### U.S. Amateur Championship Trophy

The original U.S. Amateur Championship Trophy, the Havemeyer Trophy, was destroyed by a fire in 1925 at East Lake Country Club in Atlanta, Ga., where it was being displayed by virtue of Robert T. Jones Jr.'s victory in the U.S. Amateur that same year. It had originally been presented by Theodore A. Havemeyer, the first president of the United States Golf Association. The trophy was replaced in 1926 by Edward S. Moore, USGA treasurer from 1922–25.

## Yang Wins the 2014 Championship

Gunn Yang, 20, of the Republic of Korea, defeated Corey Connors, of Canada, 2 and 1, in the 36-hole final match to win the 2014 U.S. Amateur Championship at Atlanta Athletic Club's 7,208-yard, par-71 Highlands Course.

"I was just trying to make it to the match-play portion, really," said Yang, a San Diego State University sophomore who had back surgery in May 2013. "That was the goal, first of all. And then when I made it to the match play, I was like, maybe I can do this. I was just trying to go through by every single match, just trying to play my game and trying to see how it goes, and I got the trophy. So, I'm really excited and really happy about it."

Yang, who grew up in Korea and played competitive amateur golf in Australia for five years, is the second Korean-born player to win the U.S. Amateur, joining Byeong-Hun An, who claimed the title at Southern Hills Country Club in Tulsa, Okla., in 2009.

Connors, 22, a recent graduate of Kent State University in Ohio who lost to eventual champion Matt Fitzpatrick in the 2013 semi-finals, was vying to become the first Canadian winner since Gary Cowan in 1971. He was the first player since Patrick Cantlay in 2010 (semifinals) and 2011 (final) to advance to at least the semifinals in back-to-back years.

Yang, who was playing in his first U.S. Amateur after qualifying on July 21 at Hacienda Golf Club in La Habra Heights, Calif., held a 1-up lead through the morning 18 holes. He never trailed in the match.

"I haven't won a tournament for a long time, like maybe five or six years," said Yang. "I was going through my injury, also. I was just trying to play my game. Obviously, it just popped in my head that if I beat Corey, then I win the trophy. But, I was just trying to concentrate and just trying to hit balls and just put it next to the hole and make the putt."

Connors, a member of the Canadian national team, won the first hole of the afternoon 18 to square the match and that status held until Yang won the 24th and 25th holes for a 2-up advantage.

Yang led 1 up through 28 holes when the match was suspended at 4:25 p.m. because of dangerous weather. Both players had hit their drives in the fairway on the 29th hole. Play resumed at 6:02 p.m.

"He struck the ball great," Connors said of Yang. "He made a lot of key putts when he needed to and didn't really have any weaknesses out there. He didn't give me any openings to climb through."

Yang's sloping, 18-foot birdie putt on the 32nd hole pushed him to 2-up. Connors, the Mid-American Conference co-player of the year, missed birdie opportunities on the next three holes and Yang's two-putt for a halving par on the par-3 35th hole closed the match.

"Especially the second round, I had a lot of looks for birdie," Connors said. "I had a bunch of birdie tries. I thought I hit nice putts. They just slipped by and that was kind of frustrating not to have any of those drop and win some holes."

### Leaders

Round 1 — Jimmy Beck (Highlands), at 6-under 65, and Sam Horsfield and Taylor Moore, at 6-under 66 (Riverside), by one stroke over Lee McCoy (Riverside). Round 2 — McCoy and Moore were co-medalists at 8-under 135, by three strokes over Beck, Sam Burns, Will Zalatoris, Cheng-Tsung Pan and Jonathan Garrick.

### Cut

At 2-over 145, with a 17-for-4 playoff that lasted two holes for the final match-play spots.

### Weather

Cloudy to partly cloudy with temperatures in the mid-80s on Monday. Sun and clouds with temperatures in the high 80s on Tuesday. Mostly sunny with a northwesterly breeze and temperatures in the mid-80s for first-round matches on Wednesday. Thursday produced sun, light winds and some clouds with temperatures in the mid-80s. Partly sunny with temperatures in the high 80s on Friday. A mixture of sun and clouds with highs in the low 90s for Saturday's semifinals. Sun gave way to clouds with temperatures rising to the high 90s for Sunday's championship match. A line of storms caused a weather delay in the afternoon.

### Notes

Atlanta Athletic Club hosted its sixth USGA championship ... The U.S. Amateur was held in the state of Georgia for the second time ... Georgia has hosted 27 USGA championships ... There were 58 fully exempt players in the field, including seven USGA champions ... The 312-player field included players from 22 countries: Australia, Canada, Chile, Chinese Taipei, Colombia, England, France, Germany, India, Republic of

Korea, Malaysia, Mexico, The Netherlands, New Zealand, Peru, Scotland, Singapore, South Africa, Spain, Wales, Zimbabwe and the United States ... Forty-two states were represented and California had the most players with 45 ... The oldest competitor was Doug Hanzel (57) ... Will Thomson, at age 13, became the youngest competitor in U.S. Amateur history ... The average age of the field was 21.91 ... Seven players who competed at the 2014 U.S. Open Championship — Brian Campbell, Andrew Dorn, Will Grimmer, Brandon McIver, Maverick McNealy, Robby Shelton, Hunter Stewart — were in the field ... Cheng-Tsung Pan and Bradley Neil played in the 2014 British Open Championship ... Jimmy Beck had the best round on the Highlands Course with a 6-under 65 in the first round ... Sam Horsfield (first round), Taylor Moore (first round) and Sam Burns (second round) each had 66s on the Riverside Course during stroke-play qualifying ... Four-time U.S. Mid-Amateur champion Nathan Smith, who reached match play via a playoff, advanced to the quarterfinals for the first time, including wins over co-medalist McCoy (Round of 64) and 2014 U.S. Amateur Public Links champion Byron Meth (Round of 16) ... In addition to Smith, Meth and Zalatoris, two other USGA champions qualified for match play — Jordan Niebrugge (2013 Amateur Public Links) and Scottie Scheffler (2013 Junior Amateur) ... Taylor Funk, the son of 2009 U.S. Senior Open champion Fred Funk, reached match play in his U.S. Amateur debut ... Gunn Yang, who was born in the Republic of Korea and lived in Australia for several years, and Corey Conners squared off in an all-international championship match for the second consecutive year ... Conners, who was No. 44 in the WAGR™, became the first Canadian since Gary Cowan in 1971 to reach a U.S. Amateur final ... Jerry Pate, the 1974 U.S. Amateur and 1976 U.S. Open champion, was the keynote speaker at the U.S. Amateur Players' Dinner on Aug. 9 ... Bob Jones IV, the grandson of nine-time USGA champion Bob Jones and a longtime Atlantic Athletic Club member, also addressed the players.



## Championship History

The U.S. Amateur Championship was born in 1895 because of a controversy. In 1894, two clubs — Newport (R.I.) Golf Club and New York's St. Andrew's Golf Club — had conducted invitational tournaments to attract the nation's top amateur players.

Newport's stroke-play tournament was won by club member W.G. Lawrence, who triumphed over a field of 20 competitors. The match-play competition at St. Andrews attracted 27 golfers and was won by Laurence Stoddart of the host club.

Both clubs proclaimed their winners as the national champion. Clearly, golf needed a national governing body to conduct national championships, develop a single set of rules for all golfers to follow and promote the best interests of the game. With that, representatives from five clubs founded the USGA on Dec. 22, 1894.

As a result, in 1895, its first full year of operation, the USGA conducted Amateur, Open and Women's Amateur Championships. The Amateur and Open Championships were conducted at Newport Golf Club during the same week of October and Charles B. Macdonald became the first U.S. Amateur champion.

The Amateur Championship is the oldest golf championship in this country — one day older than the U.S. Open. Except for an eight-year period from 1965–1972, when it was stroke play, the Amateur has been a match-play championship.

Over the years, as interest in the game grew and the number of quality players increased, it became necessary to establish a national handicapping system to determine who was eligible to compete in the Amateur. The USGA's first national handicap

list, which was published for the 1912 championship, was the forerunner of the present-day USGA Handicap System.

Throughout its history, the U.S. Amateur has been the most coveted of all amateur titles. Many of the great names of professional golf, such as Gene Littler, Arnold Palmer, Jack Nicklaus, Lanny Wadkins, Craig Stadler, Jerry Pate, Mark O'Meara, Hal Sutton, Phil Mickelson and Tiger Woods, grace the Havemeyer Trophy.

It was, however, longtime amateur Robert T. Jones Jr. who first attracted media coverage and spectator attendance at the Amateur Championship. Jones captured the championship five times (1924, 1925, 1927, 1928, 1930). His 1930 victory was a stunning moment in golf history when, at Merion Cricket Club in Ardmore, Pa., Jones rounded out the Grand Slam, winning the four major American and British championships in one year.

Sixty-six years later, in 1996, Tiger Woods attracted similar interest and enthusiasm when he won a record third consecutive U.S. Amateur at Pumpkin Ridge Golf Club in North Plains, Ore. In 1994, Woods, at 18, had first entered the record book as the youngest ever to win the Amateur Championship. In 1996, he broke yet another record when he won, having registered 18 consecutive match-play victories.

International players also have made a major impact in the last 15 years, with Nick Flanagan (Australia), Edoardo Molinari (Italy), Richie Ramsay (Scotland), Danny Lee (New Zealand), Byeong-Hun An (Korea), Matthew Fitzpatrick (England) and Gunn Yang (Korea) taking the title in 2003, 2005, 2006, 2008, 2009, 2013 and 2014, respectively.
