### 2015 Conditions of Play

#### **Entries**

Open to any female professional, and to female amateurs with a Handicap Index® not exceeding 2.4. Entries close May 6.

#### Starting Field

156 players

#### Schedule of Play

- Thursday, July 9 First round (18 holes)
- Friday, July 10 Second round (18 holes)

After 36 holes, the field will be cut to the low 60 scorers and any ties for 60th place.

- Saturday, July 11 Third round (18 holes)
- Sunday, July 12 Fourth round (18 holes)

#### **Playoff**

In case of a tie after 72 holes, a three–hole aggregate score playoff will immediately follow. If this playoff results in a tie, the tied players will immediately continue to play off hole–by–hole until the winner is determined.

#### Sectional Qualifying

36 holes stroke play, scheduled at 25 sites, between May 9 and June 15.

### Wie Wins the 2014 Championship

When Michelle Wie arrived at the 2003 U.S. Women's Open as a wide-smiling, big-dreaming 13-year-old, one of the first questions posed to her was whether she could win the national championship.

"I guess everyone comes here to win," she said at the time. Wie tied for 39th that year, but the subsequent years brought disappointments, frustrations and even more questions.

Until Sunday.

Wie, 24, finally answered with a definitive yes by winning the 69th U.S. Women's Open at Pinehurst Resort and Country Club's Course No. 2. It is her second career USGA championship, but first since she won the 2003 U.S. Women's Amateur Public Links as a big-hitting 13-year-old.

Wie played poised and confidently throughout, including when she calmly rolled in a 25-foot birdie putt on the 17th hole after a double bogey on the previous hole narrowed her lead to one stroke. Wie shot an even-par 70 and finished with a 2-underpar 278 total, two strokes ahead of world No. 1 and fellow American Stacy Lewis, who matched the championship's low round of 66 and finished at even-par 280.

Wie's U.S. Women's Open disappointments include her twice holding or sharing the 54-hole lead. In 2005, as an amateur, she finished with an 82 and tied for 23rd. The following year, she shot a final-round 73 and tied for third, missing out by two strokes on a playoff won by Annika Sorenstam.

The frustrations continued in 2007 and 2013, when she withdrew following opening rounds of 82 and 80, respectively. In 2007 she cited a wrist injury and in 2013, she withdrew because of illness, failing to return to the course with one hole left in her second round on Saturday morning at Sebonack Golf Club.

Precocious is a word often used when referring to Wie, for good reason. As a 13-year-old, she was already nearly 6 feet tall and could drive a ball 300 yards. Though she grew up in the golf spotlight, she has come of age as one of the game's more dominant players since graduating from Stanford University in June 2012.

Wie wins her first major at the same age that Annika Sorenstam won the first of her three U.S. Women's Open titles. It comes at what is considered the home of American golf — and aptly, it is her first professional win on the U.S. mainland.

For the second straight day, Wie bogeyed the first hole. Playing partner Amy Yang also opened with a bogey, and she also threeputted the par-4 second hole for a double bogey on her way to an outward 39 that dropped her down the leader board.

Wie, meanwhile, eased into the rest of her day with eight consecutive pars and appeared unfazed by her pursuers. Early on, 2011 champion So Yeon Ryu moved to within two strokes at 1

over with three birdies in the first four holes, but that charge stalled with sporadic play over the last 14 holes.

Then there was world No. 1 Stacy Lewis, who held the opening-round lead after a bogey-free 67, but followed with rounds of 73 and 74.

Lewis began her day at 4 over for the championship, six strokes back of Wie and Yang. Given that the week's low round had been a 4-under 66 and that the largest final-round comeback to win was five strokes - done last by Sorenstam in 1995 - Lewis appeared to be the supreme long shot.

After she made her second bogey of the day at the par-4 fourth, Lewis remained five strokes back. She continued to battle, however, and her fifth birdie in nine holes at the 241-yard, par-4 13th hole pulled her to within a stroke of Wie at even par.

Lewis' charge stalled with bogeys at the 14th and 16th holes, but she was not finished. She birdied the 161-yard, par-3 17th and 391-yard, par-4 18th to keep a bit of pressure on Wie.

"Coming into the day I thought if I could get back to even par it would be a good spot," Lewis said. "I thought with the pressure of a major and the way this golf course played, I thought I had a chance. On the back nine all I was trying to do was hit good golf shots. And the nerves kind of came in. I made some bad swings, hit some good putts that didn't go in, but to birdie 17 and 18 and put the pressure on, you can't ask for a better finish."

Wie would not be denied this time. At the 452-yard, par-5 10th hole, she extended her lead to three on Lewis by hitting her second shot to within 10 feet and making the eagle putt.

Five more pars were followed by Wie's biggest drama of the day, at the 453-yard, par-4 l6th. Her approach shot buried at the bottom of a clump of wiregrass in a natural sandy area short of the green. With a three-shot lead, Wie took an unplayable lie, played to the center of the green and two-putted for double bogey.

"Stuff happens like that," said Wie, whose lead was back to one stroke. "It's a U.S. Open; I just wanted to keep my calm."

Wie did by hitting her tee shot at the 161-yard, par-3 17th to within 25 feet. The birdie putt was Wie's 25th one-putt of the championship and gave her some space to enjoy the walk up

"It just means so much more to me," she said. "I think life is just so ironic. I think that without your downs, without the hardships, I don't think you appreciate the ups as much as you do. I think the fact that I struggled so much, the fact that I kind of went through a hard period of my life, the fact that this trophy is right next to me, it means so much more to me than it ever would have when I was 15."

The win was a long time in coming, but it finally came.



### 2014 Championship Notes

#### Leaders

Round 1 — Stacy Lewis, at 3-under 67, by one stroke over Michelle Wie. Round 2 — Wie, at 4-under 136, by three strokes over Lexi Thompson. Round 3 — Amy Yang and Wie, at 2-under 208, by four strokes over Juli Inkster, Stephanie Meadow, Na Yeon Choi and Minjee Lee.

#### Cut

At 9-over 149, with 71 players (65 professionals and six amateurs) making the cut.

#### Weather

Hot and humid for the duration of the championship, with temperatures in the 90s and heat indexes near 100.

#### **Notes**

A record 1,702 entries were accepted for the 2014 U.S. Women's Open ... Seventy-nine players were fully exempt into the championship, including 10 past Women's Open winners: Na Yeon Choi (2012), Paula Creamer (2010), Juli Inkster (1999, 2002), Eun-Hee Ji (2009), Cristie Kerr (2007), Birdie Kim (2005), Se Ri Pak (1998), Inbee Park (2008, 2013), So Yeon Ryu (2011) and Karrie Webb (2000, 2001) ... Entries were received from 46 states (all except Delaware, Maine, South Dakota and Vermont), the District of Columbia and Puerto Rico, as well as 52 foreign countries ... For the first time in championship history, international qualifying was conducted at sites in the People's Republic of China, England, Japan and the Republic of Korea ... Lucy Li, 11, of Redwood Shores, Calif., was the youngest championship competitor. Li, who earned medalist honors at the Half Moon Bay (Calif.) Golf Links sectional qualifier, surpassed Lexi Thompson as the youngest qualifier in championship history. Li was 11 years, 8 months and 19 days old on the first day of competition. Thompson was 12 years, 4 months and 18 days old when she competed in the 2007 Women's Open at Pine Needles Lodge & Golf Club in Southern Pines, N.C. Although Li is the youngest player to qualify for the U.S. Women's Open, she is not the youngest to compete in the championship. Beverly Klass played in the 1967 U.S. Women's Open at Virginia Hot Springs Golf & Tennis Club in Hot Springs, Va., at 10 years, 7 months and 21 days old. Sectional qualifying was introduced in 1976 ... Nineteen teenagers advanced through sectional qualifying, led by 18-year-old Miniee Lee, of Australia, who won the 2012 U.S. Girls' Junior Championship and was then ranked No. 1 in the Women's World Amateur Golf Ranking. Three additional teenagers — Moriya Jutanugarn, Lydia Ko and Thompson were fully exempt into the championship ... Inkster was the

oldest championship competitor at age 53. Inkster competed in her record 35th Women's Open, but stated at a pre-championship press conference that 2014 was likely her final championship ... At age 50, 1987 U.S. Womens' Open champion Laura Davies, who advanced through sectional qualifying, was the second-oldest player in the championship. The week prior to the championship, Davies was named a Dame Commander of the Order of the British Empire by Queen Elizabeth II ... Michelle Wie became the first U.S. Women's Amateur Public Links champion to also win the U.S. Women's Open title. Wie won the 2003 WAPL at age 13 ... The 2014 U.S. Women's Open was the 28th USGA championships to be conducted in North Carolina.

### **Championship History**

The U.S. Women's Open was added to the USGA's roster of championships in 1953, 58 years after the first U.S. Women's Amateur. The reason for the USGA's relatively late assumption of the Women's Open is simple: women's professional golf is fairly new. When Opal Hill turned professional in 1938, she and Helen Hicks were two of the very few women golf professionals in the world.

Unlike the other 12 national championships conducted by the USGA, the Women's Open was created by another organization. In 1946, the short-lived Women's Professional Golfers Association introduced the Women's Open at match play at the Spokane (Wash.) Country Club. The Spokane Athletic Round Table, a men's fraternal organization, contributed the \$19,700 purse from its slot machines proceeds.

The first Women's Open was the only one conducted at match play. Patty Berg won the 36-hole qualifying medal in 1946, with rounds of 72-73—145, then won the championship by defeating Betty Jameson, 5 and 4, in the 36-hole final.

The small membership of the WPGA ran the championship for three years. By 1949, however, women's professional golf was making significant strides and the Ladies Professional Golf Association was founded. A group of 11 women, including Berg, Jameson, Louise Suggs and Babe Didrikson Zaharias, established the new association to provide organized tournaments for women professionals. The LPGA ran the Women's Open for four years, but in 1953 asked the USGA to conduct the championship. The first Women's Open under the USGA flag was played at the Country Club of Rochester, in upstate New York, where Betsy Rawls won the second of her four Women's Open titles (1951, 1953, 1957, 1960).

Conducted by the USGA ever since, the Women's Open is the oldest championship open to women professionals and amateurs. Rawls and Mickey Wright, the only other four-time winner (1958, 1959, 1961, 1964) were the championship's dominant players from 1957 through 1964, winning six Women's Opens between them during those eight years. In 1967, Catherine

Lacoste, daughter of French tennis player Rene Lacoste and 1927 British Ladies Amateur Champion Simone Thion de la Chaume, became the only amateur to win the Women's Open.

In its 68-year history, the U.S. Women's Open has reigned as the world's greatest women's championship, attracting steadily increasing numbers of entries and spectators. Whereas only 37 contestants played in 1953, in 1976 the field jumped to 205 players and sectional qualifying was introduced. In 2001, a then-record 980 contestants entered. A four-day attendance record of 41,200 was set in 1979 at Brooklawn Country Club in Fairfield, Conn. At the 50th Women's Open, in 1995, that record was more than doubled at The Broadmoor Golf Club in Colorado Springs, Colo.

In recent years, the U.S. Women's Open has truly become the world arena of women's golf. Since 1990, 13 championships have been won by foreign-born players, while only three of the first 41 champions were foreign-born. The emergence of the Women's Open as a great international contest came in 1987, when England's Laura Davies prevailed in an 18-hole playoff against Japan's Ayako Okamoto and JoAnne Gunderson Carner of the United States.

Another foreign-born player, Annika Sorenstam, of Sweden, established the 72-hole scoring record of 8-under-par 272 at Pine Needles Lodge & Golf Club in 1996. Juli Inkster matched that 72-hole score of 272, also setting a record in relation to par at 16 under, in 1999.

In 2002, qualifying for the Women's Open was held in two stages for the first time — 18 holes for local qualifying and 36 holes for sectional qualifying. Since 2010, there has been one stage — a 36-hole sectional qualifier. Additionally, in 2014, the USGA held international qualifying for the first time in championship history. Qualifying was conducted at sites in the People's Republic of China, England, Japan and the Republic of Korea.

Entries for the U.S. Women's Open also have topped the 1,000 mark every year since 2004, illustrating the global growth of women's golf.
