Germany, and Virginia Elena Carta, of Italy (tied for fourth), Emily Kristine Pederson, of Denmark (sixth), and Julianne Alvarez, of New Zealand (seventh), were among the top finishers. In addition, Linnea Strom and Marcus Kinhult of Sweden won the gold medal in the mixed team event. The Republic of Korea, with So-Young Lee and Eun Ho Youm, was second and Italy, with Virginia Elena Carta and Renato Paratore, was third ... Beatriz Arenas, 66, of Guatemala, was the oldest player in her 11th WWATC appearance as either a player (eight) or captain (three) ... Four 14 year-olds were the youngest competitors: Jo-Hua Jung, of Chinese Taipei; Maria Ines Barbosa, of Portugal; Dorota Zalewska, of Poland; and Valeria Pacheco, of Puerto Rico.

## Championship History

What began as a proposal for a match in 1964 between the USA and France grew into the Women's World Amateur Team Championship.

The impetus for this championship was an invitation by the French Golf Federation for the USA Curtis Cup Team to stop off in France for an informal match after that year's Curtis Cup Match in Wales.

The USGA accepted the invitation, but also suggested inviting other nations to create a women's counterpart to the World Amateur Team Championship. That event for men's teams began in 1958 after an invitation from Japan to establish a match between the two nations.

The French were delighted to sponsor the inaugural women's championship and arranged for it to be played at the St. Germain Golf Club, near Paris, in October 1964. The event, under the chairmanship of Vicomtesse de Saint-Sauveur, was a triumph.

A total of 25 teams and 75 players participated, which instantly established the competition as a member of international golf's family of championships. Spectator enthusiasm at the first championship was keen, since the host team prevailed over the USA by one stroke.

The French player Catherine Lacoste, who would later become a heroine of the amateur game when she won the 1967 U.S.

Women's Open, was a big factor in the excitement in her home country. Her final-round 73 secured the Espirito Santo Trophy for France. Lacoste tied with the USA's Carol Sorenson at 294 for medalist honors.

While no prize is given for individual scoring, Lydia Ko, 15, of New Zealand, set a championship mark for lowest individual score at 14-under-par 274 at the 2012 Women's World Amateur Team Championship. Ko, the reigning U.S. Women's Amateur champion and winner of the LPGA Tour's CN Canadian Open, broke the mark set in 2010 by Korea's Jung-Eun Han at 275.

In 1966, the World Amateur Golf Council assumed sponsorship of future Women's World Amateur Team Championships. Since its second-place finish in the inaugural, the USA has dominated, winning 13 times. Australia (1978, 2002), Spain (1986, 1992), Sweden (2004, 2008), France (1964, 2000) and Korea (1996, 2010) are the only other multiple victors.

For the first time, in 2002, the championship for the Espirito Santo Trophy was played on two courses.

In 2003, the organization's name was changed to the International Golf Federation.

## 2016 Conditions of Play

### Conducting Organization

The International Golf Federation, previously known as the World Amateur Golf Council, which is represented by national federations and 23 professional members, conducts the Women's World Amateur Team Championship. The IGF is the international federation for golf for the International Olympic Committee (IOC).

### Host Organization

The Mexican Golf Federation is the host.

### The Teams

May be two or three players per team.

### Format

72 holes stroke play; 18 holes played on each of four days.

### Scoring

In each round, the total of the two lowest scores by players from each team constitutes the team score for that round. The four-day total is the team's score for the championship.

### Schedule of Play

Wednesday, Sept. 21 — First round

Thursday, Sept. 22 — Second Round

Friday, Sept. 23 — Third round

Saturday, Sept. 24 — Fourth round

### Miscellaneous

Players must be amateur golfers under the Rules of Amateur Status of The R&A and the United States Golf Association. Players must be nationals of the country represented.

### Sites

The championship is rotated biennially among three geographic zones: Asia-Pacific, American and European-African. The 2018 championship will be played in Ireland.



## USA Wins the 2014 Championship

Denny McCarthy's 8-under-par 64 and Bryson DeChambeau's 9-foot birdie putt on the 18th green for a 73 clinched the Eisenhower Trophy for the USA, which staved off a final-round charge from Canada at Karuizawa 72 Golf East on Saturday to successfully defend their 2012 title and win the World Amateur Team Championship (WATC) for the 15th time.

"It was very exciting right down to the last putt," USA captain Jim Hyler said. "I'm so thrilled for these three young men. They played really hard all four days. We had different people count each day and it is a team event and I think the way it worked out for us really highlights what a great team event it is."

The Americans won with a record score of 38-under-par 534, eclipsing the 554 total of the Netherlands in 2006 by 20 strokes.

Canada won the silver medal, two strokes behind the USA at 536 and Spain, fueled by the lowest 72-hole individual score in history (263) by Jon Rahm, won the bronze medal at 537.

McCarthy, a semifinalist at last month's U.S. Amateur, was 8 under through eight holes on the par-72 Iriyama Course and set the WATC mark for lowest nine-hole score when he made the turn in 28. He was the only member of the gold-medal team to record all four scores in the 60s. Beau Hossler, the 2014 Western Amateur champion, posted a non-counting 75 for the USA in the fourth round.

"I knew my score was counting for sure so my game plan on the back nine was to not do anything stupid or crazy and not drop any shots," said McCarthy, a senior All-American at the University of Virginia. "At the same time, I still needed to be aggressive and give myself chances because he (playing competitor Adam Svensson) was making birdies and I knew he was going to count for Canada."

Canada, which began the day six strokes behind the USA, used a 7-under 65 from Svensson, an All-American at Barry University in Miami, Fla., and a 4-under 68 from 2014 U.S. Amateur runner-up Corey Conners for a team total of 133.

Canada and the USA were tied at 37 under par when DeChambeau and Conners, playing in the last group, reached the 18th tee.

Both players hit their drives in the fairway on the 443-yard, par-4. DeChambeau, who shot a WATC-record 61 in Friday's third round, played first and hit a 50-degree wedge from 110 yards. Conners' approach settled 35 feet from the hole on the back collar.

"I didn't know about the scores and I wasn't sure if his would be counting or not," said Conners, a 2014 Kent State University graduate. "There was never a doubt that he was going to make it. It was a pretty nice-looking putt."

Conners left his birdie attempt short, which set the stage for DeChambeau's winning birdie.

"I knew where we stood when I was on the 18th tee box and I knew that I needed a birdie on the last," said DeChambeau, an All-American at Southern Methodist University, "I striped my drive and hit a wedge in there and nailed that nine-footer. I said that I needed to make birdie and I went out and made birdie"

"We fought back really hard today," said Canadian captain Graham Hill. "We knew that we were going to have to play well to have a chance and we played great and brought it right to the last hole. Obviously, it didn't work out the way that we wanted but we're really proud of the guys for the way they played and the way they handled themselves. It's a good finish for us, disappointing not to win but we're happy with it."

Sweden was fourth at 538; Argentina was fifth at 539; Australia, England and France were tied for sixth at 540; Scotland was ninth at 542 and Switzerland was 10th at 544. Japan, the host team, finished tied for 29th.

The previous mark for low individual score for 72 holes was held by golf legend Jack Nicklaus, who shot 269 in 1960 at Merion Golf Club in Ardmore, Pa., site of the 2013 U.S. Open. Rahm's four rounds were 70-64-62-67 for 23-under-par 263

"I'm about ready to cry right now because, honestly, Jack Nicklaus is a hero," said Rahm, an All-American at Arizona State. "I can't really explain how good it feels to beat his record. It's just unbelievable."

The USA, which also won in Turkey in 2012, has now recorded 27 top-five finishes in 29 Eisenhower Trophy competitions.

"There's personal achievements that we've all had but it's in a different league to play for your country and represent your country well," said Hossler, who posted counting scores of 68 and 66 in the first two rounds. "We're very proud of what we've done this week. Denny and Bryson played incredibly these last two days and for me to reap the benefits of that is nice. I struggled today but it's definitely an honor to represent your country and get a W."

Forty-two of the 67 teams posted 72-hole totals that were under par.

The three lowest scores in history were recorded by Bryson DeChambeau of the USA (61, third round, Oshitate), Jon Rahm of Spain (62, third round, Oshitate) and Frederick Eckhardt of Finland (62 in fourth round at Iriyama ... Manuel Jimenez of Costa Rica played in his 12th Eisenhower Trophy, tying the mark of Roberto Gomez of Brazil ... A total of 67 teams participated in the 29th World Amateur Team Championship ... Ghana was the only country making its first appearance in the World Amateur Team Championship ... ## Championship History

The idea of a World Amateur Team Championship and the World Amateur Golf Council grew out of a suggestion that the USGA received to sponsor a team match between the USA and Japan in 1957.

The USGA, which received many such invitations from other countries, simply could not accept them all.

The USGA instead suggested a team competition that would bring together the best players of all countries, accommodating all possible interests. Even those American advocates of adding golf to the Olympics seemed satisfied with the World Team Championship idea.

In January 1958, the USGA Executive Committee approved in principle a plan for such a championship. That March, a group of USGA representatives, including USGA President John D. Ames, met with officials of the Royal & Ancient Golf Club to discuss the plan. St. Andrews was proposed as the site of the first championship later that year. The R&A joined in implementing the idea. In May, representatives of the national amateur golf associations of 35 countries attending a planning conference in Washington, D.C., formed the World Amateur Golf Council. The council had 32 member organizations and planned the first championship.

President Dwight D. Eisenhower received the delegates in the Rose Garden of the White House and consented to the naming of the championship prize as The Eisenhower Trophy. Eisenhower endorsed the concept, saying, "Both officially and personally I am interested in the plan advanced by the USGA for an amateur team golf championship among nations. I visualize it, as you do, as a potent force for establishing goodwill and friendship between yet another segment of the populations of nations."

The championship received yet another stroke of good luck when Bob Jones agreed to be captain of the first USA Team. Jones had taken the first leg of his 1930 Grand Slam at St. Andrews by winning the British Amateur, but 22 years had passed since he had visited there last.

The first championship was played over the Old Course of St. Andrews in October 1958, and 115 players representing 29 countries played. Australia won in a playoff with the USA. The lowest individual scores for the 72 holes were 301s by William Hyndman III, of the USA, Bruce Devlin, of Australia, and Reid Jack, of Great Britain and Ireland.

Jack Nicklaus, who represented the USA in 1960 at Merion Golf Club (East Course), in Ardmore, Pa., holds the 72-hole individual scoring record of 269, although individual scores are not recognized with a prize.

While the USA has prevailed in 14 of the 28 competitions, Great Britain and Ireland has won four times, and countries as diverse in the world of golf as Australia, Canada, Japan, New Zealand, Netherlands, Scotland and Sweden have each captured the Eisenhower Trophy.

The World Amateur Team Championship has now been conducted in 24 nations.

The organization's name changed to the International Golf Federation in 2003.

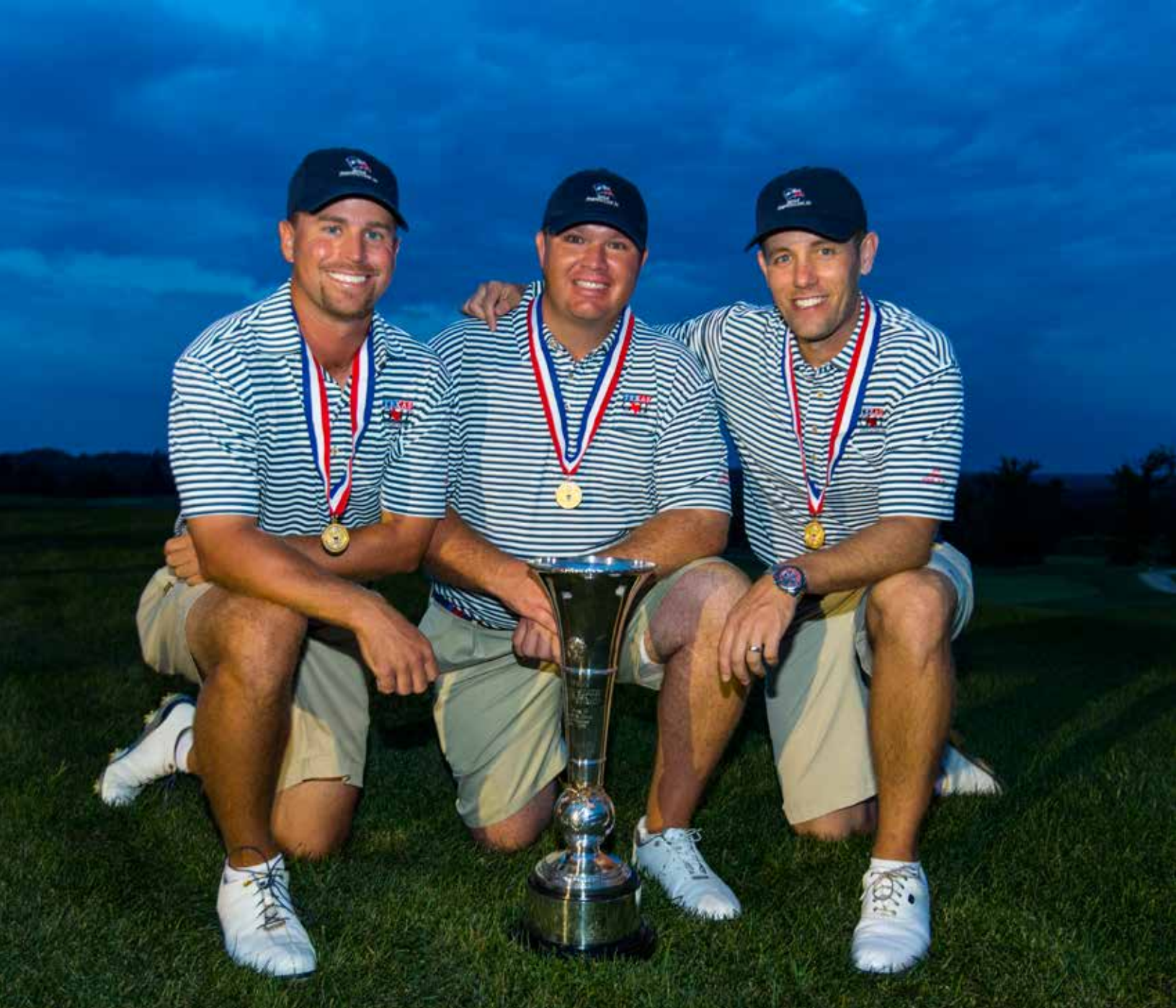

## 2016 Conditions of Play

### The Teams

All states and the District of Columbia and Puerto Rico may enter teams of three players. Entries are open to male amateur golfers whose permanent residence is in the state they represent and who have been nominated by the USGA designated state or regional golf association. College golfers are not eligible under NCAA rules.

### Format

54 holes of stroke play; 18 holes played on each of three days.

### Scoring

In each round, the total of the two lowest scores by players on each team constitutes the team score for the round. The three day total is the team's score for the championship.

## Texas Wins the 2014 Championship

Texas captured a record-fourth USGA Men's State Team Championship on Thursday, posting a total score of 4-under-par 428 to edge Florida by three strokes at the par-72, 6,891-yard Pete Dye Course at French Lick Resort.

The trio of Zach Atkinson, Colby Harwell and Aaron Hickman entered the final round with a three-stroke cushion, and saw their advantage grow to as many as seven strokes early in the round, but a late charge by Florida briefly knotted things at the top of the leader board before Texas pulled away at the end. Texas posted a final-round score of 1-over 145, its highest of the championship, but a 1-under 71 from Atkinson provided enough cushion to claim the James R. Hand Trophy for the first time since 2007.

Iowa, the runner-up in 2012, finished third with a score of 2-over 434.

The win for Texas was a true team effort, as each player had two of his three scores count during the championship. Harwell's 75 was the non-counting score in the final round, but that didn't diminish the moment.

"That just tells you right there how strong Texas is. The three of us fought pretty hard for two years to get to this point. I'm really proud of all three of us for doing what we did and fighting it out all week," said Harwell, whose only experience competing in a USGA championship prior to the Men's State Team was in the 2013 U.S. Mid-Amateur. "To have my hands on a USGA trophy, I mean, this is just unbelievable. I can't believe that I've got my hands on one at all. I'm excited."

Atkinson made back-to-back birdies on the first two holes, contributing to Texas' big early lead, but soon faltered, playing Nos. 4 through 7 in 4 over par, a stretch that culminated with a double bogey on the par-5 seventh to all but negate his fast start. He didn't make another bogey the rest of the way, however, playing the last 10 holes in 3 under.

"I probably just beared down a little more. Last nine of a big tournament, USGA event, so, the stakes are high," said Atkinson. "I just tried to bear down and hit my targets and I did. I made a good 10-footer on 10, a little 10-footer that got me going. I didn't really miss a shot after that."

Atkinson's fifth and final birdie of the round came on the 18th hole when he made a short putt to seal the victory.

"I thought that was to tie if Gene [Elliott] from Iowa didn't make birdie," Atkinson said. "So, I had no idea that it was for a couple-shot victory. I might have cozied it down just a touch more. I don't know."

Hickman added a 2-over 74, the second counting score for Texas. Hickman, playing in his third consecutive Men's State

Team, could not have been more thrilled to help rekindle his team's traditionally strong play in the championship. Already the only state to have won more than twice, Texas had not finished higher than tied for 10th since its last victory in 2007, and Hickman was eager to change that.

"Every time you make it, it's special. It's hard to qualify for a team like this. In Texas, we have a ton of great players. To make the team and to be a part of a team that wins is amazing," Hickman said. "Being on the team three times, they start asking a lot of questions, when are you going to win one? When we get back, I can tell them I won one now. It's a pretty special day."

Florida, which entered the day in fifth place and six strokes back of Texas, made an early charge up the leader board, thanks in large part to Jon Veneziano. Playing in his fourth Men's State Team, Veneziano, 43, provided veteran leadership on a team that included 17-year-olds Sam Horsfield and Gabriel Lench. Veneziano provided clutch shots that kept Florida in the mix.

Veneziano, who defeated David Duval in the Round of 16 of the 1988 U.S. Junior Amateur, made an early double bogey before he righted the ship. He followed up a birdie on the par-4 sixth hole by holing out a 68-yard approach shot for eagle on the par-5 seventh and added another birdie on No. 9, giving him a 3-under 33 on the outward nine. He would go on to post a 2-under 70, combining with Lench's even-par 72 for a team score of 2-under 142, sealing Florida's third runner-up finish in the championship.

"We knew the wind was going to be an issue, so we just said let's go out there and do our best and try not to make big numbers, and hopefully one of us can play really well," Veneziano said. "We knew we had to get two scores under par if we were going to come and get the leaders, but this course is just so hard. It was fun, it was a great week."

Iowa was led by 2013 U.S. Mid-Amateur champion Mike McCoy, who bounced back from a second-round 77 with an even-par 72. The Hawkeye State has now finished in the top three in two consecutive Men's State Teams, while still searching for its first victory.

"Every shot is success or failure here. You just miss a shot and you're penalized significantly. It's really severe, you pay a price," said McCoy, who carded four birdies, but also had a double bogey on the par-4 fifth. "I knew we were close, we had to overcome some [bad] shots, we just didn't get it going. We were ready, we had our game faces on."

Louisiana and Puerto Rico tied for fifth with scores of 5-over 437. Louisiana was led by Brandon Aydtlett, who earned the championship's individual medalist honors at 3-under 216.

The win for Texas was their fourth in Men's State Team history. They entered the week as the only state to have won the championship three times ... All 50 states, plus Washington, D.C. and Puerto Rico, were represented in the field ... Hawaii was the youngest team in the championship, with an average age of 17.7. Wyoming (51.3) was the oldest ... Hawaii's Andrew Chin (15) was the youngest player in the field, while Nebraska's John Sajevic (58) was the oldest ... Virginia's Keith Decker competed in the championship for the 11th time, the only player to have competed in every Men's State Team ... Nebraska's team included a father–son tandem in John and Andrew Sajevic ... The Men's State Team was the third 2014 USGA championship to be contested on a course designed by Pete Dye, joining the U.S. Senior Open (Oak Tree National) and U.S. Women's Mid–Amateur (Harbour Trees Golf Club) ... Defending champion New York tied for 17th, with none of the players on the 2012 squad competing ... There were four USGA individual champions in the field: Scott Harvey (2014 U.S. Mid–Amateur), Tim Hogarth (1996 U.S. Amateur Public Links), Mike McCoy (2013 U.S. Mid–Amateur) and Nathan Smith (2003, 2009, 2010, 2012 U.S. Mid–Amateur) ... ## Championship History

The USGA Men's State Team Championship, as well as the Women's State Team Championship, grew out of the Association's centennial celebration in 1995. It was decided that a new championship, one in which each state could be represented by non-collegiate, amateur golfers, was a good way to cap the USGA's year-long celebration. The State Team Championship proved such a success that it has returned every two years.

The championship was fashioned after the biennial World Amateur Team Championships. Each state was invited to send three players; 46 states and Puerto Rico sent teams to compete at Lake Nona Golf Club in Orlando, Fla., in 1995, and 50 states and Puerto Rico sent teams to compete at SunRidge Canyon Golf Club in Fountain Hills, Ariz., in 1997. From 2001 to 2007 and from 2010 to 2014, 52 teams — all 50 states, Puerto Rico and the District of Columbia — participated.

State associations were given the option to choose their teams by any method. College players, however, were ineligible due to NCAA bylaws. Under current NCAA rules, a player may only participate in an international team match when that team is sponsored by the national governing body, such as in the Walker Cup Match. Otherwise, the player is faced with being declared ineligible for the remainder of the season of the infraction, as well as the following season.

Some states chose their players by a point system. Some selected the top finishers from their state championships or conducted qualifying tournaments. Other states empanelled selection committees that sifted through the year's results.

The first Men's State Team Championship, conducted Oct. 26–28, 1995, gave a decided advantage to Southern teams as it came beyond the competitive season for many states. The South Dakota team, for example, had left home with six inches of snow on the ground, and the Alaskans had not played since mid-September.

Based on the original World Amateur Team format, in which each team fields four players, with only the best three scores counted each of three rounds, Virginia prevailed in the inaugural championship. Minnesota, with nationally decorated amateur John Harris leading the way, won the 1997 event with a cumulative score of 416, 10 under par.

The lone individual prize is a bronze medal to the low scorer, but it is important that many of the best amateurs in the country have supported these early championships. In 1997, four members of that year's USA Walker Cup Team played, including Harris, and many USGA champions have represented their home state.

### U.S. Women's Amateur Public Links Championship Trophy

The championship trophy was presented in 1977 by Robert F. Dwyer, of Portland, Ore. Dwyer had been a member of the USGA Executive Committee from 1962 through 1974 and was a member of the Public Links Committee.

## Jo Wins the 2014 Championship

Fumie (Alice) Jo won the 2014 U.S. Women's Amateur Public Links Championship, never trailing in her 3-and-2 victory over Eun Jeong Seong at The Home Course and forever etching her name in United States Golf Association history.

Jo, 15, is the first USGA champion from the mainland of the People's Republic of China. She is the second-youngest champion in WAPL history, following 13-year-old Michelle Wie in 2003. She is also the final winner in the 38-year history of the Women's Amateur Public Links, as the championship was officially retired following completion of play.

"In China, I think everyone will be talking about (my victory)," said Jo, a ninth-grader in Shanghai who was playing in her first USGA championship. "I'm just really happy."

Seong, 14, of the Republic of Korea, joins Jo in the WAPL record books. She set 18- and 36-hole scoring records during Monday and Tuesday's stroke-play rounds on her way to earning medalist honors.

"My stroke-play (performance) was exceptional and I played really well," said Seong. "I could not play that well all the time. There were some ups and downs."

The Jo-Seong match was also the first and only all-international final in championship history.

Jo was twice able to take a 3-up lead during the morning round. The first came at No. 11, when she stuffed her wedge approach to 3 feet and made birdie. Her bogey at the par-4 12th after coming up short of the green dropped her lead to two. However, Seong was forced to concede the par-3 14th after her drive found the water behind the green and Jo stuck her tee shot to 6 feet.

Jo's lead again fell to 2 up after her drive at the par-4 18th found a fairway bunker. She made the green in three, but her 40-foot par attempt came up just short. Seong's 30-foot birdie putt just skimmed the right side of the hole, and her par was conceded.

Following the midday break, it looked like the pressure was getting to Jo. After Seong stuck her tee shot at the 24th hole within inches, Jo three-putted for bogey. Then at No. 25, a par 3, she left her tee shot well short of the green and then hit her birdie putt too hard, sending the ball off the back of the green. Her lead was back to a tenuous 1-up margin.

"I was really nervous ... because I knew she was going to play very aggressively," said Jo. "She was just going to go for the flag."

As she had throughout the week, Jo turned to her mother and caddie, Joy, for calming advice.

"She kept telling me to relax, not feel too nervous," said Jo. "She was a big help."

Mom's comforting words had an immediate effect. Jo executed a masterful chip from the rough at No. 28, landing 4 feet from the hole. She made the birdie putt to go 2 up.

She regained her 3-up lead at the par-3 30th hole, when Seong's par putt clipped the right edge of the hole and rolled out.

Jo ultimately took the victory on the 16th green, the 34th hole of the final match. Seong's second shot flew over the back of the green, while Jo's ball sat in the front fringe. Seong's chip flew high and rolled 30 feet below the hole.

Jo lagged her putt to 6 feet, and when Seong's par attempt slid over the right edge of the hole, she conceded the hole and the match.

Despite taking the loss after dominating stroke play, Seong was able to take some lessons from the week.

"I learned from watching other players play, especially putting and short game," said Seong. "That will help a lot for next week (at the U.S. Girls' Junior)."

In 2013, she became the second-youngest player in U.S. Women's Amateur Public Links history at 10 years, 8 months and 16 days of age and the youngest to ever reach match play. She also became the youngest competitor in U.S. Women's Amateur Championship history ... The championship's oldest competitor was 45-year-old Hui Chong Dofflemyer, of Belvidere, Ill. Lucy Nunn, 27, of Lawton, Okla., was the only other mid-amateur in the championship field ... There were 10 countries represented at the cham-

pionship: Argentina, Australia, Brazil, Canada, the People's Republic of China, France, the Republic of Korea, New Zealand, Thailand and the United States of America ... There were 34 states represented at the championship: Arizona, California, Colorado, Florida, Georgia, Hawaii, Illinois, Indiana, Iowa, Kansas, Kentucky, Maryland, Massachusetts, Michigan, Minnesota, Missouri, Nevada, New Jersey, New Mexico, New York, North Carolina, North Dakota, Ohio, Oklahoma, Oregon, Pennsylvania, South Carolina, South Dakota, Tennessee, Texas, Utah, Virginia, Washington and Wisconsin ... There were four USGA champions in the field: Doris Chen (2010 U.S. Girls' Junior), Lauren Diaz-Yi (2013 U.S. Women's Amateur Public Links), Kyung Kim (2012 U.S. Women's Amateur Public Links) and Gabriella Then (2013 U.S. Girls' Junior). Additionally, Alice Chen and Cindy Ha were members of New Jersey's winning team at the 2013 USGA Women's State Team Championship ... There were three USGA runners-up in the field: Lakareber Abe (2013 U.S. Girls' Junior), Chen (2013 U.S. Women's Amateur Public Links) and Marissa Dodd (2011 U.S. Women's Amateur Public Links) ... Champion Fumie (Alice) Jo was among a group of golfers from Yani Tseng International/China who were visiting the U.S. Backed by Tseng, a five-time major champion and winner of the 2004 Women's Amateur Public Links, the organization runs a golf academy and sponsors a series of competitions ... Past WAPL champions Kelli Antolock (1983) and Lori Castillo (1979, 1980) attended the Players Dinner, which celebrated the final playing of the Women's Amateur Public Links.

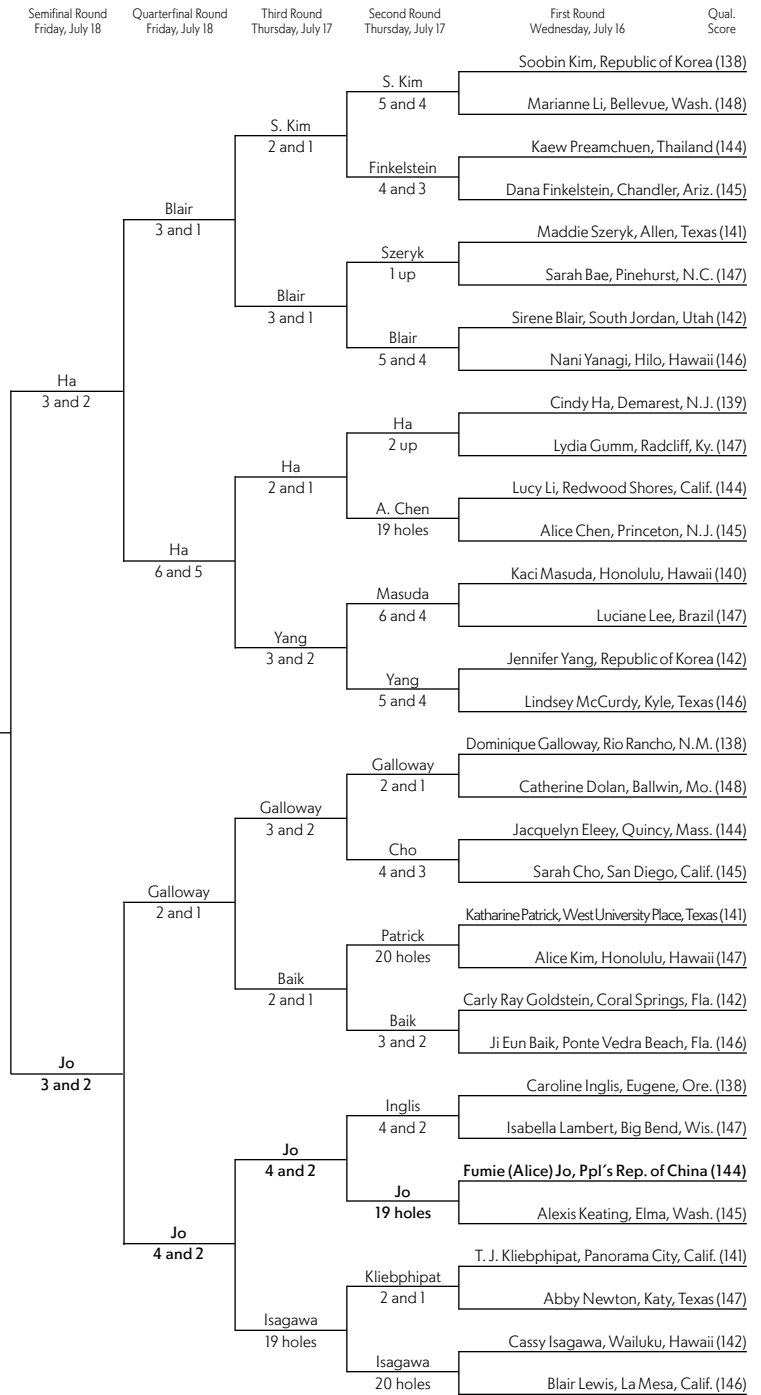

## Championship History

In April 1977, when entries for the first U.S. Women's Amateur Public Links Championship began to trickle in, there was concern.

Would the first national championship ever staged for women who play the country's public courses attract enough players to fill the field? Did it justify the effort to set up 27 qualifying sites around the country?

By May, the trickle of entries had become a steady stream. When the June deadline for entries arrived and the results were tallied, the astonishing reality was that this championship had attracted a field of 686 players — more than the combined fields of the 1977 Women's Amateur, Women's Open, Senior Women's Amateur and Girls' Junior.

The entry figure was amazing for several reasons. First, this was a new championship that would need time to build interest. Second, some states didn't even have organizations to assist women public-course players, conduct sectional qualifying or raise funds, and the 686 entries were drawn from only 24 states.

The 1977 championship was played on the East Course of Yahara Hills Golf Course in Madison, Wis. Kelly Fuiks, 19, of Phoenix, Ariz., was the first champion. In fact, for the first four years, the championship was the personal property of two outstanding players. Fuiks won again in 1978 before turning professional. Lori Castillo won in 1979 and 1980, and at one time held or shared every individual record in the championship. Castillo won 11 consecutive matches before losing in the second round in 1981.

The championship received a boost when Castillo was selected as a member of the 1980 USA Curtis Cup Team. By that year, the Women's Amateur Public Links was regarded as a highly competitive arena for some of the best amateurs in

the country. Since then, Heather Farr, Danielle Ammaccapane, Cindy Schreyer, Tracy Kerdyk, Pearl Sinn, Tracy Hanson, Amy Fruhwirth, Jill McGill, Jo Jo Robertson, Annie Thurman (Young), Michelle Wie, Tiffany Joh, Mina Harigae, Jennifer Song, Emily Tubert and Kyung Kim, all WAPL champions, also have been named to Curtis Cup Teams.

Sinn accomplished a unique double in 1988 when she won the Women's Amateur as well as the Women's Amateur Public Links. When she repeated as WAPL champion in 1989, she and Curtis Strange, who won the U.S. Open, were the only two to repeat as USGA champions that year. Jennifer Song also won both titles in 2009.

McGill also achieved the double win. She was the holder of the 1993 U.S. Women's Amateur title when she won the 1994 Women's Amateur Public Links Championship.

In 2003, Wie became the youngest winner of an "adult" USGA championship at the age of 13.

The championship also was noteworthy due to its team trophy, which was captured a record five times by teams from Phoenix, Ariz., and Murietta, Calif. The team championship was discontinued following the 2008 championship.

In 2002, the final was played over 36 holes for the first time. In 2005, a Handicap Index® limit of 18.4 was established.

The U.S. Amateur Public Links and U.S. Women's Amateur Public Links Championships were retired following the 2014 season. The decision followed an internal review which determined that the APL and WAPL championships no longer serve their original mission because of the widespread accessibility public-course golfers today enjoy in USGA championships.

### **U.S. Amateur Public Links Championship Trophy**

The U.S. Amateur Public Links Championship Trophy was presented in 1922 by James D. Standish Jr., the central figure in organizing this championship. Standish served a 13-year tenure as a member of the USGA Executive Committee, including two years as president from 1950–51.

## Meth Wins the 2014 Championship

After never trailing at any point through five matches and 92 holes, Byron Meth fell 1 down to Doug Ghim on the 10th hole of the championship match after hitting a ball out of bounds and two into a water hazard.

But in the end, Meth, 21, from San Diego, climbed back from the deficit to reach the spot where he had been all week — on top — and defeated Ghim in a closely contested 37-hole match to claim the 89th and final U.S. Amateur Public Links Championship, at the 7,365-yard, par-71 Sand Creek Station Golf Course.

In the first APL championship match played between co-medalists since 1929, Meth and Ghim did not disappoint, playing an entertaining, extremely competitive match marked by a high level of play. The players halved four holes with birdies, and Meth made 11 birdies to Ghim's seven birdies and three eagles (one conceded).

The morning and afternoon rounds had similar rhythms. In both, Meth went up – 3 up in the first 18, 2 up in the second — before Ghim, 18, of Arlington Heights, Ill., came back to take the lead during the middle of the course. Meth recovered during the closing holes, and the players walked off the 18th green the way the day had begun: all square.

But when they finished playing the 18th hole for the second time, the momentum was clearly with Meth, who proved to be the tougher competitor. Standing on the 36th tee with a 1 up lead, Ghim hit a drive right, out of bounds. He made a double-bogey 6 on the 429-yard closing hole, allowing Meth to win despite a three-putt.

The first hole of the playoff was the par-5 10th — a hole Ghim had won twice on Saturday. After both players found the fair-

way with their drives, Ghim hit another shot to the right – this time with a 3-wood – that found the lateral hazard running down the right side of the hole. Ghim was able to hack out, but hit his fourth shot over the green. Meth played his second away from trouble into the left rough and found the green safely in regulation. When Ghim's chip didn't find the hole, two putts gave Meth the championship.

"It's just an absolute honor," said Meth of being the final APL champion. "My dad and I were joking about being the perpetual champion coming into this [championship]. It was a week I'll never forget."

Ghim and Meth kept the mood light, even as they endured the pressure-filled crucible of a championship final. Arriving on the first tee to start the second 18, Ghim fist-bumped Meth and said, "Let's have some fun."

"I couldn't wipe the smile off my face all day," said Meth, a senior at the University of the Pacific. "It was just an absolute blast and one of the best weeks on the golf course I've ever had, regardless of the actual scores and the results. It was just so much fun."

For the second consecutive match, Ghim found himself 3 down early in the round. Despite a late surge against Meth that positioned him 1 up on the 36th tee, Ghim could not finish the comeback the way he did against Michael Gellerman in the semifinals.

"I'm proud of how I fought at various times when it looked like there might not be any chance to get to the next round," said Ghim, who will attend the University of Texas this fall. "I feel like I proved myself, and I'm very excited for the future."

### Weather

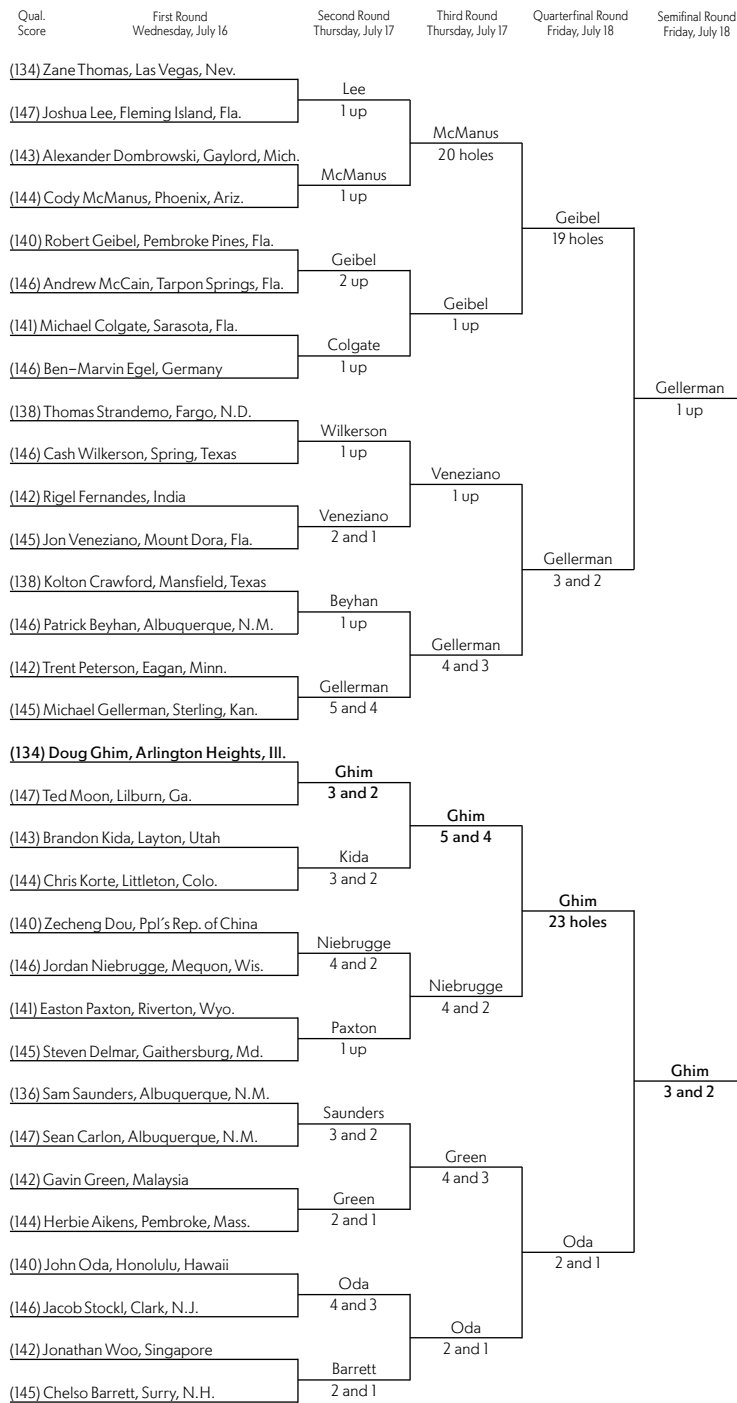
Both stroke-play rounds saw temperatures in the mid-80s with gusty afternoon breezes. There were unseasonably cool temperatures for the first three rounds of match play, with highs topping out in the upper 60s, nearly 25 degrees cooler than normal. Temperatures rebounded to the lower 80s for the rest of the week with a consistent afternoon breeze of 20 to 25 MPH.

### Notes

The final between Meth and Ghim was the first APL championship match played between co-medalists since 1929 ... Meth was the 11th medalist to win the championship ... Semifinalist Michael Gellerman grew up just an hour northwest of Newton ... Charlie Danielson shot a first-nine 29 with seven birdies in his first-round match against Aaron Flores ... Vinnie Murphy holed an 88-yard wedge on the second hole of an 11-for-7 playoff to advance to match play ... Ghim caddied for friend Joshua Lee in the playoff. Lee chipped in on the third playoff hole to claim the final spot in match play ... The 1949

APL champion, 86-year-old Ken Towns, attended the championship and walked the course following several competitors over the first two days ... Thirty-eight of the 64 players who qualified for match play and 15 of the top 16 finishers played early in the first round and late in the second round of stroke play ... Only the par-4 18th hole finished with a scoring average under par (3.92) during stroke play ... Defending champion Jordan Niebrugge spent the week ahead of the championship competing in the PGA Tour's John Deere Classic, on a sponsor's exemption. Niebrugge carded rounds of 66-69 on the weekend to finish tied for 27th at 10-under par. He lost to Ghim in the third round of the APL ... Sand Creek Station is bisected by the Santa Fe Railroad, which is still active. Trains pass by two to three times an hour during the day ... Forty-three states and 13 countries were represented at the championship ... The 2014 championship was the first APL and 21st USGA championship played in Kansas.

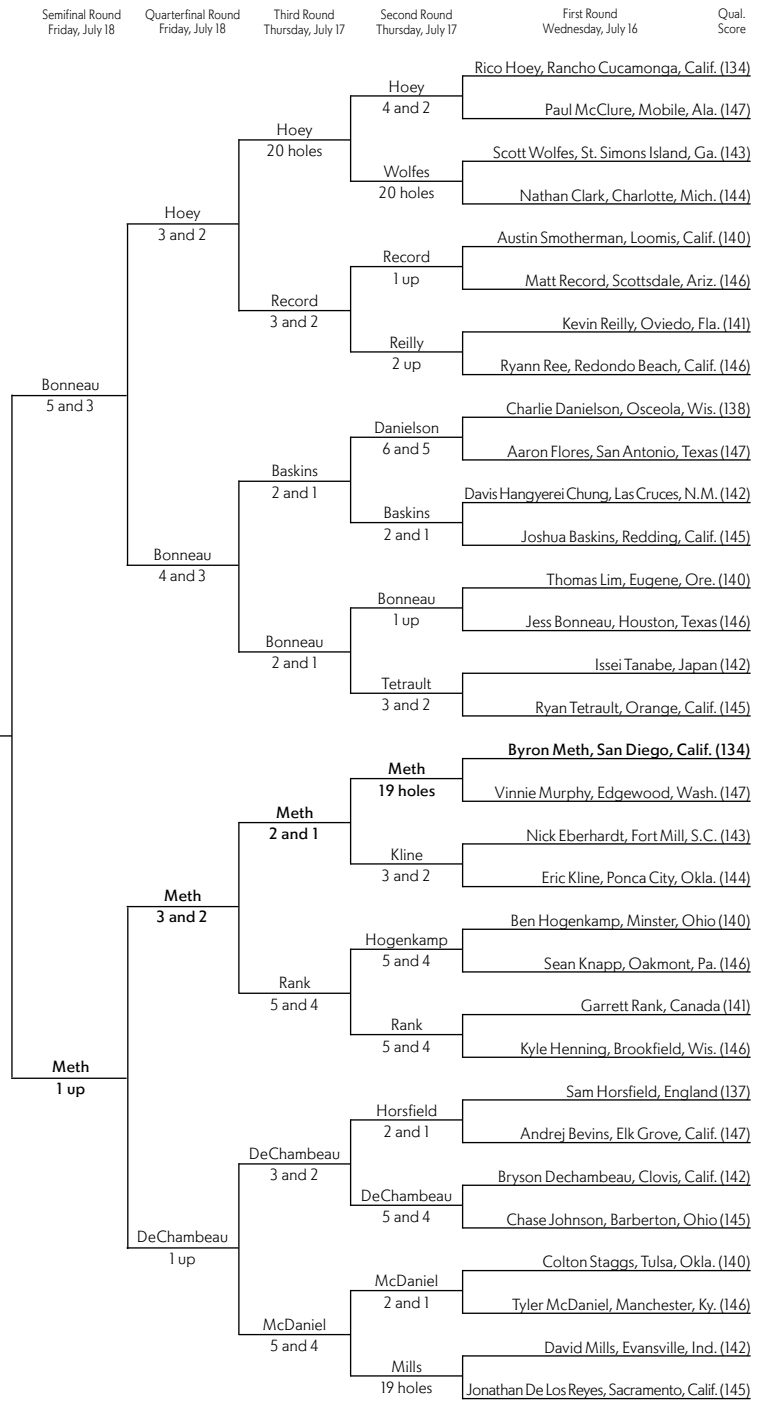

## Championship History

The U.S. Amateur Public Links Championship has been an unqualified success since its inception in 1922, giving exposure to many public-course players who otherwise might not have an opportunity to compete in a national championship.

The championship's prime mover was James D. Standish Jr., of Detroit, who convinced his colleagues on the 1922 USGA Executive Committee that the time was right for such a grass-roots competition. Standish pointed to the public-course golfer, whose ranks were swelling following World War I, and to the growing number of municipal and daily-fee courses in America.

The first championship was conducted at the Ottawa Park Course in Toledo, Ohio. The USGA had no way of knowing how many players to expect, but a satisfying 140 entries were received. Less than half that number wore golf shoes. The first champion was Eddie Held, of St. Louis, who joined a private club soon after his victory and thus became ineligible to defend his title in 1923.

In 1923, the first team championship was conducted at the same time as the individual competition. East Potomac Park in Washington, D.C., was selected as the site, causing a great deal of excitement in the nation's capital. President Warren G. Harding, a golf enthusiast, donated the team trophy. Harding wanted to enter the championship himself, but time didn't permit, and besides, he was a member of at least one private club, which precluded his entry. The team championship was discontinued following the 2008 championship.

That those earliest championships drew upward of 18 teams representing cities from coast to coast was a tribute to the spread of public-course golf in America. From the initial entry of 140 players, today's annual entry has surged to as many as 6,000 competitors.

The historic invitation to the Masters Tournament for the champion of the Amateur Public Links began in 1989. Ralph Howe III, who won in 1988, was the first Amateur Public Links winner to play in the Masters on that invitation. Thanks to the graciousness of Augusta National Golf Club, this invitation has continued to be issued annually.

The championship has previously attracted bus drivers, bartenders, firemen, waiters, riveters, engineers and college professors. Not as many participate as in years past, but the opportunity for a field with mixed occupations still exists. It has also been a springboard for the likes of U.S. Open champions Ed Furgol, Tommy Bolt and Ken Venturi; British Open champion Tony Lema; PGA champions Dave Marr and Bobby Nichols; Masters winners George Archer and Trevor Immelman; and FedEx Cup champion Brandt Snedeker. In 1959, it produced the first African-American winner of a USGA championship in William A. Wright, who later became a golf instructor.

The U.S. Amateur Public Links and U.S. Women's Amateur Public Links Championships were retired following the 2014 season. The decision followed an internal review which determined that the APL and WAPL championships no longer serve their original mission because of the widespread accessibility public-course golfers today enjoy in USGA championships.
