

TEE TIME SHEET

“Tee Times” is the official terminology used by the USGA. Please use this wording in lieu of “Pairing Sheets”.

It is the Host Club’s responsibility to produce complimentary daily Tee Time sheets to be given to the players, officials, club members, media and fans. The Tee Time sheet should contain the following:

- A front cover to be provided by the USGA. The cover will contain the championship name, the Host Club name, the Stroke Play Co-Host (if applicable), the date, a photo of the Host Club and the USGA logo. The photo will be the Host Club image used in that year’s USGA Calendar. The Host Club may provide an alternate image; however, the Host Club must be able to show proof of copyright ownership, and John Mummert, USGA Creative Director, Global Content and Media Distribution, must approve the photo.
- A course map that would show the course layout and the main fan facilities. A sample of the map is below:



- The weather warning information.
- The mobile device policy.
- The hole/par/yardage chart.
- The tee sheet or match-play tree provided by the USGA (see below for sample).
- Advertising may be included on the tee times sheet subject to USGA rules and regulations.

**If there is a need to fill additional space in the tee time sheet, the USGA can assist to provide additional information.*

Most tee time sheets are produced as 11”x17” in full size and folded 3-4 times to final distribution size.

A local printer should be located to produce the tee time sheets.

The USGA will provide one shell (one side of the full slick) that will include the front cover and blank space

for the course map and approved advertising. The reverse side will be held for the tee times or match-play tree provided by the USGA. The shell can be printed in full prior to the championship or on a daily basis.

PRACTICE ROUNDS

The Host Club and the USGA should mutually determine the need to print a publication for practice rounds. This will not include tee times but can contain an alpha list of players and some general championship information.

STROKE-PLAY TEE TIME SHEETS

The USGA will design the slick for the tee times for the stroke play rounds. A USGA representative will staff player registration and as players register, he/she will collect/confirm all of the information needed such as hometowns of players. This information will be relayed to the USGA scoring staff who will confirm the player names, hometowns and starting times for stroke play and finalize the design of this slick.

Once completed, they will create a PDF of the stroke-play information for Monday and Tuesday and send to the Host Club's printer. This will take place Saturday evening at approximately 5 p.m., once all players have registered. The same information will be used for the tee time sheets on Monday and Tuesday. We do not update the tee time sheet after first-round scores.

A sample of the grouping slick is below:

During stroke play, tee time sheets should be distributed at both the Host Club and Stroke Play Co-Host (if applicable). A simple course map of the Stroke-Play Co-Host showing the course layout and fan facilities can be printed on a one-page sheet and inserted into the tee times sheet.

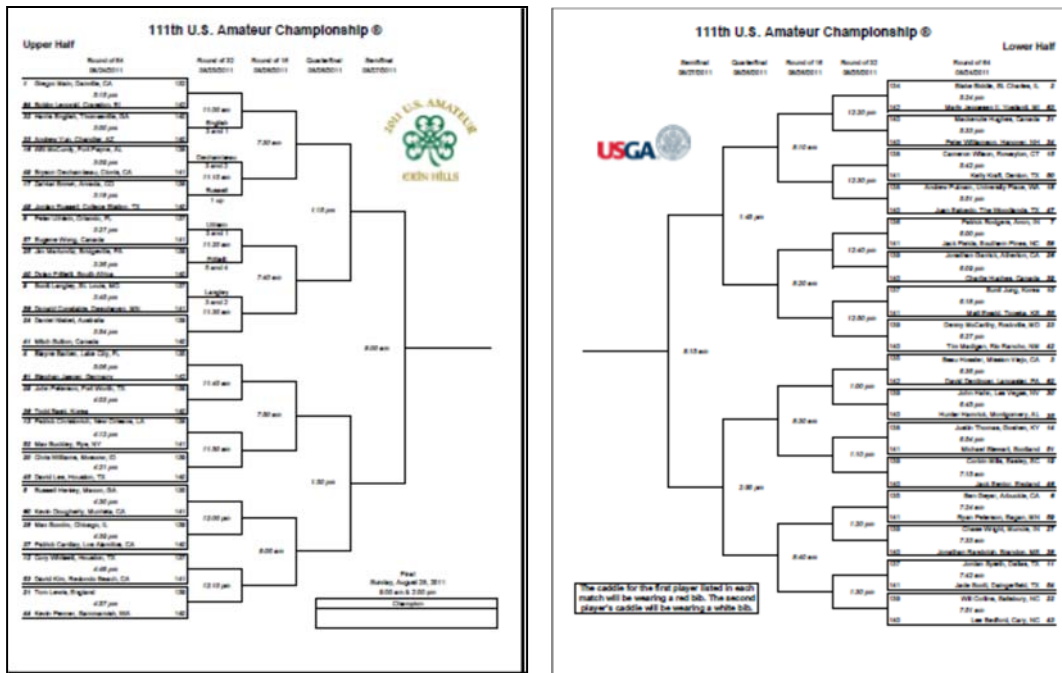
MATCH-PLAY TEE TIME SHEETS

Once stroke-play is complete, the USGA scoring staff will create the match-play tree for Wednesday's tee time sheet in PDF form and send to the Host Club's printer. If there is a playoff for the final match-play spots that has not been completed, we will use "TBD" for those player slots.

If delays (such as inclement weather) push the conclusion of stroke play into Wednesday, there will not be a new tee times sheet printed on Tuesday evening for Wednesday morning distribution. Extra stroke play tee time sheets should be given out on Wednesday.

The USGA scoring staff will continue each evening to update the match-play tree and send to the printer through the conclusion of the championship.

A sample of the match-play slick is below:



The USGA requests that at least 50 tee time sheets be sent to the USGA (Robbie Zalzneck/Jenny Pritchard) at the completion of the championship for distribution to the future site hosts, the USGA Museum and Archives, etc.

Printing numbers will vary based on fan attendance. Assuming a 25,000-weekly attendance number, suggested print numbers would be:

- 5,000 for Monday-Tuesday, Stroke-Play Rounds (combined and including Stroke Play Co-Host)
- 2,500 for Wednesday, Round 1 of Match-Play
- 3,000 for Thursday, Rounds 2 and 3 of Match-Play
- 4,000 for Friday, Quarterfinals of Match-Play
- 4,000 for Saturday, Semifinals of Match-Play
- 4,000 for Sunday, Finals of Match-Play

The print schedule will vary based on completion of play. Below is a sample of the print schedule:

****All items needed for printing must be e-mailed in pdf format to the printer.***

The tee time sheets should be delivered to the Host Club by the printer by 6 a.m. each morning. Distribution by the Host Club each morning should include:

- Clubhouse
- Players' Locker Room
- Media Center
- USGA Office
- First and #10 Tees
- Scoreboard
- Volunteer Check-in
- Main Entrance

Containers, like a mail box, can be erected to hold these sheets so that they can easily be available for the public.

2010 U.S. Amateur Championship
Inclement Weather Policy for Spectators and Volunteers

It is the USGA's intent to safeguard all players, caddies, walking referees, walking scores and standard bearers whenever possible from dangerous weather. It is also the USGA's intent to notify spectators and volunteers in advance, if possible, of approaching inclement weather.

Since providing shelter for thousands of spectators over hundreds of acres is not practical, the USGA will use a system whereby "weather warning" signs (see above) will be hung at all status boards when inclement weather is detected within a potentially dangerous range. The intent behind this action is to notify spectators and volunteers, when possible, of potentially dangerous weather before play is suspended, so time is given for spectators to move to the shelter of the clubhouse. When "weather warning" signs go up, marshals are instructed to "spread the word" to spectators on their hole that dangerous weather is in the area. The "weather warning" signs should not affect play on the golf course as players will utilize evacuation routes when play is suspended or delayed. Marshals will notify spectators to avoid other dangerous areas such as wire fences, hill tops and single trees. All volunteers are advised to use their best judgment about when to take cover. The USGA does not expect any volunteers to take undue risks.

- From the U.S. Senior Amateur Championship, winners in 2007 and 2008 and the runner-up in 2007
- From the USGA Senior Amateur Championship, winners in 2008 and 2009 and the runner-up in 2009
- Playing members of the two most recent USA and Cross Section and Inland National Cup Series (2007 and 2008)
- Playing members of the two most recent USA Men's World Amateur Series (2008 and 2009)
- Playing members of the 2009 USA Men's Cup de las Americas Series
- Winners of 2009 individual NCAA Division I Men's Golf Championships
- Winners of the British Amateur Championship the last five years (2005-2009)
- Special exemptions as selected by the USGA.
